Await Letter From Jerrold Regarding TV Antenna Plans

Following notification by Jerrold Electronics that "it is still planned to go ahead with a community television antenna system in Negaunee, members of the City Council and town residents this week were still awaiting a letter in which the corporation promised to outline its plans.

Notice that it still planned to continue the project was result of a decision by the Council at its special September meeting authorizing the manager to contact the corporation to determine what Jerrold was accomplishing as a result of the franchise granted to the company last spring.

In response to a telephone call Fred Lieberman, vice-president of Jerrold, sent the following telegram to the manager: "As a result of extensive signal surveys made by our engineering department at the proposed antenna site for community system, we are presently investigating and comparing features of a two-stop microwave system with aerial pictures. It is our desire to install only a system that will prove satisfactory to the people of your community and in which good service is assured. We are preparing a letter to be forwarded to the City of Negaunee next week outlining the details of work conducted to date and our proposed plans."

Lieberman in a telephone conversation also advised the city attorney that after 45 days of testing, Jerrold was still awaiting a maximum quality picture that would be suitable throughout all seasons of the year.

Jerrold was granted a franchise for the community antenna system early last spring. Since receiving the franchise, the corporation has had several engineers, using the most modern equipment, engaged in a testing program at several locations, and a lease has been

negotiated for an antenna site. James Stillwell, Jerrold representative, in an appearance before the Council, informed members the system would be designed to provide local television channels with three channel reception.

Elmer Metz, field engineer, who was directing the testing program, appeared before the council in August and stated difficulty was being encountered at that time in that the tests were being made during a period of excellent reception, and the company desired to make tests under the worst possible conditions so that good television reception would be assured on a permanent basis.

Problems peculiar to the area include the distance from stations, fading reception, topographical difficulties and seasonal effects.

The contract was for one year in which to complete the franchise.

Legislature Will Convene November 1

When the Michigan Legislature convened for a special session November 1 called by Governor C. Monson Williams, an important item of business will be a bill in activities for school teachers for the 1955-56 year, according to Rep. Dominic Jacobowitz of Negaunee.

Number one item on the agenda will be appropriation of monies from the state fund to be used to grant an immediate salary increase of not less than \$200 for the balance of the current school year to each public school teacher in Michigan, and to the high school level in Michigan, as well as in Michigan's territories.

"I am well pleased to see this item listed on the agenda, as with the number of teachers estimated at 100,000 in Michigan, it is a matter of great importance to the state," said Jacobowitz. (Continued on Page 7)

Annexation Advantages Are Cited

Negaunee Business and Professional Association members learned advantages of a proposal under consideration for the City of Negaunee School District No. 1 to annex Richmond and Negaunee township school districts in a discussion presented at their luncheon meeting Monday noon by Connie Marjama, member of the board of education, and E. W. Born, school superintendent.

Marjama and Supl. Born illustrated their comments with charts showing statistics concerning valuations of property in each of the three districts, census growth in the respective areas, growth in the number of tuition students attending the city schools from the townships, operating expenses of each district for the current school year.

Marjama pointed out that the single school district, which is under consideration, would have an estimated revenue for the school year of \$385,000, based on property valuation being approximately \$12,000,000. Plus state aid, and that the combined budgets of the three districts amounted to \$278,000, which would leave a balance of \$107,000.

Born cited the fact that statistics revealed the major share of growth had occurred in the townships in the past decade, with the school population in the city of Negaunee remaining at practically the same level. He asked that within two or three years, it is planned to eliminate payment of all tuition monies by the state.

Questioned in regard to whether the annexation program would necessitate creating new school buildings in Negaunee, the superintendent answered it would all depend on how people would react to existing facilities. At Flint, Michigan, he said, if they would not object to trans-

Board Seeks Advisory Ballot On Annexation Of 2 School Districts

Residents of Negaunee will probably have an opportunity to vote on the question of whether or not the City of Negaunee School District should annex Richmond and Negaunee townships school districts at the annual municipal election, Monday, Dec. 5, as a result of action taken by members of the Board of Education Monday night.

Meeting in a three hour session, the board finally decided to seek advice of local electors on the proposal through their expression on a special ballot, and it was decided to request permission of the City Council to hold this advisory vote in connection with the regular city election.

Action of the board climaxed a series of meetings that started last spring, when representatives of the Negaunee school governing body met with State Department of Public Instruction officials and delegates from the two township school districts.

In the interim, several sessions were held by city and township school boards, and last week a public meeting was held on the proposal in Negaunee, when the Negaunee High School Band and Alan Arroyo, E. W. Born, superintendent of schools, Monday noon.

"Speaking briefly" at the NPBA luncheon meeting, "we told members, 'I doubt if this accomplishment could be carried out in such a short period of time anywhere,' but in Negaunee, it was a marvelous feat," said Born. (Continued on Page 7)

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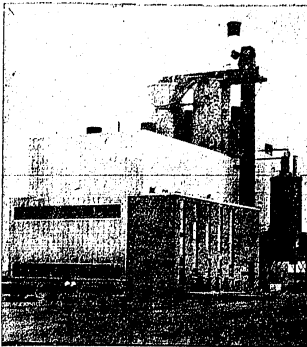

Council To Take Action On Highway Project Next Week

City Council members are expected to take action at a special meeting which will probably be held Thursday night, Oct. 27, regarding widening of Highway US 41-M 28 to 48 feet from the Rock Cut to the Paul Lake area, Irvington.

Council postponed making a decision on whether to proceed with plans for the project as a result of a letter from J. O. Schaub, assignment engineer for the State Highway Department and an discussion on provisions of Act 175, which governs financing street and highway improvements through issuance of bonds.

Several months ago the council instructed the manager to take steps necessary for completion of a contract with the State Highway Department by which the stretch of US 41-M would be widened as part of the department's 1938 program.

Council delegates to the Michigan Municipal League meeting held in Spensterville were advised it might be wise to delay action on the program pending federal grants which might reduce the municipal cost of such a project.

In his letter to the manager Schaub suggested that the city obtain from the Michigan Municipal Finance Commission a copy of its

procedures and resolution forms required under Act 175. He mentioned the improvement of 48 feet between Marquette and Negaunee was approaching its final stages and that it was expected it would be programmed for federal aid in the near future.

Act 175 which is part of the Public Acts of 1937, requires any incorporated village or city may borrow money and use same without a vote of electors for street and highway improvements Administration of the act is the responsibility of the municipal finance commission. Projects must have approval of the highway commission's office and the finance commission. Any construction projects amounting to \$3000 or more are to be designed and supervised by a registered professional engineer and funds required for payment of interest and principal on money borrowed are withdrawn from motor vehicle highway funds.

Council approved the annual contract for maintenance of state highways in the city limits authorized by R. F. Rosetti district maintenance engineer, submitting Mayor Fred Harris to sign the contract and designating Arthur Anderson as highway maintenance superintendent.

Redmen Shade Miners 14-6 For Mythical County Grid Title

Negaunee held a slight statistical edge — but Marquette capitalized on the scoring opportunities, plus a couple of dubious officiating calls and they still puffed off the most points scored in high school football games. That was the story here Thursday night as the Redmen shaded the Miners 14 to six in their mythical county championship in four hours.

Coch Roger Grove's club probably lost its ball game in the opening two minutes, when the Mizze and Blue drove to the Marquette two yard stripe and after four downs were exactly where the series started on the two yard line.
