## Stephanie Lucarelli's interview with Sid Holman

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Me: This is Stephanie Rucarelli February 7, 1993.
I'm interviewing sidney Holman. The purpose of this interview is for the Red Dust project. And it a personal interview. The location of interview is downtown Ishperning at the 96th District Court.

me: when and where were you born?

Sid: 1930, as a matter of fact october 30th Devils night, 1930 in Negaunee. I was living in Negaunee, I was living in Negaunee, I was born in Ishpeming hospital.

me: what were your parents names?

sid: my dads name was Joesph and my mother's name was Louisa.

me: what are the names of your brother's & sisters? And how many did you have?

sid: I was the eleventh. A, the only one that was born in the huspital. The first one was Arthur he died at age a when my parents, shortly after my parents came here from England. And my oldest sister is murile she is 80,83 living in Califonia.

Sid: And next is my sister may who is married and living in Kockford, Illinois who has been married for 55 years. My oldest had her 60th anniversary out in California. And I'm pointing out these marrigaes so you'll see the changes that have taken place in social aditudes. Compared with my family to the way families are today. So after may then was my brother Joe he's a lives in Negaunee. He's a widower his wife died a couple years ago, they had been married for 55 years. Then A, my sister Eveshe died in 1965 lung Concer, smoker. My brother Gorden who's 75 and lives in Marquettee, he's been married close to 50 years Twins, murt who lives in Negaunce been married close to 50 years, Milt lives in skandia his twin. is a widower. My sister Mitsey who lives in California is a widow. She had been married close to 50 years. My bother BOD who retired from prison, nesgot, Hes been married for 45 years. And that's the family.

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me: when were you married? If so, when and where?

Sid: I was married in the St. Pauls Church in Negaunee on Goundhogs, Day February 2,1952.

me: what is your spouces name?

sid: marry Mary Thomson

me: what did your parents do for a living? sid: my dad was a minor all his life he

worked in the tin mines in England. Then he came here and worked in iron mines in Negauinee.

me: where did you go to school?

sid: Negaunce High school.

me: what are some special memories do you have of

growing up in this area! Sid: When we were young we had ganges. Little

different from the gangs we have today. We'd get-together, we'd be called like the Cherry Street gang or the Kaye Street gang. It's a groupe of kids that got together and

playing together they were boys & girls playing together.

Sid: There was, they were friends we'd get together at the bottom of the street and have foot-ball games or at night we'd chose up sides and play chase. Have two tecins one would chase the other one around the neighbor hood at night until they caught them all usually that would take the whole night. Also had a game called kick the can with all the kids would get out and play kick the can, which you guys probably never herd of playing. It was always visiting and playing together. Naturally there was no television. we could go out north of Negaunel when we were very young gor 10 years old. Go out fishing in little cricks out there and catch Brook Trout. When the water was pure you could drink water out of the cricks. In kaye Street there was a long block on kaye street in Negaunee Ithere: I would imagine that there were 150 or 200 kids on that one block. There were not any porperty crimes

Sid: And I think you have another question there about now things have changed now and along the way?

me: what special fetures stand out in your mind about the cities of Ishpeming and Negaunee From when you were younger.

Sid: The only thing I remember about Ishpeming was the chacolat shop, over on main Street there. I remember being there once or twice when I was a kid. In Negaunee, We were never down town, we just never went to town we always stayed in our neighbor hood and played with the kids or we went out to the bush.

me: How have the cities changed?

Sid: How have these towns changed!

me: Yean.

sid: well you take a look at Negaunee up where we lived on kaye Street got caucal in up there and so that whole the reighbor hood got moved right after the cave in Started. Lucky the houses didn't go with it.

sid: And then that's on the east end of Negaunee up on the west end of Negaunee that's all blocked off and blockcated. There was caving grounds up there. Down town Negaunee there's practicly nothing left to it any more, it's totally changed.

me: what kind of things did you and your friends to for entertanment when you

were teenogers?

sid: fet me see, when I was a teenager besides doing a lot of hunting and fishing. we had a , one of my friends had a car, two of my friends had cars their parents cars. That they got to use once in a while so we'd ride around in those things. Not much but once in a while we were a level to do that. But of coarse I went in the army when I was IT years old so you know.

me: where did the kids like to houng out in town when you were a teenager?

sid: we were in the neighbor hoods, we never went down town, there was no. As a teenager ok, as a trenager we went to marquettee there was a dance hall. There called the K.C., Knights of Columbus. Used to sponsore Friday night clance in marquettee. That's where we went to when we were a teen.

me: As a child and your later years did you have any spaceific accupations that you wated wanted to do?

Sid: Yean, I wanted to be a soilder, most of my life I wanted to be a soilder

me: Do you have any interesting or humorious strestories to share about these early days in Ishpeming or Negawnee?

Sid: well I can't think of I don't know, what value judgement, what's interesting? I know what's interesting to me and what's interesting to people now a days? interesting to what would you think any-for example what would you think any-thing that I found interesting as a thing that I found interesting.

sid: so I really don't know what I could say was ineresting to me as a kid. I know what inerested me as a kid was hunting and fishing even in those days.

me: How old were you when you found your first job? And where did you work?

