New Manager Issues First Monthly Activities Report

Prefer's in which municipal personnel were engaged during the month of November were made public this week, when Earl P. Wagner, new city manager, released his initial monthly activities report for city departments.

Activities in each of the municipal departments were as follows:

Public Works: Portional cleaned up the sand dump; put in a culvert near Buffalo Hill; put up road markers and winter ordinance signs; stored equipment and closed Tourist Park for the winter; gravelled several alleys; put in giraffi rail posts on Nekoma Street; lowered manholes on Tobin and Jackson streets; put in blankets and concrete across L.S. & J. crossing on Baldwin Avenue; put in curb-cut on Baldwin Avenue in front of Dunbrick office; hauled sand for streets; put up snow fences; ditched along the Negaunee - Lapeer road; hauled chloride from Ironville and Lapeer; cleaned alleys; set out and filled sand barrels; plowed snow; hauled snow off streets; sanded walks; put cedar bought for city and various organizations; made wreaths and strings for Christmas decorations; started to put up Christmas decorations; cleaned the snow off the fire risk sites; cleaned a catch basin; finished flushing main sewer lines.

Water Department: In the water department, employees received

truck service line on Tobin Street and County Road; installed 4-inch gate valve at Prince of Wales location; drained plumbois at Tourist Park; drained water pipes at cemetery; repaired two leaks on Iron Street; removed snow from hydrants; set out hydrant boxes and checked hydrants. Water pumped during the month totaled 27,500,000 gallons, with the light demand for a single day occurring Nov. 25, when 1,800,000 gallons were pumped, and the low Nov. 20, when the total was 80,000 gallons.

Electric Department: Linework

was installed by electric utility personnel at the corner of Baldwin Avenue and US-41, in the Lincoln Street alley and at the substitution on Baldwin Avenue; employees installed six three-wire services, changed 22 lights, five meters, and two mercury vapor lamps.

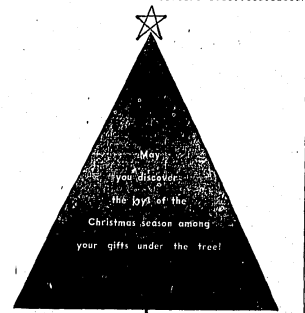
Public Library: There were 5,403 books and periodicals circulated during the month, including 3,100 juvenile pieces. The record collection is in order, and all records are in circulation at present. For Children's Book Week, Nov. 19 to 19, the bulletin board held an attractive display of new juvenile and teenage books, while other new books were placed on tables and shelves for the children to browse through and take home.

Bookmarks were given out, with a miniature copy of the poster, "Let's Read More." Four story hour gave held, with an average attendance of 19 to 20 children.

Police Department: Members of the police department issued tickets for 47 parking violations and made 23 additional arrests on the following conditions: drink, seven; drunk and disorderly, six; reckless driving, three; leaving scene of a property damage accident, one; traffic violations, eight. In addition, officers investigated 18 auto

accidents, assessed of two dues, answered 65 complaints and 172 telephone calls, reported 65 lights that were out and gave lodging to 22 persons at the city jail.

Fire Department: City firms responded to four alarms including two chimney fires, one automobile fire, and one resulting from an overloaded oil space heater. There was no insurance damage in any of the four calls. Installation of a new shaker at the city firehall was completed during the month.

Ore Shipments By North Range Pass Million Mark

Shipments of iron ore by the North Range Mining Co., which has its headquarters in Negaunee, have exceeded one million tons, amounting to 1,016,680 tons for the 1935 shipping season. It was revealed this week.

Of this total, 82,003 tons have been shipped all-rail. The total of over one million tons shipped marks the first time in several years that North Range shipments have gone over the million ton mark.

Shipments from individual mines operated by North Range during 1935 are as follows: Book Mine, 113,036; Champion Mine, 151,394; Warner Mine, 138,020; Leocadia Mine, 150,178; Puroko Mine, 270,638 tons. All-rail shipments are being continued from the Leocadia Mine during December.

Following two weeks leave the graduates will be assigned to shipboard duties or service schools depending on the qualifications each has demonstrated.

