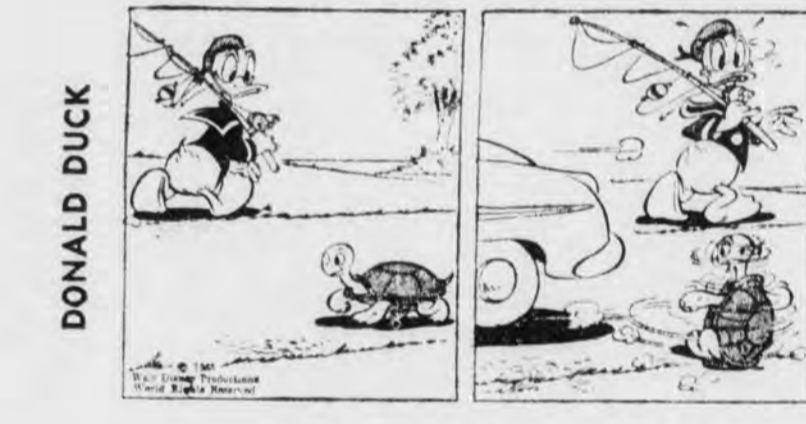

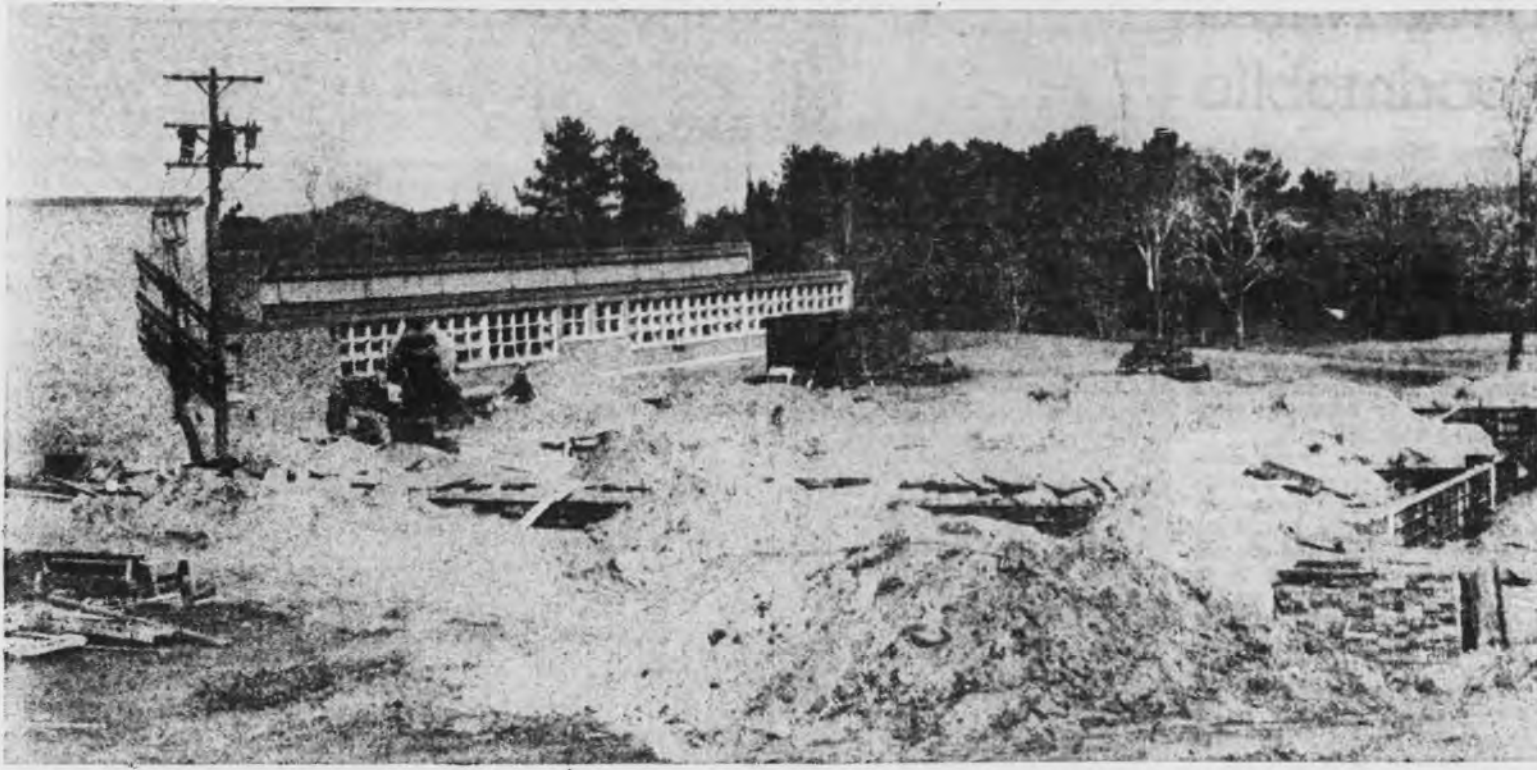

Work Progressing Rapidly On \$125,365 Addition To W. M. Whitman School



Work on the \$125,365 addition to Whitman School was slowed earlier this year by bad weather, but is now moving full speed ahead. Proksh Construction Co., Iron River, is the general contractor. Specifications call for completion of the six rooms by Aug. 1, with a \$100-

Cleanup Set Tuesday In Precinct 7

Public works department crews will be in precinct 7 tomorrow conducting the city's spring pickup.

Precinct 7 is bounded on the south by Hewitt Ave. extended, on the north by Center St. extended, on the east by Lake St. and on the west by the city limits.

Six of the city's ten precincts have already been covered in the pickup operations.

The "pickup by precincts" project winds up the public works department's post-winter task of cleaning the city's streets.

At the same time, the project helps residents rid their yards of rakkings and trash.

Almost any type of item, except for brush over four feet in length, is being picked up by city crews. Rakkings are being picked up from the edge of the street, near the curb, and trash for pickup should be placed near the curb, but not on the street.

Work Readied For Relaying Tracy Ave. Sanitary Sewer

Stakes were set for the relaying of the sanitary sewer on Tracy Ave. north of Norwood St. and for the lowering of the sanitary sewer on Eighth and Center Sts. by the city engineering department last week.

The sanitary sewer work is necessary because the new Northern Michigan University roadway crosses the main.

This and other information is contained in the weekly report today of City Manager Thomas Moore.

