Rail Firemen, Engineers Seek Wage Increase

CLEVELAND (AP) — The Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers—the key operating union in the current work rules dispute—has served demands on the nation's railroads for a 25 per cent wage increase. Also among demands served Sunday by the 78,000-member union were supplemental pensions and company-paid health coverage.

526 Killed In Holiday Car Mishaps

A record 526 deaths occurred on the nation's highways in traffic accidents during the four-day Thanksgiving weekend. Reports of fatalities during the final hours of the 102-hour period pushed the toll above the 514 of the 1962 Thanksgiving weekend which was the highest since 1958 when The Associated Press initiated tabulations for the fall holiday. The lowest was 442 in 1960.

Cold, Snow Felt From Rockies To Northern Florida

Cold air, with snow in some Northern areas, spread across broad sections from the Rockies into northern Florida today. The mercury dropped to 30 degrees in Gainesville, Fla., early today as the cold air dipped into the Southland. Wintry weather, with heavy snow and temperatures near zero, hit Upstate New York and parts of New England. Nearly a foot of snow covered areas east of Lake Ontario.

Jackie's Ordeal Retold

In the following story, Frances Lewine, AP reporter who covered the activities of Mrs. John F. Kennedy during her White House years, including a trip around the world, recounts in step-by-step detail the former First Lady's ordeal, from the start of the day on which the 30th President was assassinated in Dallas, through the funeral services in Washington.

By FRANCES LEWINE WASHINGTON (AP) — She chose a gay pink suit that day and was late getting started. Her husband explained her absence to several thousand cheering Texans.

JACKSON (AP) — Alonzo Gunsell is going to be freed on parole to return to Colorado, where he became a respected citizen after escaping from a Michigan prison farm 10 years ago. Francis Buehko and John J. Spencer, members of the Michigan State Parole Board, voted today to free Gunsell and said there was good possibility he would be released from Southern Michigan Prison this week.

High Court Rules On Agency Shop Labor Contracts

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court decided today state courts may enforce state bans on agency shop labor contracts. Justice Douglas delivered the 8-0 decision. Justice Goldberg, former secretary of labor, took no part.