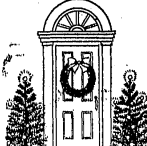

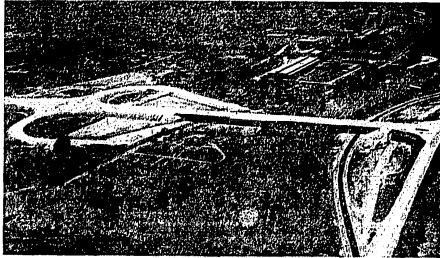
Despite its srent beauty, no setting, it seemed to them, could have been less appropriate than the sunily and sunny shores of the Mediterranean along Turkey's southern coast.

TOLEDO-NORTH EXPRESSWAY PROGRESSES



The above bridge recently completed across the Raisin River in Monroe will carry traffic through the east section of the city on the Toledo-North free expressway. This bridge is one of 31 bridge and grade separation structures on this line which stretches for 21 miles. This four-lane divided highway is being built at a cost of some \$27,000,000 in federal, state and city funds. The first contract on this route was let in the

spring of 1934. The final job will be open to traffic in the early Fall of 1936 and will ultimately connect with the projected Detroit-Chicago Expressway.

The four-lane divided extension of this Interstate highway to the north with temporary connection to Telegraph Road and the four-lane divided connection with East Street at Sibley Road will also be opened to traffic by early Fall of 1936.

MUNISING — A \$350,000 bonding proposal to finance the re-sampling of Munising's water system will come up for a vote at a special city election which has been called for February 14, 1936, by the city commission.

MANISTIQUE — Full time employes of the Manistique public school system will receive a salary increase for this year of \$20 each, it was decided at a regular meeting of the Manistique Board of Education Tuesday night. Part time employes will be given lesser but proportionate increases. The increases were made possible by an extra allocation recently from the state, based on a formula of \$9 per school membership child. All of the allocation was designated for salaries. Payment of the increase will be in a lump sum on April 1.

ST. IGNACE — Recommendations offered by Gov. G. Mennen Williams by the state ferry advisory committee felt the study of a new route for the state ferries was out of its jurisdiction and that retirement and unemployment plans could be amended to assist employes who will be relieved of their jobs when the Straits Bridge is completed.

Precautions Should Be Taken In Care of Christmas Tree

Early last January, a suburban couple were in the annual process of taking down the Christmas tree. Noticing that the

Continual training received by Swiss Army Units is credited for the exceptional fitness of her soldiers whose diligent patrolling and persistence perfect action on snow blanketed alpine slopes has demonstrated a near perfect safety record among daring, high-altitude alps and mountaineers.

Christmas Star Mystery Recalled Each December

The mystery of the Christmas Star brings popular interest in astronomy to a peak in December, says University of Michigan associate professor Hans M. Losh. And it's a mystery astronomers haven't solved yet.

"The narrative about the star is too incomplete, the date of the appearance of the star too uncertain, the early calendar too unreliable to lead us to any definite conclusions, she states. One explanation advanced is that the "star" reported to have guided the shepherds may have been a conjunction of bright planets.

At this time of the year the Earth is closer to the Sun than during the summer which tends to make our winter a little milder and the southern summer a little hotter. In spite of the fact that we are closer to the Sun

than we are in the summer the Sun's rays hit us obliquely and this lowers their force, the astronomer professor explains. Venus after its long appearance during the summer and early fall in an evening planet,

is now the "morning star." And Mars will be the bright orange object in the southwestern sky.

During December evenings some of the most beautiful and most colorful stars in the heav-

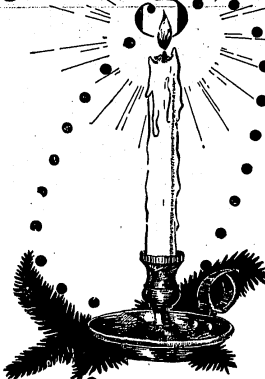
ens light up the eastern horizon. Professor Losh says, citing Orion, the great hunter, as an example. He moves the southern sky during the course of the night.

And turning to the northwestern horizon at Christmas time, the Northern Cross, Cygnus, stands in upright position with the bright star Deneb marking the top, a fitting symbol for the season, she concludes.