Sid: My first job I was 12 years old. I had 3 residences that I took distributioned cute grass and in the winter & Shurled Imaw.

Me: where were these places?

Sid: Two were on Main Street in Negaunee.

That is where the elet lived up in Negaunee.

One was another residences in Negaunee where a minning captain lived at the time. And insadently my first pay day I bought apint of \_\_\_\_\_ icecream as \_\_\_\_ dairy. For my mother, that's the first thing I bought

me: what types of auties did you preform on your first job?

Sid: Cutting grass, raking leaves, shuveling snow.

me: How many jobs did you have in your life time, and what where they, and what was the most important one?

Sid: Well the, as a teenager later on I worked for Bannon Cleaners in Negaunee Until I went into the curmy. So I put almost five years in the army and a found the \_\_\_\_\_ for the court room and wound up in Korea and the war in Korea. And when I came home from there I worked in the mine for under ground iron mine worked in the mine for under ground iron mine for a years. And Following that I went back for a years. And Following that I went back to school because I was a drop out. Then I stard where as probation officer. And I can't say one was more important than the other I think the most enjoyable job I had was under ground iron mining.

me: what stands out most in your mind about your first job?

sid: I think it was the person I worked for he was, he was a very understanding fellow. He really tought me now to do things well in the yord new he wanted it cleaned up and so so and very patent:

me: were you ever in the millitary, if so please discribe you'r experiences there.

Sid: 1947 November 1 that was a days ofter I 17 years old I had droped out of high school. At that time they were still taking the service so I joined That further training in lamp Lee Virginia. And on June 6 1948 I was on a troop Ship going under the Golden Gate Bridge, I was Still 17. The day that my regular class was graduating high school I heading over seas. I went to Japan, they landed in Japan first which took 8 day & 8 hours on that troop ship why I remember that I don't know. From there after the troops did some \_\_\_\_ I went to korea. We were in Korea until 1949 and then they pulled the troops out of korea back to Japan. And I supposed to come nome June 27, 1950. \_\_\_\_\_ so as it turned out on? June 1950 North Korea invaded the south so the scrambled us up and flew us back in there into Korea landed in a place called Supph which is a little similed air strip out in the middle of the rice patties. And the dumped us off there.

And the way I remember things occurring may not even be the way the happened. I'mean time has a way of doing things to memories. So there are some things that occurred that if I don't know if its the way it happend or! I read it some where you can't really be sure of that. But I did reside a browns star. A metal with a V for valide. When we first got there they gave us some guade 50s with four 50 calibure machine guns and a mount, just to stash around this air Strip cause the North Korecins at that time had a air force and the came over several times of day booming we national had to use the guns against burge them. We did shoot down two of those planes. My crew snot down two planes. After that was pull out of there we had to abandon all of the equimpment and destroy it as best as we ean could and take off browse there was only 47 of us that went in there origanly. So we weren't much of a match for the old North Korean army so we splite we headed down south on fout. And later on we got back to Japan for refitting, requipment, requipment and so forth. And then they threw us back to korea agian.

Sid: so I was over there over seas for 39 month and I came back I think in 1951 September Of 51 something the like that really. And I came nome on a 30 day furlow and during my second night home & was a passenger with a drunk driver who hit a lamp post in vegaunce and I in the curmy so they now covered all the medicial expensise. I was discharged from the army in 1952.

me: now many total years did you work in your life time and when did you retire?

Sid: I just retired this January 23 1993. I've been working for ever it sums like since & was 12 years old Lie teen working. But Full time gain full employment I've never been out of work. Except for surgery I had broken back when I was working in the mine. I had surgery on that a couple of times. But outside of that I've worked full time from the time I went in the army to aged 17 to right now. me: when you were working on the mine what special

duties did you have?

Sid: I was mining I would be consistive drilling and blasting and scraping out iron one and Standing timber to make it safe in there so the roof wouldn't fall and it wouldn't aul in one you. We'd dill it the back you'd call it the roof. And as one insecunt I did new a troken tack I mad surgery om it, twice. The last time I had surgery I was nome recuperating. I had a body cost on at that time the miner shut down. So that left me kinda dangelling on a string. which at that time promptiel me to go back and get my night school daploma from Negaune after the minus shut down and following that I went to Northern and graduated from Northern.

me: Did the mining job require any special training?

Sid: No, it was om the job train. Me: cluring your life time where were you employed the languat?

Sid: Mining

He: How or why did you chose the career?

sid: Boy Live asked my self that a lot of times. when I graduated from Northern there was an opening well mod started as a voulenter probation officer with the probation officer in Marquettle of worked there for a short time then an opening come a long for a part time probation officer with Marquettel county. It was trul at the time the federal program continuated think it was inishally it was CDTL dom't even know what it stantilled think thats where the men grant come from for the new probation officer. So I started there working in Marquetter for a few months and then d' came to dishpining in suptember of 74. To open the office here supposed to have been on a part time ball. But it was never part time it was always full load. To that how & got started in this job.

Me: During these cureer is there anything you'cl like to go back and do over?