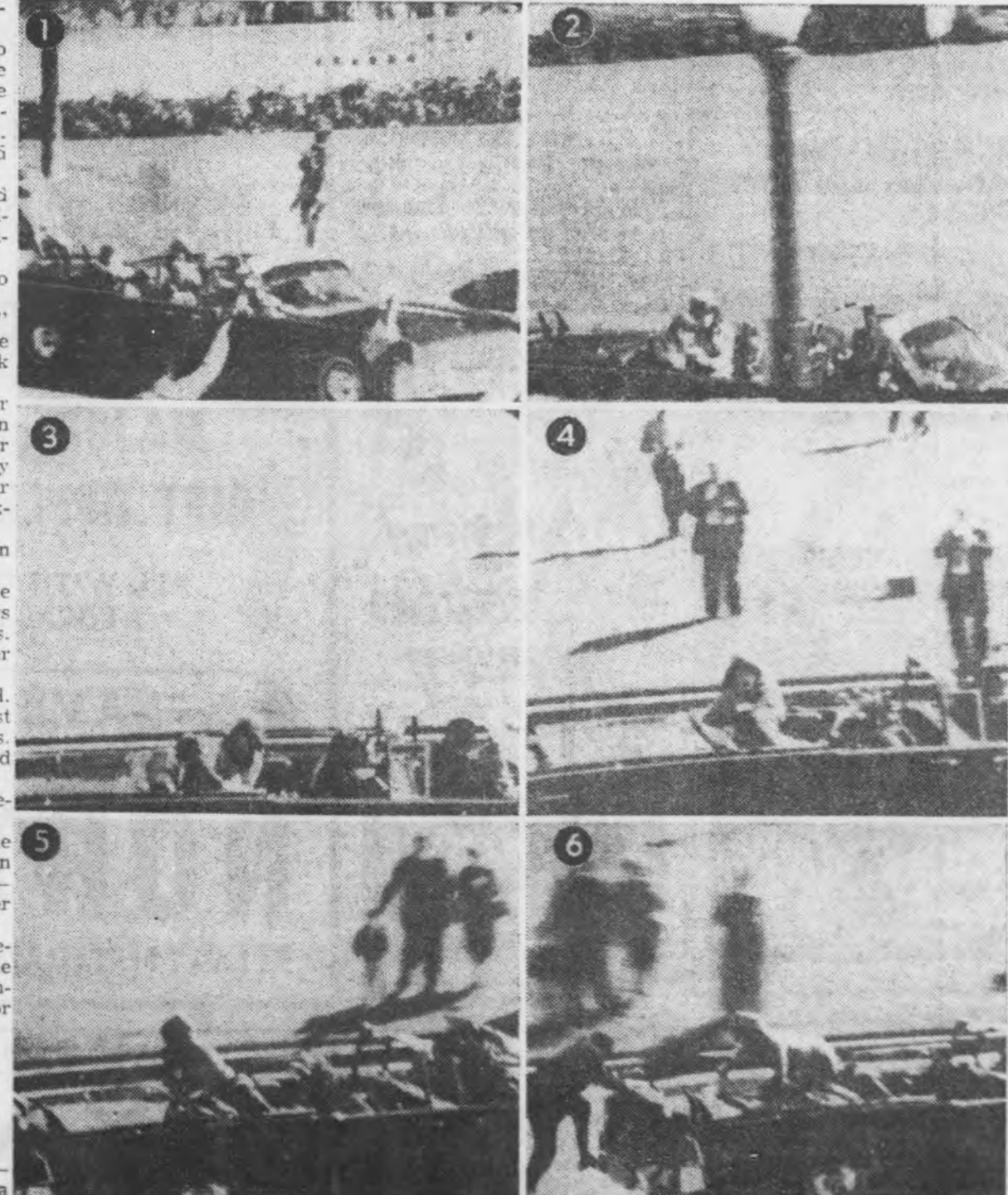

A total of 16,501 Christmas seal letters has been mailed by the Marquette County Tuberculosis Association.

Collections so far in the Christmas seal campaign amount to \$3,769.31, Mrs. James Campbell, Marquette, campaign chairman, reported today.

Income last year from the seal campaign was \$10,253 in Marquette County and \$33,415 in the Upper Peninsula.

Persons who desire seals but have not received seal letters may obtain them by contacting Mrs. Campbell.

Return Envelopes

She asked that persons who write letters of inquiry concerning Christmas seals include the return envelope provided in the seal letter. The return envelopes are used as identification and are often necessary to fulfill special requests, she said.

James H. Inch, 79, U.S. 41 west, died at 1:10 yesterday morning in St. Luke's Hospital, following an illness of two days.

Mr. Inch was born on Aug. 12, 1884, in England, and had been a resident of Marquette County for the past 38 years.

Prior to his retirement in 1954, he had been employed as a guard at the Marquette State Prison for 29 years.

He is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Frank (Garnet) L. Huillier, Marquette, and Mrs. Joseph (Catherine) Gereau, Flint; a son, John, Marquette; nine grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren, and a sister, Mrs. Elizabeth Hoskings, Flint.

Services On Wednesday

The body was removed to Tonella's Funeral Home, where friends may call after 7 this evening.

Services will be held at 10 Wednesday morning in the funeral home with the Very Rev. Msgr. Edmund C. Szoka, pastor of St. Christopher's Church, officiating. Burial will take place in Woodlawn Cemetery, Rockland.

They are experimenting on bovine tuberculosis at the department of veterinary medicine at Michigan State University and experimental canine lung transplants at the University of Michigan.

