





### ALLERGICS ARE GOOD STUDENTS

#### Hay Fever and Asthma Sufferers Usually Fare Well

Ann Arbor—Hay fever and asthma sufferers take heart. You may have the sniffles and wheezes, but according to a survey recently completed at the University of Michigan you are, likely to have above average intelligence as well.

To make this survey Dr. Buenaventura Jimenez of the University of Michigan Health Service classified each freshman entering the University from 1931 to 1935 into one of five groups according to his symptoms and family history of allergy, that strange disease which makes individuals sensitive to certain substances.

Information for the study was obtained from Health Service entrance examination records. This classification was then compared with intelligence ratings secured from academic entrance examinations taken by the same freshman students.

Group one on Dr. Jimenez's allergy chart included students definitely known to have some type of allergy. In group two were listed sufferers from skin eruptions, gastro-intestinal upsets, food idiosyncrasies, frequent colds, or headaches with a positive family history of the disease.

Group three included persons with the same ailments but with a negative family history. Persons in group four had no symptoms of allergy but had a positive family history. Group five, having no symptoms of allergy and a negative family history of sensitization, was used as the control group for the survey. Groups one, two, four, and five were used in the study.

In almost every case the allergy group had fewer failures in the examinations and a larger percentage of the upper quarter of the intelligence test ratings than did the members of the control group who had no symptoms or family histories of the disease.

Although hay fever and asthma are the most widely known forms of this affliction, there are many other types including skin rashes of various kinds, hives, certain kinds of eczema, some forms of epilepsy, migraine, and sinus trouble.

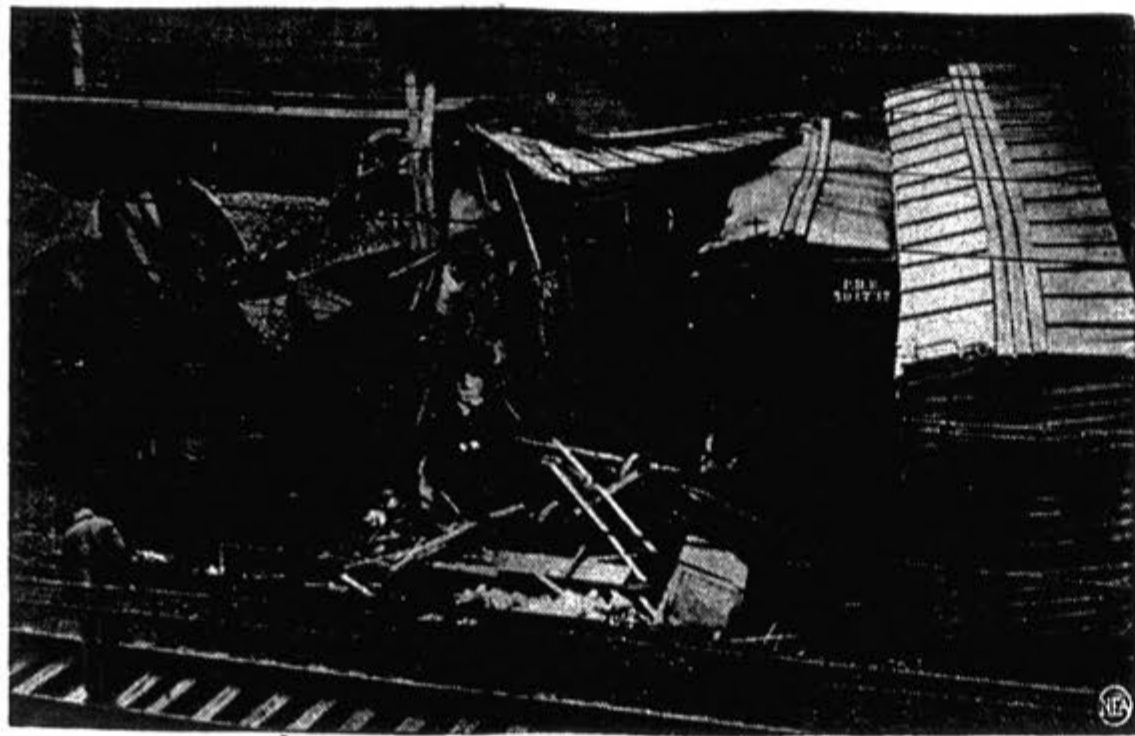

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### TAX BILLS ARE BEING SENT OUT

#### New Arrangement Made By City Treasurer's Department

Within the next few days, property owners of Escanaba will be presented with bills for county and school taxes similar to bills they now receive from the utility department.

The bills will show the description of property and the amount of the taxes. Stubs will be attached. When a person wishes to pay his taxes, he merely presents the bill along with his remittance at the city treasurer's window.