Sid: well you there are semil things I would have dome diffrently but I dom't know if it could have been dome diffrently. Aditudes in this profession people change also, when I first started in probation the adituid was that anybody that was

Sid: on probation I think I wom't go om any furthur then that but you there are some changes that I would have definately dome diffrent.

me: In much detail as posible discribe your main dutile of your job.

Sid: This job, my job is to imforce the orders of the court. what ever the court orders to defendent to do its the proportions officers job to see that there carried out.

me: Did this for require any special training if so please descibe the training.

Sid: Four years at morthern criminal justice and phycoligy minor is what & have. I suppose, you you have to have a four year degree mow. To become a probation officer.

He' what special equipment or clothing did this job require?

Sid: No special equipment.

Me: What was the most rewarding part of your career? Sid: Pereadicly people drop by to see my when the

Sid: Om ome coccusion the police officers from I shpeming the chief of police. At the time usually from Ishpeming came over here with a bullet proty vest for me and Iscorted me nome, and I had to make arangements for my family to be the where for a couple of mights. Ballul there was some information that there was a quote "contract" on probation officer. So the police socural my residence for a couple of nights until this thing blew over. And I wasn't really sure if it was lagitamite or mot. But the person who supposaly had set this up was latter are sted in Illinois for killing a gry down later are sted in Illinois for killing a gry down there I suppose he was capable.

Me: How did the duties of you job change over the

years?

Sid: The cluties remain the same it's a matter of how, now you preform them. Early in my correct of probation officer it was all them not a slack. Make sure he dose precise what he's gonna do or also he gost to jail period. As thing progressed and as I became more exposed to other people who were in the same exposed to other people who were in the same field. I became owever that the job was not to return a guy to jail, but to keep him out of jail.

Sid: And to try to get them into some type upprisgrams the would enable him to stay out of joil. You it wown't a drastice change or anything the Adituide when I first got into this job.

Me: Did your put you and your family in any digorouse situations? If so please describe.

sid: will I mentioned that one all ready you can the place one.

He'. Phuse discribe what your co-workers were like. Sid: oh the people in this office and Marquettee. for example when I first started here when I walked into District court there was one magistrate & one clurk & one baylife & one court reported and they were all one person. aynn Ketchem did all those things and when I started she kind of voulenterd to be probation secretary also because there was no probation Sercitries. So she put on another hat and she even had taken these presentinces home that I dia. And presentences that and interview you do with a person to get background information. So you can give record to the court, so she would take the information name and type it on her own time and there was no extra pay for that she just did it. And the people that are very coapperative. Helped me always been very coapperative. Helped me always without every asking mesages without every asking for any of their or anything in return new just did it

Sid: With out them it just would never had worked. He: could you describe some humerious or interesting events that nappend during your correct.

Sid: Ya, me retirement party that was about the most interesting & suprising thing I ever ran into - I never expected anything like it to happen. At the party there were I had been involved with over the years. The diffrent police officers from diffrent agences were there. The was one person there who spoke that night he indicated that in 1975 after his secend visit with the probation officer he decided to get sober. He talked about it and what a drunk he was a the time. And now he woke up on morning and his car was smashed and he had no recolation of getting nome even he get arested for it and he want and threw some programs and he wound up in AA and ne stayed with AA right to this day. And on that night he presented me with a little camel a small tie tack camel which is indickitive of surbrity. The being camel the animal that can go the longest without a drink, you know? And his talk that night was very impresive. You the people that I've worked with all these years the police aginces and so forth name been most helpful along the way. Without them also this program would not work if the police agencise Mr. At any time did you feel like changeing your career, why or 2. Sid: well I guess I really couldn't change the career. The physical problems that I had because of my back surgery would limit what I could do and who would him to make the career.

Not necur as much as I used too. But I did three & one half miles this morning daily, I like to get out daily. And I do a little best of weight lifting so I don't get soggy. And I guess that's my total interests.

Me: Have you been involved in any clubs, organization or sport leagues, if so please describe them.

Sid: I belong to the U.P. Road Runners Association. And I Had done a lot of Running in the past I belong to the Neguanee Eagles. I belong to the Veterians of Forgon wars, I belong to Desaibled Veterians of Foreign wours, I think that's all the organizations that I belongs too.

Me: what special moment are a pourt about this aspect of your life?

Sid: About the organizations I belonged to? Me: Yes.

Sid: I have never been a real strong member. I clon't much with the organizations, I just belong. The Road Runner I was very active in there. It's a different type of individual that you see there. The one Race I remember in Wegaunee was a 10 k race there were probable 350-300 people there, a lot of young people. I'm talking from 8 years old and up. And after the race we got together in the gym & they handed cutall the awards. And these young people, I'm sure I will never see any of those people in the probation Departartment, They are just a different attitude, they are mutivated, they belong to something. were as the people that wound up on probation Generally they never had a chance to get involved in something like that. They never had that motivation. So, you the Road Runner program I think that I favor that program.

Sid: well I guess the foundest memories of my working days, age From the people that I worked with. Like I mentioned before how helpful they have been. They are good people. I still come back to visit them.