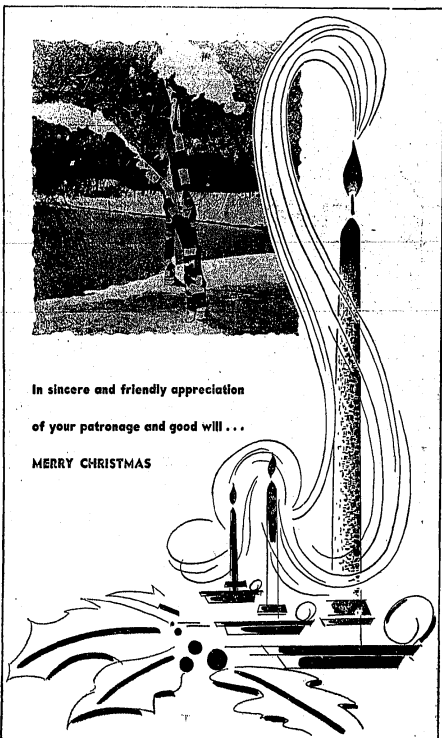

Balsam Fir Most Popular Yule Tree

Whether decorated trees originated with Martin Luther in the 16th Century or St. Boniface in the 18th century, or the prehistoric Druids, is still disputed.

Undisputed however, is the fact that these pungent green symbols of Yule cheer are popular in stonier age households as they ever were in German halls of other centuries.

Sale of 30 million Christmas trees in the U. S. annually involves farmers, conservation officials, lumber firms, shippers and even bootleggers according to a report from Cranbrook Institute, Bloomfield Hills.

Legal trees, usually seedlings thinned from timber stands owned by lumber companies, begin their trip to market in September or October as crews consisting of cutters, graders and bulldozers select camp sites for their three-month harvesting operation.

Over half of all Christmas trees marketed in the United States are balsam fir; cut in northern forests from Maine to Minnesota and cold stored months ahead or shipped directly during the holiday season.

Aside from its distinctive odor and thick pyramidal shape, the balsam fir holds its leaves longer and stands cold storage better than most other yule greens. Table size trees are often cut in August and bundled with branches tight against the main shoot. When the branches are released several months later, they spring back into shape in a few minutes with no signs of damage.

Despite these advantages, the balsam fir still shares popularity with such favorites as spruce, Scotch pine, Red pine, White pine, Douglas fir, cedar, hemlock, all of which, if bought fresh, hold their leaves well for the week or ten days of the holiday season.

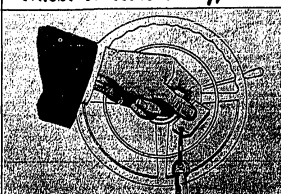

fire prevention remind the public that Christmas trees are dangerously combustible. These organizations aren't being over-cautious. They aren't like St. George, trying to take the joy out of Christmas. They know the extreme hazard of the pitch and resin filled tree, which will ignite easily and burn furiously. They see hundreds like the one above, and many which kill of lives lost and homes destroyed. They want to make sure you will have a Merry Christmas—untouched by fire.

The precautions they urge you to take with your Christmas tree are these:

1. Choose a small tree rather than a large one.
2. Store it outdoors until a day or two before Christmas.
3. When you bring it in stand it in water and set it in a cool part of the house, away from radiators, heaters and fireplaces. Don't let it block an exit.
4. Be sure every lightning set and electric cord you use is in good condition — no worn or frayed wires, no loose sockets. (Naturally you never use candles.)

5. When you buy new sets or

cords, look for the UL label. This one's that bear it have passed Underwriter's Laboratories tests for fire and shock hazards.

6. Provide a patch some distance from the tree for turning tree lights on and off.

7. Ornaments should be made of fireproof materials, like metal or almas. Never decorate with cotton or paper unless they are labeled "fireproof" or "flame-proof."

8. Never set up electric trails under the tree.

9. Don't let gift wrappings pile up under or near the tree.

10. Don't leave tree lights burning when no one is home.

11. From time to time, see whether needles near the lights have started in bare brown. If so change the position of the lights.

12. When needles start to fall, take the tree down and discard it — outdoors!

Christmas Began in Ancient Town on High Mountain Plateau

Christmas had its beginning in an ancient little town high on a mountain plateau, where few birds sing.