The new arrangement has been designed for greater convenience to the public and greater efficiency by the city treasurer's department at the collection window.

Under the old arrangement, announcement was made through the newspapers that the tax rolls were ready for payment. Persons desiring to pay their taxes had to call at the city treasurer's office with a description of their property, wait at the window until the amount of the taxes was discovered by clerks in the office. People did not know before going to the treasurer's office how much their taxes would be.

As a result of the new system, this inconvenience is eliminated. People are notified that their taxes are due and how much they are so that that information is available without delay.

The bills are being delivered in the city by the same crews which deliver the utility bills. Taxes are due December 10. The rate this year is \$19.48 per thousand. Persons who do not receive their tax bills within the next week should call at the office of the city treasurer.

### IRON MOUNTAIN MAN FINDS ORE

#### Molybdenite Discovered In Marinette County; Deposit Valuable

Iron Mountain.—All the excitement aroused by a recent article in a Milwaukee paper describing the discovery near Middle Inlet, Wis., of a deposit of molybdenite, used in hardening steel, is an old story to C. A. Lucas, 913 East D street, this city, and his associates. Because it was Lucas, according to the deposit after six years of patient search.

The deposit, Lucas said, is situated on what is known as the Camp-5 farm, about six and a half miles northwest of Middle Inlet, and within the McCaskey farm property.

"McCaskey knew the deposit was there, but he didn't know how much there was until I went in and ran it down," Lucas stated.

"For several years I have been convinced of the value of that deposit, particularly after it was analyzed. Later, also, I consulted Mr. A. Kronquist, geologist for the Ford Motor company, and his comment with other data I obtained—has led me to believe that the deposit is highly valuable, and of considerable extent."

Obtained Lease  
"I located this deposit last fall, in company with F. H. Neumann and Elmer D. Scott, who had been active with me in the effort. We obtained a lease on the property and began to prove our find. Since then we have made a number of openings, using a jackhammer drill and blasting, and now have about 1,000 tons on the stockpile. We believe this ore will run 80 per cent of pure molybdenum.

"We are planning to install a crushing plant and an adequate mill. We may later be in position

THE REPUBLICAN PROGRAM

At the meeting of the National Republican Committee in Washington this week a showdown between the liberal and the conservative elements was reported as averted. The controversy between the conservative elements was reported as averted. The controversy between the conservative element and those who insisted that the party emphasis must be placed on liberalism was not permitted to go to the floor.

As a matter of fact, if it had gone to the floor it probably would have gotten nowhere, because the issue would have been fought chiefly around personalities and not ideas.

The issue will not be an issue until a program comes out, a program which can be discussed. Glenn Frank, the chairman of the Program Committee, announced that the final report will not be made until late next year, and that it will contain an expression of political, social and economic philosophy, an objective assessment of the consequences of New Deal policy and administration in the political life, economy, enterprise, and moral fiber of the American people; and, finally, a program of specific policies for dealing with the major problems confronting the government.

It is the last part of the program which will be most important. The critique of the New Deal has already been made, largely by experience, and the last elections showed, I think, that the criticism is being made by the American public. As I pointed out in this column immediately after the elections, the various polls of public opinion show pretty clearly where that criticism is centered.

It is the last part of the program—that of specific policies for dealing with the major problems confronting us—that is no doubt causing the Program Committee the most trouble, but this is not so much a problem of liberalism versus conservatism as it is a problem of analysis and intelligence.

The most hopeful sign in the Republican party is that, in conspicuous ways, new minds are operating, who are approaching such problems as unemployment, agriculture, taxation, monetary policy, trade, relief, and the relations between capital, industrial management, labor and government in a refreshingly scientific spirit.

They are, that is to say, attempting to formulate a picture of a progressive, peaceful, democratic society in which equilibrium will not be sacrificed to expansion, nor expansion to equilibrium.

To put a label on such a program is to confuse its aims, for its appeal would not be to liberalism, progressivism, conservatism, or any other ism, but to common sense. It would certainly not be reactionary. If conservatism means the recognition of the strength inherent in long-established customs and ways of life and work, then it would be conservative. If conservatism, however, means unwillingness to recognize obvious dilemmas, clashes, maladjustments and injustices in our present society, growing out of past errors, previously unclassified formulas and blind class interest, then it would be liberal.

And in so far as it recognizes that politics is the art of possibilities it would be moderate.