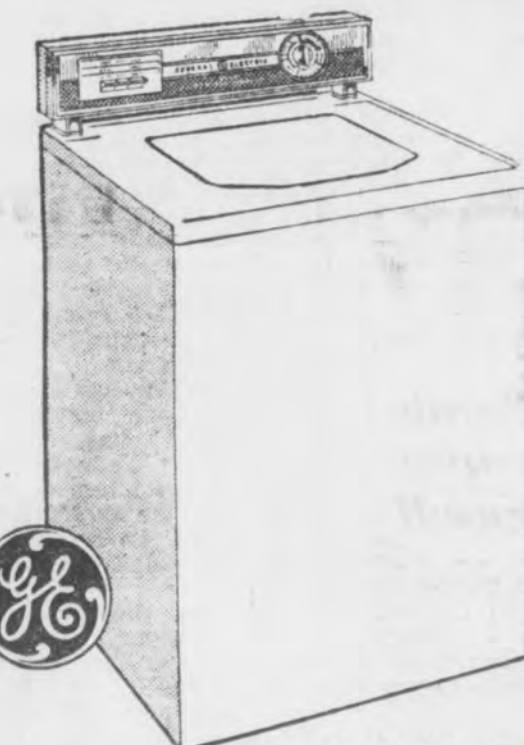

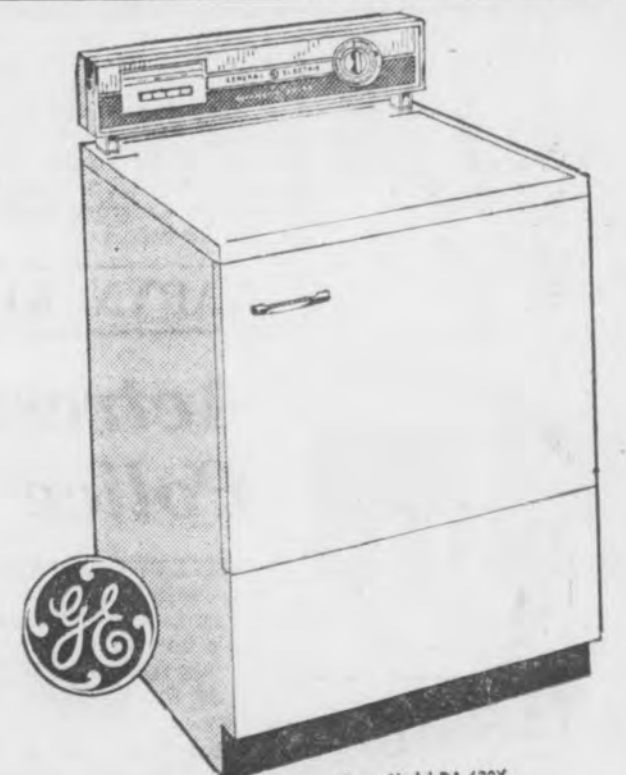

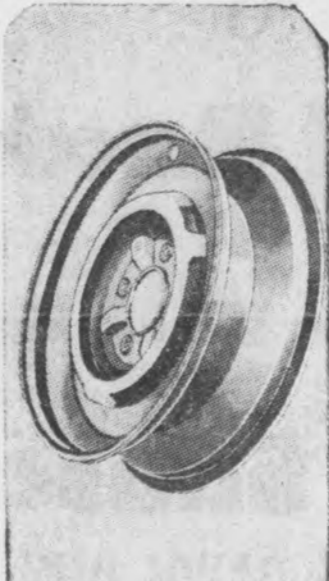

Gunsell Set To Go Before Parole Board

JACKSON (AP)—Alonzo Gunsell, who escaped from a Michigan prison farm 10 years ago, will appear before the State Parole Board today.

Board member John J. Spencer said Saturday the order for Gunsell's appearance was issued by the board Friday. Spencer and Francis Buchkoe, another board member, will conduct the hearing.

The FBI discovered Gunsell living in Colorado under an assumed name. He was allowed to return to Michigan without police escort. He escaped from a Pontiac prison farm in 1953 and reportedly has led a model citizen's life since then.

Won't Be Prosecuted
He sought an audience with Gov. George Romney, but his case was turned over to State Corrections officials while Gunsell was sent to the Southern Michigan Prison in Jackson.

Corrections officials decided Gunsell would not be prosecuted for his escape, and that his "good time" would not be forfeited.