During the past week the engineering department also set the curb grade for a property owner at the corner of Schaffer and Norwood Sts.

Street Grade Set — The street grade for Gray St. between Mildred and Elm Sts. was also set by the engineering department and surveys were run to establish street grades on Lynn and Birch Sts. between Fair Ave. and Waldo St.

Excerpts from the reports of other municipal department activities during the past week follow:

Public works — Guard rails on U. S. 41 were repaired and paved streets were also repaired. Streets and catchbasins were cleaned and shoulder maintenance was conducted on U. S. 41. Repairs were made to equipment and traffic signs. Street signs, and meter posts were made.

Water and sewage — Taps included a three-quarter inch tap on Lynn St., two three-quarter inch taps on Granite St., two three-quarter inch taps on the sludge line at the sewage plant, and a one-inch tap on W. Bluff St. A portion of the 10-inch main at the corner of Eighth St. and Center Sts. was maintained. During the week, 15,536,000 gallons of water were pumped. At the sewage disposal plant, the crew steamed out sludge and recirculation lines which were partially plugged.

Parks and recreation — Spring cleanup of picnic areas was started and cleanup of the Palestra grounds, the north Marquette ball field and tourist park were completed. Foundations for markers were conducted at the cemetery.

Finance — Conducted extensive work in establishing employment date in connection with longevity pay.

Assessor — Continued spreading the 1963 school tax levy on the tax and assessment rolls.

Health — Physical exams given at schools numbered 71. Ten minor treatments were administered and 24 referrals were made to private physicians.

