All through my years at Northern I have consulted you and received your guidance in scheduoling my classes. The least I can do is to let you know what sort of work I am doing at present. I am employed by the Refinery Engineering Co. as a designing draftsmen. Our work is to design equipment for the petroleum refining industries. We do a lot of calculating and then draw our design on trowing paper, using pmil. To many sevisions are called for that ink is rarely used. Black line prints are used instead of blue prints so that notes may be fulted down directly on the printed drawing We have to use fairly soft pmils, ZH, H, F, because a dark line is essential. To be more specific, some of the work I have heen called upon to do is to calculate weights of empty and filled fractionating columns, design commete bases for excepment which will have stability when there is a 100 mi/hr. wind blowing, calculate the size and number of anchor bolts for stocks, and area of steel required to reinforce various consiste structures. Gight now my job is to design a gate house for a new high test aviotion gas plant. I certainly am glad that I took your course in elimintary architectural

drawing - it comes in handy for problems like this. Other problems dealt with are fluid flow, high pressure vessel disign, heat exchange equipment disign. Obviously, we do not know off hand how to design all equipment, but refer to the sperification shuts and to various handbooks morder to seure the newsory information and relations required. Sometimes we have to make studies of different phases, and do a lat of ful hand sketching to get a general idea of various passibilities. I find analytic mechanics and discriptive geometry very useful. Very generally, this work is a combination of chemical engineering, mechanical engineering, and drafting. My solary is \$200.00 a month plus overtime. We work 53 hours a week and have Tundays off. However, our work is very pleasant and time passes very guickly. Mr. McClintock, I used your name as one of my references when I applied for this work. Before closing I wish to thank you for all you have done, and for acting as my advisor while at N.M.C.E.