Bethlehem which is only 14 miles from the David Sea, is situated as high above those waters as Denver is above sea level. The area is so intensely cold at the end of December that shepherds, who still scour the mountainside, take their flocks: into sheepfolds or caves at night.

When Jesus was born, Bethlehem was still devoted to a large extent to a combination of buildings and caves. Prof. J. Alexander Findlay, of Manchester, England, in his contribution to the monumental Abingdon Bible Commentary, described the type of stable in which Joseph and Mary took refuge when there was no room for them in the inn.

"By the 'stable', this scholar explained, 'he meant the entrance to one of the village houses, in which the animals are tethered in rough weather. On each side of the steps leading up to a higher level and further inside, a pit dug in the floor contains the animals' food.

"These are the mangers; you must think of Mary as giving birth to Jesus in a narrow space near the cottage door, while up the steps the people to whom the house belonged were living as usual."

Bethlehem today is a prosperous town in the center of a fertile district. It is known for its wine, which is considered among the best in Palestine. Most of the people are Christians. The Church of the Nativity contains the Grotto of the Nativity to mark the site of Jesus' manger. But when Jesus was born, Bethlehem was best known as the City of David. It had been the early home of David and his neighbors Issai, Abinai and Asabel. The town had figured in history from the time it was Garrisoned by the Philistines at the time of Saul. It is just five miles south of Jerusalem in the district which was the scene of the story of Ruth.

The birth of Jesus lifted Bethlehem from temporary obscurity. It became a place to which invaders respected it for centuries. Justinian built a wall around the town in 531 A.D. The Persians spared the city in 614 and the Arabs accorded it similar respect in 638. However, when the crusaders made their advance on Jerusalem in 1099, they occupied Bethlehem in the invitation of the inhabitants.

THE NATIVE LAND of Saint Nicholas— "Santa Claus," as his name has come to be written and pronounced in America— will honor him this Christmas by issuing a special stamp through the government's Post Office Department. If you're surprised to read that the North Pole has a post office, the explanation is that we're not referring to the North Pole, for St. Nick's native land was far from there; indeed, he was born in sunny Turkey, in the palm-covered province of Antalya on the Mediterranean. The above portrait is found in Turkey in the church where he served as a bishop until his death in 342 A.D. Renowned for his many kind deeds, and especially for his loving generosity towards children, the good bishop has become a legendary figure in the folklore of many nations. To accommodate the many travelers who visit the church, located in the blue mountains of the city of Demre, the Turkish government has constructed a new road.

Biblical tradition is very rich in the ancient lands of Turkey. In the city of Antioch, where the followers of Christ first called themselves Christians, the site where St. Peter led the first Mass can still be seen. Many other saints, including the Apostles Paul, John, James, Luke and Barnaby were born in this region. Mary, Mother of Christ, retired after the Crucifixion to the city of Ephesus, where her abode has been excavated and opened to the public by the Turkish government.

Safety Factor Important in Party Plans

For homes, churches, schools and places of business planning holiday parties, the National Board of Fire Underwriters today strongly recommended that fire safety be made just as much a part of those plans as the decorations or refreshments.

Holiday parties, explained the Board, often center around a Christmas tree and because such trees are extremely con-

sumable, these safety rules are suggested:

1. Don't let the tree up near any stairway or elevator shaft which would provide a draft.
2. The tree should not block a door or any exit.
3. Someone in authority should inspect the tree every day to determine whether it should be left up for a longer time.
4. Be sure plenty of sastrays are provided for smokers. Don't allow smoking near the tree.
5. See that all decorations in the room have been flameproofed.

An added fire hazard exists if dresses, costumes or children's

clothes made of net or gauze-like fabrics are worn. If it is impossible to avoid wearing them, they should be made flame resistant with the following solution. Mix 3 ounces of borax and 4 ounces of boric acid in a gallon of water. Dip the fabric in the solution, wring by hand then hang to dry. Ironing does not affect the flame resistance of the fabric, but the treatment must be repeated after each laundering.

A word of caution. Don't expect too much from the term flame resistant. If you hold a match to such material, it will burn. But it will not continue to

Wise Men Who Traveled To Crib Were Persian Priests

The wise men of the story of Christmas were, according to Bible scholars and historians, Persian priests versed in the arts of magic and astrology.