Police — Arrests, misdemeanors 12, traffic 56, accidents 5; investigations, larceny 2, accidents 13, disturbances 32. Five concealed weapons permits were issued, four road tests were administered and escort services were provided six times. The dog warden picked up 12 dogs and disposed of 15. Two dogs were claimed and two remained in the pound at the end of the week. Eleven other animals were disposed of.

Clerk — Issued four dog licenses, three city licenses, and recorded 12 birth certificates and three death certificates.

Court — Handled 25 traffic violations, 14 misdemeanors, one felony and one civil case. The violations

bureau handled 15 meter violations and 11 restricted parking violations.

Fire — One chimney, three rubbish fires at city dump, one heating apparatus, four grass and brush and two charcoal fires. Housecleaning of both stations was completed and two inspections were made. State fire marshal rules and regulations for flammable liquids were issued to 14 bulk service plants.

Light and power — Line crews completed the cut over of line on Kaye Ave. and Eighth St., changed a transformer in Skandia to improve service to a customer, and replaced five customers' services. Water received at the hydro-electric plants was more than last week. Elevation at the Hoist Pond was raised .05 feet and was 1.45 feet higher than the same time last year and 6.95 feet from the top of the dam. The total system's kilowatt hour load was 3.5 per cent higher than at the same time last year.

One person was jailed and seven others were ordered to pay a total of \$107.90 in fines and costs by Justice George J. Fezzy last week in Marquette Township Court.

William S. Johnson, 22, of 1618 Gray St., Marquette, was ordered to spend 10 days in jail for furnishing alcoholic beverages to a minor. Alternative sentence was to pay a fine of \$50 and \$4.30 costs.

Johnson was arrested by state police April 20 on County Road 551 in Chocoyau Township.

Minor 'In Possession' — Arrested at the same time and place on a charge of minor in possession of beer in a motor vehicle, John E. Connors, 18, Woodland Ave., Marquette, paid a fine of \$15.70 and costs of \$4.30.

For possession of an altered operator's license, Richard N. Auclair, 415 Rock St., Marquette, was ordered to pay a fine of \$25 and costs of \$4.30. Alternative sentence was to spend five days in the county jail. State police issued the summons to Auclair on County Road 480 in Sands Township April 12.

David G. Ollila, Skandia, paid a fine of \$20 and \$4.30 costs on a charge of minor in possession of beer in a motor vehicle. He was arrested by state police April 27 on County Road OP in Skandia Township.

Speeding Count — A fine of \$5.70 and costs of \$4.30 were paid by Frank L. Gronvall, Munising, for speeding. He was ticketed by state police April 14 on U. S. 41 in Marquette Township for driving 75 miles per hour in a 55-MPH zone.

Eugene R. Larson, 217 N. Fourth St., Marquette, was fined \$5.70 and ordered to pay costs of \$4.30 for driving with defective brakes. He was ticketed by state police April

8 on U. S. 41 in Marquette Township.

For a stop sign violation at the intersection of U. S. 41 and Teal Lake Ave. in Negaunee Township, Howard F. Stoll, Milwaukee, was ordered to pay a fine of \$5.70 and \$4.30 costs. The summons was issued by state police April 30.

Bond Posted For Appeal — Also in Marquette Township Justice Court last week, bond was placed at \$50 for the appearance of Danny L. Kloack, 27, Negaunee, in Marquette County Circuit Court.

Kloack was found guilty April 11 of driving 75 miles per hour in a 65-MPH zone on M-95 in Republic Township. The summons was issued by state police March 28. He was ordered to pay a fine of \$25 and costs of \$8.15 or, as an alternative to paying the fines and costs, spend five days in the county jail.

Kloack has appealed the verdict to circuit court.

Houghton Man Dies In Crash Of B57E Jet

OXNARD, Calif. (AP)—Ground searchers found in the mountains Saturday the wreckage of an Air Defense Command twin-jet bomber that crashed Friday while approaching Oxnard Air Force Base for a landing, the base announced. The two men aboard were dead.

They were the pilot, Capt. Robert C. Hansch, 37, son of Earl J. Hansch, Sun Valley, Calif., and 1st Lt. Elmer E. Anderson, Houghton, Mich.

