Dear Brother its being Sunday
I thought I would write a few
lines to you I had a letter
from Mrs Bartlett a few days
ago she has sent to me for
money for Josephine I cant
understand why there was
know money for Josephine when
Mr Kings came to Dixon when
I left Dixon there was sixteen
dollars and 35 cts in your hands
according to your figuring
and I sent you twenty four
dollars after I went to Germa
ntown four dollars was for
yourself whitch made thirty six
dollars and 35 cts and ten doll
ars for Elda and about seven
dollars or near it on the

Box that was sent to
Seamanstown which leaves
about twenty dollars now
what has become of the rest
of the money but I will say
no more about it now I
will wait untill I hear
from you before I say anyth
ing more it is getting to be
quite cool wether now it
freez the ground last night
there was quite a turn
out a few days ago to
see a spier hung he
went upon the gallows plat
form as if he was a going
on tref parade Charley
has sent after the Box a
few days ago I dont know
whether we will get it
or not most all provisions
is high here untill the
railroad is fixt which

will take some time Butter
and chise is not to be had at
any price we have been living
on short rations since we cam
e to this place this has once
been quite a business place
come to go over it it is larger
than Dixon there is one cotton
factory in operation here
cotton clerth is fifty cts per
yard at the factory there
is quite a nice court house
here good ways ahead of the
Dixon courthouse I should not
wonder if our Brigade stayed
here all winter with some
artillery and Cavalry the rest
of the Division be scatered up
and down the railroad to near
Secater answer this as soon as
you get it if you have time