An interesting explanation of the Wise Men was given by Prof. J. Newton Davies of Drew University in the *Ashington* Bible Commentary.

"The Jews through their exiles," Prof. Davis observed, "may very well have influenced Zoroastrian and Persian thought. And there are evidences that the people of the East, were expecting a world deliverer to appear in the West who would usher in a golden era of world peace."

"It is true also that the Persians believed that the coming of a great hero was heralded by the appearance of a striking star, as was the birth of Alexander the Great.

"Whatever may have been the nature of the original event here

described, (Matthew 2:1-12) the narrative has an abiding value which we must not overlook. It suggests that the Babe of Bethlehem is to be a magnetic power to draw the Gentiles as well as the Jews and that those men are deservedly called wise who in small beginnings see great possibilities, and who realize that life reaches its zenith in the admission of Him who deserves the homage of our hearts and choicest gifts that

we can bestow. "They also are wise who shun that spirit of worldliness whose purpose it is, as illustrated in the spirit of Herod, to destroy all that Bethlehem represents in life."

Will Divide Salary Funds Salary Funds Will Operate

Additional money made available by the legislature for public schools personnel salary increases will be divided four ways in Negaunee as a result of action taken by the Board of Education, Supt. E. W. Born has announced.

With the legislature voting an appropriation of \$9 per student enrolled in the system, board members decided to divide the Negaunee share of approximately \$12,102 in four parts with teachers, secretarial help, custodians, and bus drivers receiving increases.

Board members have also given the superintendent approval to institute a program designed to help handicapped children in the

Negaunee system. According to the superintendent, Negaunee has been approved by the State Department of Public Instruction for a handicapped program, which means that from 60 to 75 per cent of the salary for the instructor, who would teach these children, would be paid by the state.

Supt. Born reported that for the second consecutive year, Negaunee has a 100 per cent membership in one professional organization, the Michigan Education Association, and that this year membership has doubled in a second professional group, the National Pabst Association.

At their regular December meeting, board members approved payment of claims and accounts for November totalling \$15,408. This marks the first time in several years that the school system has been able to keep its bills current and is the result of a change in the method of receiving state aid payments. For the last several years, the board was forced to table bills submitted during the fall quarter until local tax money became available in December.

Carl Johnson Will Operate Taxi Service

Meeting in special session, members of the Negaunee City Council granted permission to Carl O. Johnson to operate a taxi service in the community to replace that which was available to the public from Belmore Taxi Co., until six weeks ago when the Marquette concern ceased operations here.

In granting permission for the service to Johnson, the council stipulated that he must operate the business in accordance with terms of the municipal ordinance, which includes in its provisions that the operator must carry liability insurance; that drivers must have a permit from the city recorder; that each applicant for a permit must pass a physical examination, and that cabs must be inspected for their mechanical

conditions, particularly in regard to brakes, power and lights, as well as insure safety and dependability to the public.

Council took no action on the question of rates, which were established for taxi service in 1952, Leonard Hill, who at the regular December meeting of the municipal governing body had also applied for a license, notified the council that he wished to withdraw his application.

Johnson will have his cab offices located at the corner of Iron and Gold Streets in the same quarters occupied by the previous cab company. He plans to operate three vehicles.

Board Seeks Action on Annexation

Members of the Negaunee Board of Education, following approval of the annexation proposal in a special advisory vote have requested the Michigan Legislature to take action necessary to make the program possible.

In order for annexation to become effective, the first step would be for the Legislature to repeal the act, which created the Negaunee school district.

The request will be presented to the state governing body at its regular session in January, but if the bill moves through normal channels it will probably require 60 days before action is taken.

Assuming the Legislature will repeal the act, the Negaunee Board of Education has authorized that separate invitations be issued to the Richmond and Negaunee Township school districts to annex. As a result of the two townships, residents in township school districts will vote separately, rather than jointly on the proposal.

Once the invitations are issued, according to the school laws, hearings of educationalists in each of the townships must hold elections on the question within a 60-day period. If township voters approve the measure it becomes effective. In this event, it is hoped the program can be placed in effect by July 1, 1956, which marks the beginning of a new school fiscal year.