The important issue in the Republican ranks seems to be whether the political leaders, bent more on winning an election than on performing a statesmanlike service,

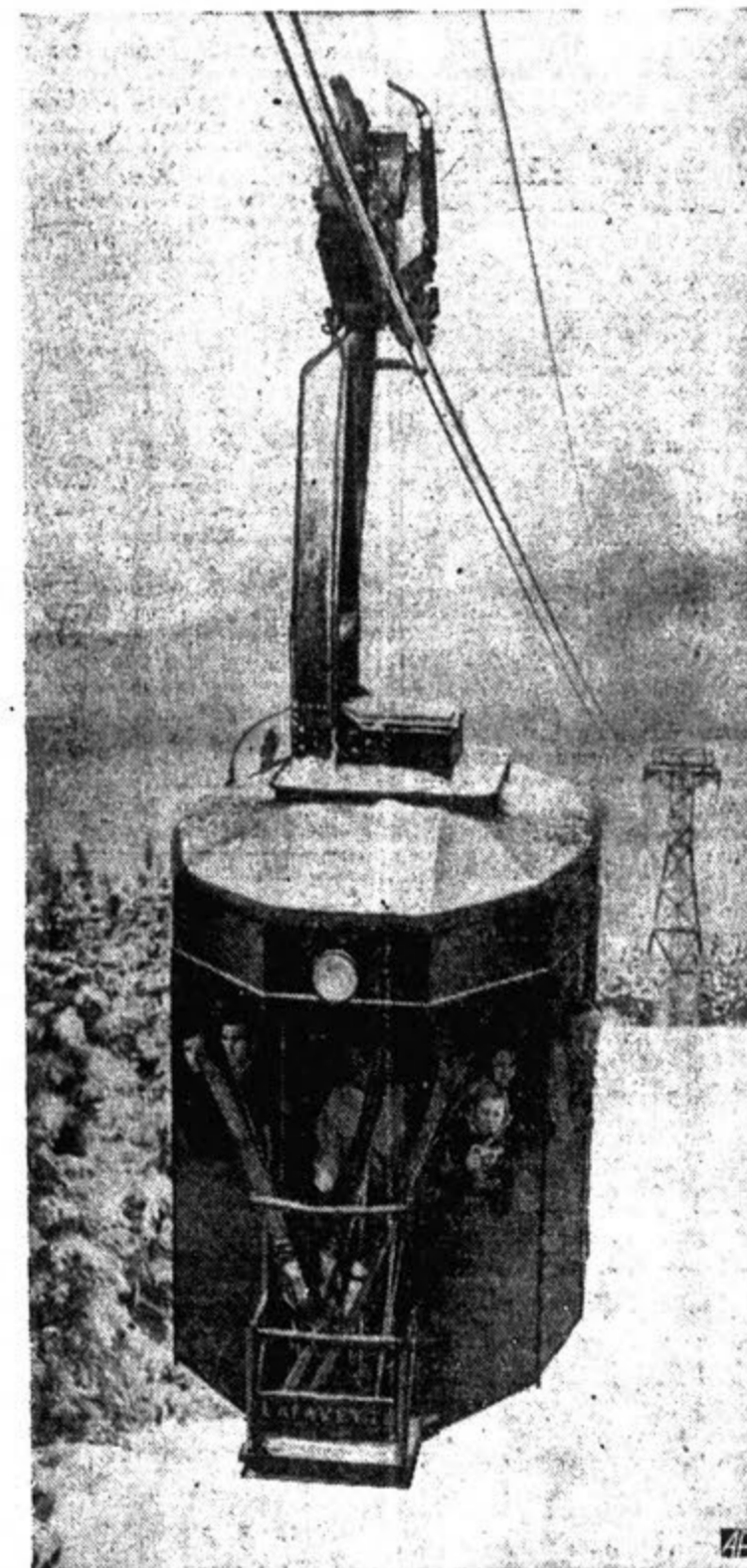

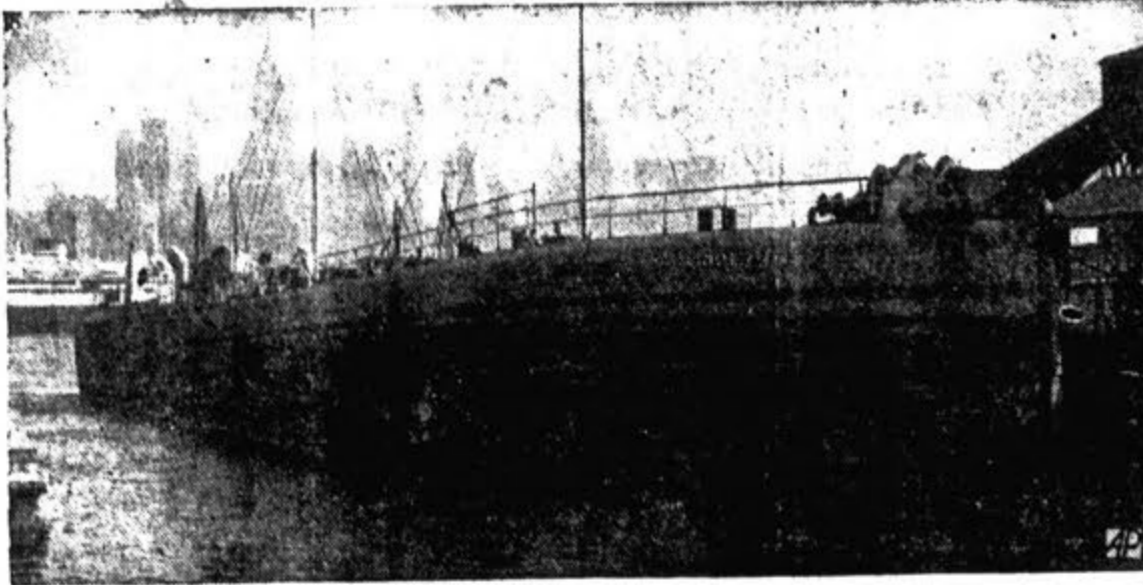

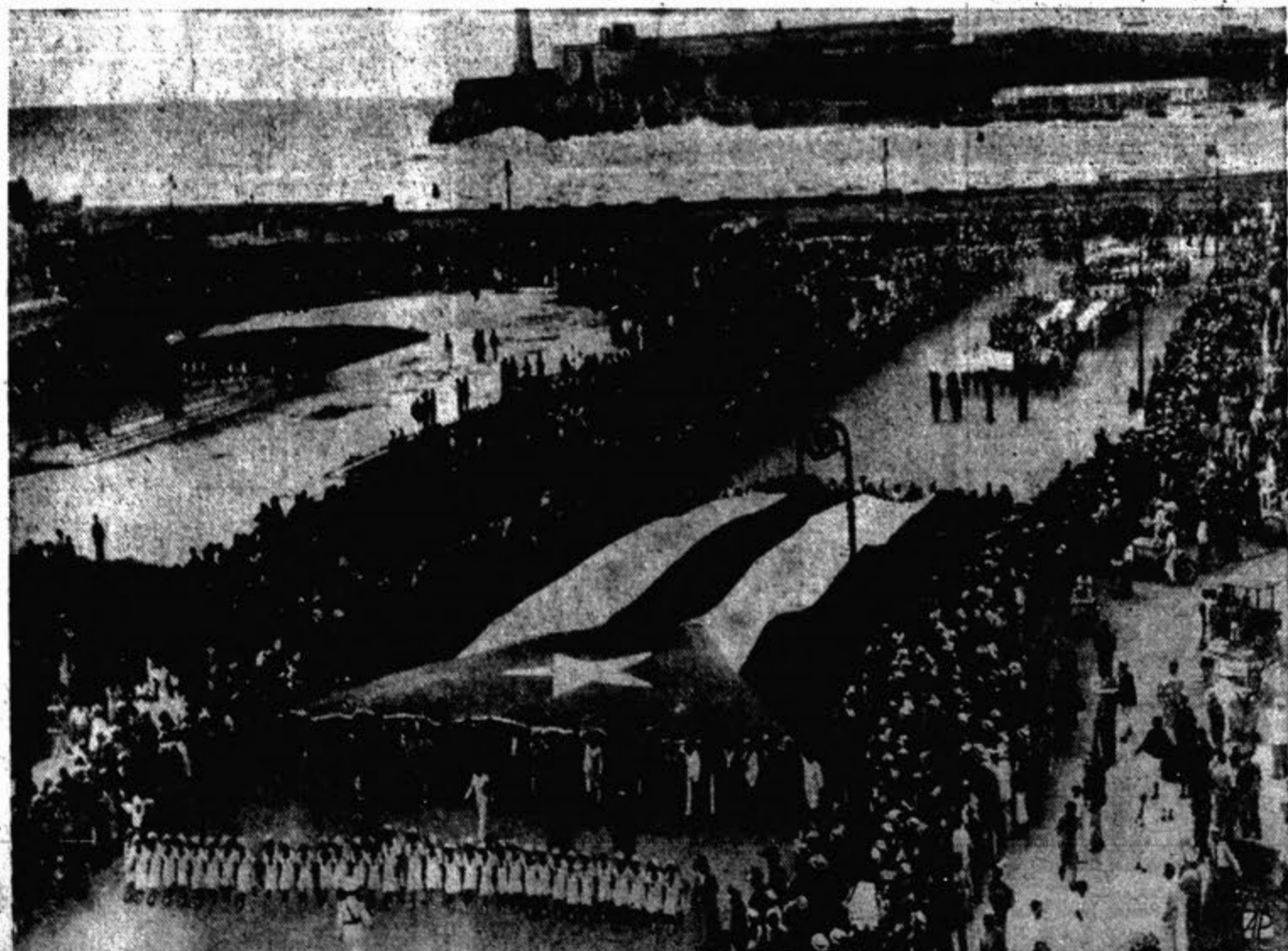