Debris — A group team of the Civil Air Patrol found the debris about 20 miles north of here in mountains that range in height from 1,700 to 2,000 feet.

A spokesman said the base was sending helicopters for the bodies.

The B57E bomber was returning from a training mission when ground crews lost contact with it. It was attached to the 4677th de-

SAULT STE. MARIE — A spokesman for Edison Sault Electric Co. said his firm has been granted Army approval for the purchase of Carbide Power Co. installations here.

W. George Lark, of Edison Sault, said the secretary of the Army has approved the purchase. Included in the purchase are water rights on the diversion canal at the Soo Locks, associated railroad trackage and power

System Evaluation Squadron at Hill Air Force Base, Utah. Both officers were married and leave families in Layton, Utah.

rights on the St. Marys River. Edison Sault was the first to bid for rights to the property last summer when Union Carbide Refining Corp. announced its intentions to close down its Soo operations.

Power Carbide furnished power in the Soo area. Power Carbide's main customer was Union Carbide.

Co-Ops Had Made Bid — After Edison Sault announced its bid for the property a group of northern Lower Michigan and Upper Peninsula electrical cooperatives, including Northern Michigan Electric Power Cooperative, also filed bids for the property and water rights.

Prior to the secretary of the Army's approval of the Edison Sault bid, the Federal Power Commission and the Corps of Engineers Office had approved the bid of Edison Sault.

Edison Sault officials said it hopes to have the Soo installation in operation about June.

PORTSMOUTH, N. H. (AP) — Vice Adm. Hyman G. Rickover, director of nuclear propulsion for the Navy, said it was impossible for the nuclear plant on ill-fated submarine Thresher to explode.

Rickover told a naval court of inquiry: "Nuclear reactors in submarines and surface ships are designed to minimize hazards under any conditions."

He added: "It is physically impossible for nuclear plants on ships to explode like a bomb."

Rickover testified that "in event of a serious accident fuel elements will remain intact and none would be released."

Governor Inks Region Mental Health Law

LANSING (AP) — A bill permitting the creation of county or regional mental health facilities and transferring some of the responsibility for mental health care from the state have been signed into law by Gov. George Romney.

The bill calls for county boards of supervisors, by majority vote, to establish 12-member community mental health boards to develop and operate programs.

Any such program, when approved by the Department of Mental Health, would be eligible for state funds worth 40 to 60 per cent of the entire cost.

The Governor has signed some 17 other bills, some of which would:

- Allow community college districts to assume control of community college departments previously operated by school districts.
- Permit the creation of public authorities to buy mass transportation in cities with population up to 300,000.
- child has not been immunized because of religious convictions or other objection to immunization; or a request signed by one parent or guardian that the local health department give the needed protective injections.
- Parents should bring the child's birth certificate to school at this time, if possible. The immunization sheets will be passed out and can be returned prior to starting school. Sen. Curtis Questions Testimony