New Phone Directories Are in Mail

New Ishpeming - Negaunee telephone directories for 1956 were mailed out to subscribers in the two communities yesterday of this week, William S. Ryan Bell manager has announced.

This year's printing numbers 7,700 copies, an increase of 500 over the total required for distribution last year. Large spaces are provided in the front of each book, where fire and police telephone numbers may be written.

Users reminded telephone customers to destroy the old books after the new ones arrive, but cautioned patrons to remove valuable papers or notes from old directories before destroying them.

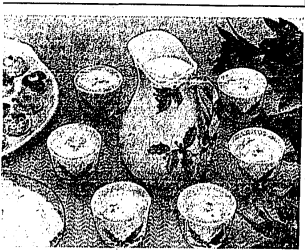

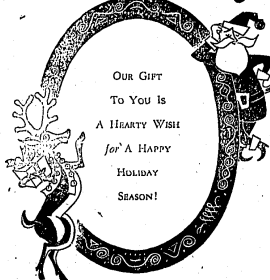

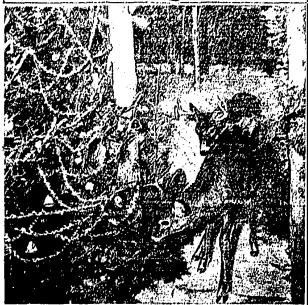

Statistics Compiled On Snow Removal

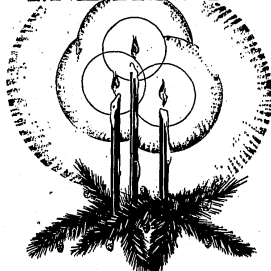

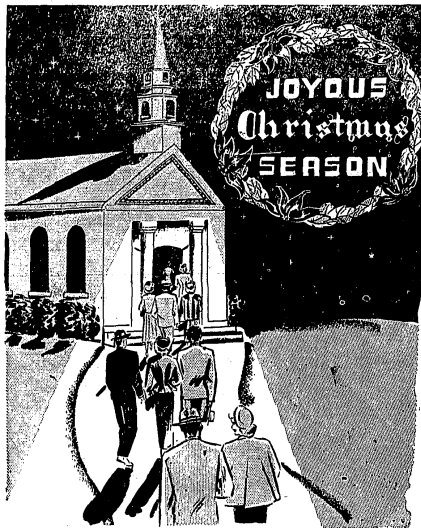

Driver Education Program Recommendations Received

E. W. Born, Negaunee Public Schools superintendent, announced this week that recommendations have been received from the Michigan Department of Public Instruction regarding the new driver education program, which is scheduled to get under way in the local system with the opening of the second semester.

According to the superintendent, the legislative act is one of the most comprehensive laws covering driver education in the United States, and includes the following provisions:

1. It provides a state subsidy for the courses, up to \$25 per pupil, in any public high school.
2. It sets a course in driver education as a requirement for any person under 18 years of age to obtain an operator's license later Feb. 1, 1957.
3. It makes driver education courses compulsory in the public schools.
4. The course must be available, tuition free, to all pupils enrolled in private and parochial schools, or out-of-school youth under the age of 18.

According to the recommendations, classroom instruction should be not less than 30 clock hours. This would mean that schools with 50 minute class periods would have to run the course for 30 periods.

Behind - the - wheel training would consist, on the average, of not less than six hours, with not more than four students in the car with the instructor.

Entertainment will be made to public school districts on the basis of special reports submitted to the superintendent of public instruction at the close of the school year.

Determination as to whether credit shall be offered for driver education courses is placed within the authority of the local school district. It was suggested, however, since this must become a full and legitimate course in the school curriculum, that it be considered for credit like any other subject.

It is recommended also that

schools be permitted to offer this program the full 12 months of the year, if necessary to meet local needs, with subsidy for the program regardless of the time of year or day it is offered.

