Bell Manager Cites Dangers of Misdirected Shots by Deer Hunters

Warning was given deer hunters Wednesday by William S. Ryan, Michigan Bell Telephone manager that a careless shot, which strikes a telephone line may remove the only means of summon in an emergency.

"Just one misdirected shot can disrupt communication between cities or to a residence telephone", Ryan said, "The time it takes to summon a repairman, find, and correct the trouble may constitute the difference between life and death in a serious situation," he emphasized

Ryan pointed out that there are two forms of telephone lines which are susceptible to damage from misdirected rifle or age from misdifected fille of shotgun fire. One is lead cover-ed cable, usually about two in-ches in diameter, which is strung about 20 feet above the strung about 20 feet above the ground, The cable may contain anywhere from 16 to 2,000 pairs of wires interconnecting city telephone exchanges or a city exchange with a residential

The second form consists of uninsulated copper wires spread over a crossarm, usually about 15 feet above the ground,

"A rifle builet or shotgun charge can break either type and result in a serious curtail-ment of service," Ryan explain-

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
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