WASHINGTON — A Republican senator has questioned the truth of Deputy Secretary of Defense Roswell L. Gilpatrick's testimony in the Senate investigation of the TFX contract award. The challenge by Sen. Carl T. Curtis of Nebraska may set the stage for more controversy in the hearings which at times have broken into open feuding between the Pentagon and the Senate investigations subcommittee. The subcommittee is exploring whether favoritism motivated award of the contract to the General Dynamics Corp. of Fort Worth, Tex., after military evaluations had held that a rival design by the Boeing Co. of Seattle, Wash., promised a better plane at less cost. Gilpatrick, a lawyer, testified March 21 that "I did do certain work for Boeing and for General Dynamics" at a time when he was not on the Pentagon payroll. "I seriously question the truthfulness of Mr. Gilpatrick's statement," Curtis declared Friday. Surprised Turning to Boeing President William M. Allen, then in the witness chair, Curtis asked whether Gilpatrick or his former law firm of Cravath, Swaine & Moore ever had been retained as counsel to Boeing. "No sir," said Allen, adding that he had been surprised to read of Gilpatrick's statement. Allen said Gilpatrick once had testified as a witness subpoenaed by Boeing in a contract renegotiation hearing but did not advise the company as a lawyer. Sen. 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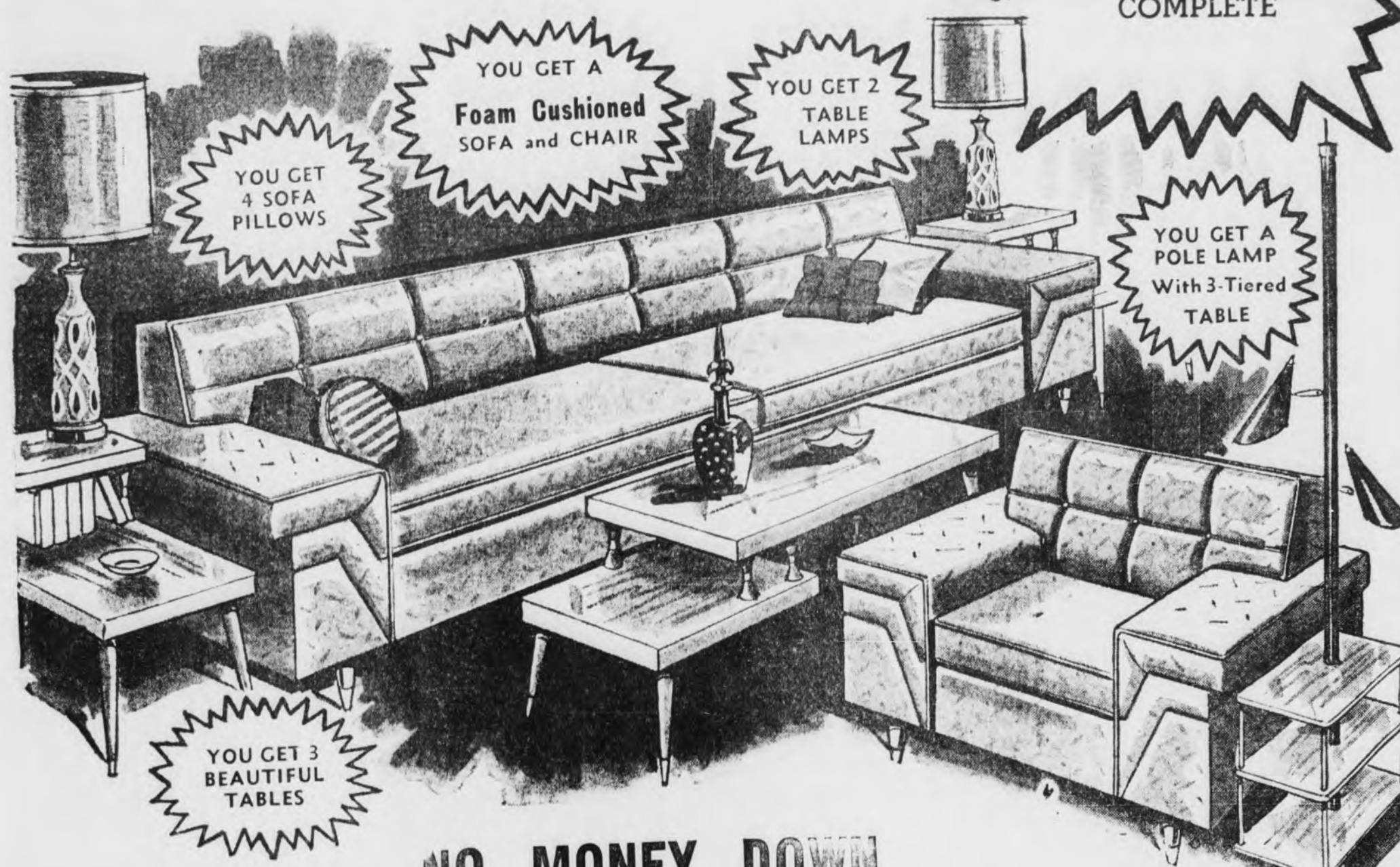
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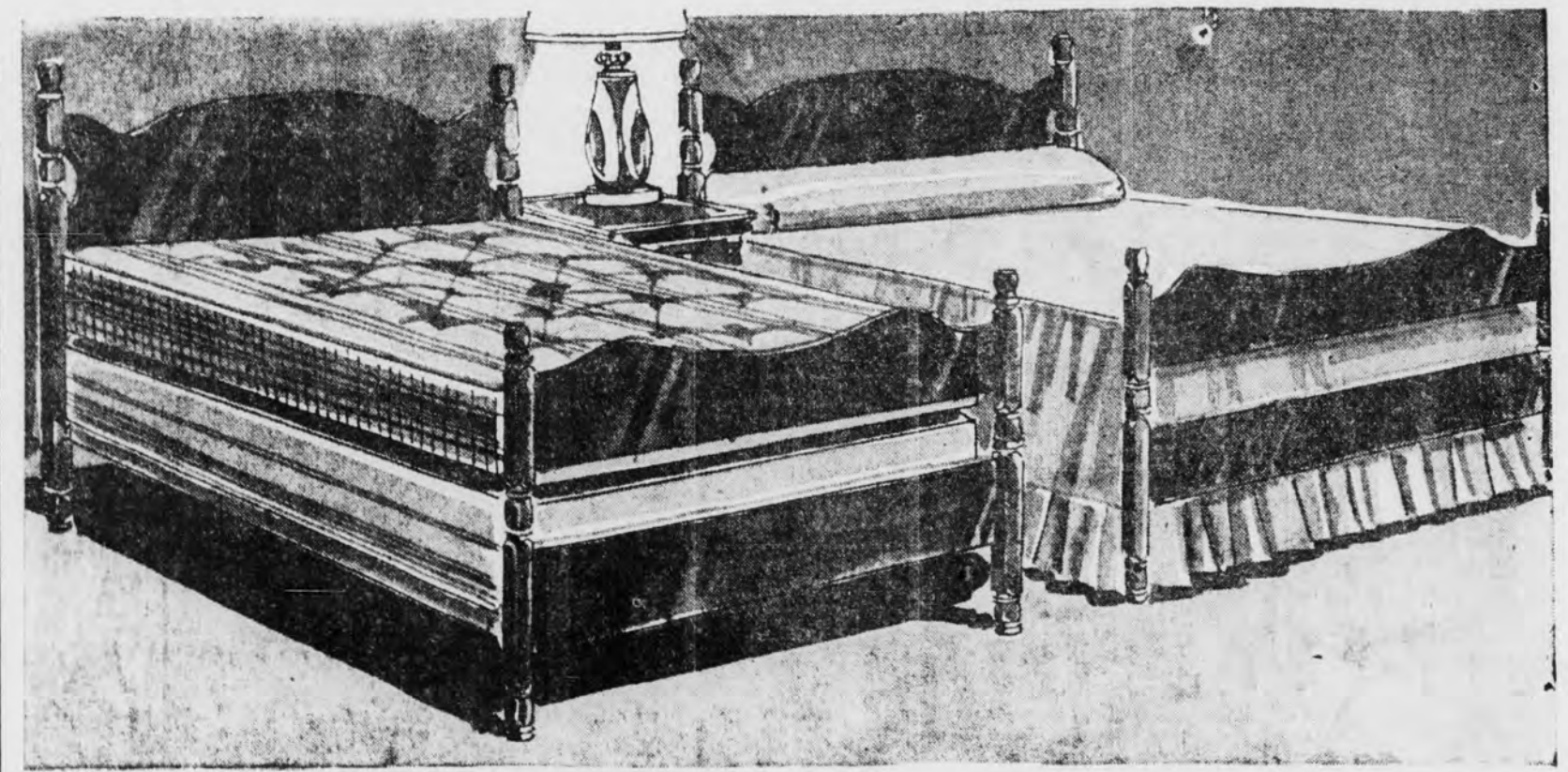
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