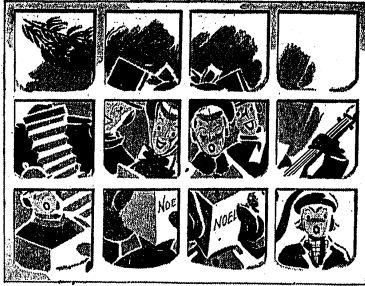
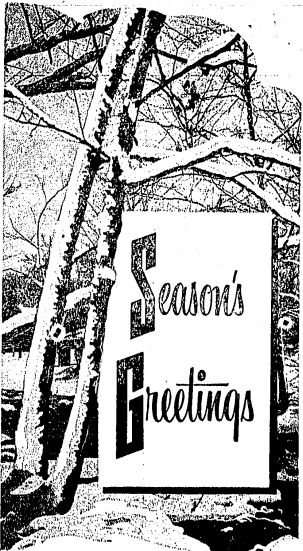

Local Community Building Safe Firm Says

In the opinion of representatives of the firm which took soil samples underneath the Negaunee Community Building, there is no immediate danger to the structure as a result of subsidence beneath the foundation. City Manager Earl Wagner told members of the Negaunee City Council at their regular December meeting.

Wagner related to the council information, which he had obtained in a conversation with Raymond Patterson, representative of Intrusion-Prepakt, Inc., the firm which the governing body engaged to take soil samples of the ground underlying the Community Building, after George E. Michels, Jr., former manager, revealed that cracks had developed in the wall of the structure.

"According to figures supplied me by Mr. Patterson as a result of Intrusion-Prepakt's soil sample program, the company would supply three operators with the city furnishing additional labor necessary on a program to reinforce the foundation of the building," Wagner said.

"However, it is his opinion that for the present the city should continue to watch the building carefully, and it is not necessary to spend any money on it. This is all new to me and I believe you should have a report from Mr. Patterson when he is available to attend one of your meetings."

Acting on the suggestion of the

manager, the council tabled the matter until it could meet with the representative from Intrusion-Prepakt to discuss the project.

Council received to canvass the vote cast in the annual municipal election, with the canvassing committee reporting that G. 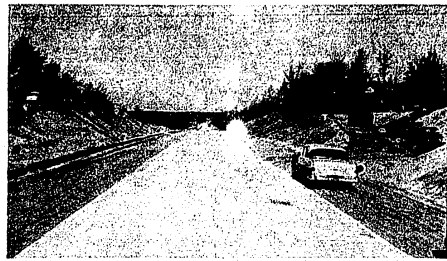

NEW RIBBON OF CONCRETE INTO THE NORTHLAND



Five miles of new 24 ft. concrete pavement 8 inches thick, reinforced with steel from Grouting south on US-27 was opened to traffic on December 22.

This section is a part of the ultimate four-lane divided Interstate Highway from Detroit to the Straits of Mackinac, State Highway Commissioner Charles H. Zieher said.

This new pavement roughly parallels the old section of road which is narrow with many steep

hills and poor sight distance. It is visible on the right in the distance. On the left the picture shows the new road and the old road. The new road is graded and affords clear vision the entire length of the section.

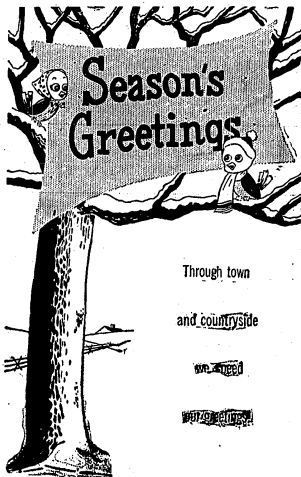

Bell Telephone Expects Record Holiday Volume

better illumination than a gang of juice-wasting overhead lamps.

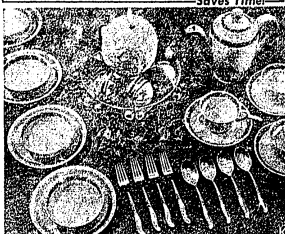

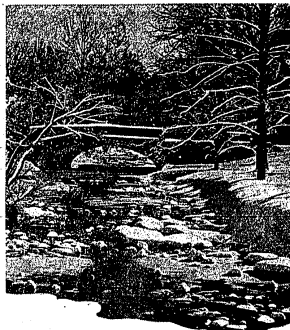

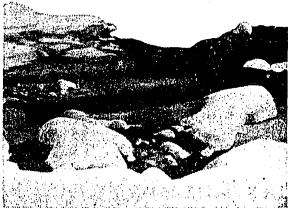