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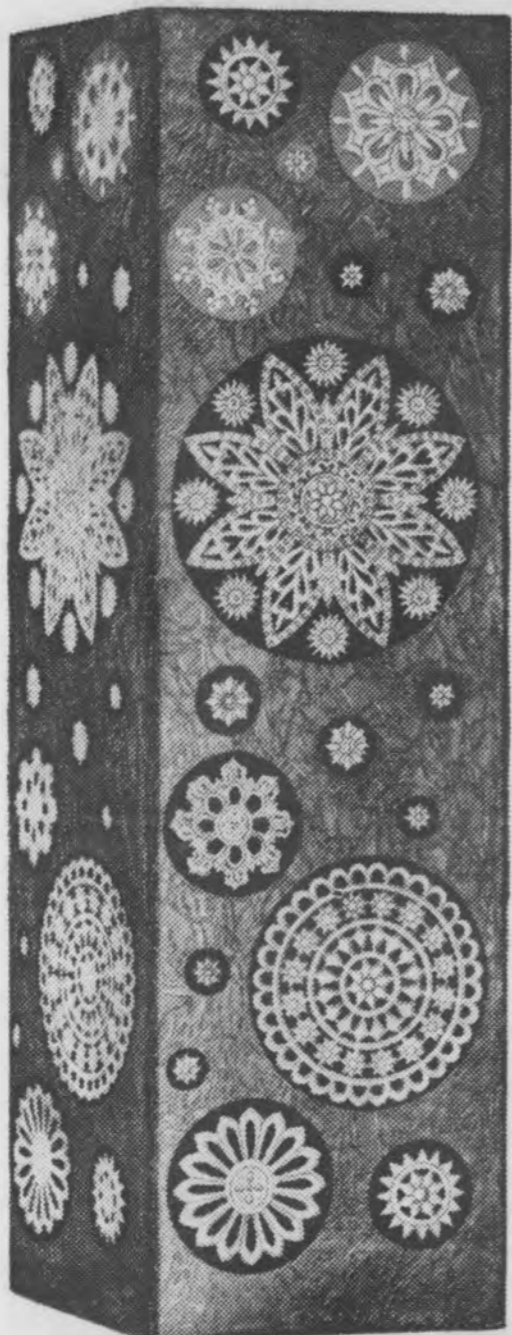
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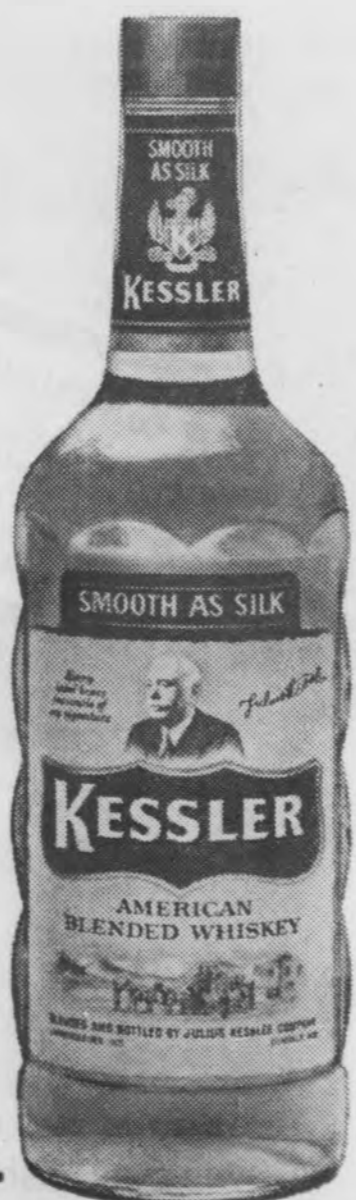
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One Person Injured, Six Given Tickets In Nine Area Mishaps

OASI Questions And Answers

Editor's Note: If you would like to know how the Social Security law affects you, write the Social Security Question Box, P. O. Box 719, Marquette, Michigan. Your answer will appear in future editions of the Question Box, or you will receive a direct reply from the Marquette Social Security Office if you so specify and furnish your name and address.

Q. "How do I change my address with the Social Security Administration? I moved last week and I want my check to come to my new address."—J.G.

Answer: You may request a change of address card from your nearest social security office, or you may simply write a card or letter to the payment center where your claims records are kept. The individual to whom the check is issued must personally sign the request for a change of address, and the beneficiary's claim number must also be shown.

Q. "I am moving next month. How can I make sure that my social security check will reach me on time?"—S.J.

Answer: Try to file a change of address with the Social Security Administration before the 12th of the month. Also, fill out a change of address card at the post office so that any check already in the mail will be forwarded.

This gives you "double insurance" that you will get your check promptly. It enables the post office to forward your check even if there should be a delay in getting the address changed on your social security checks.

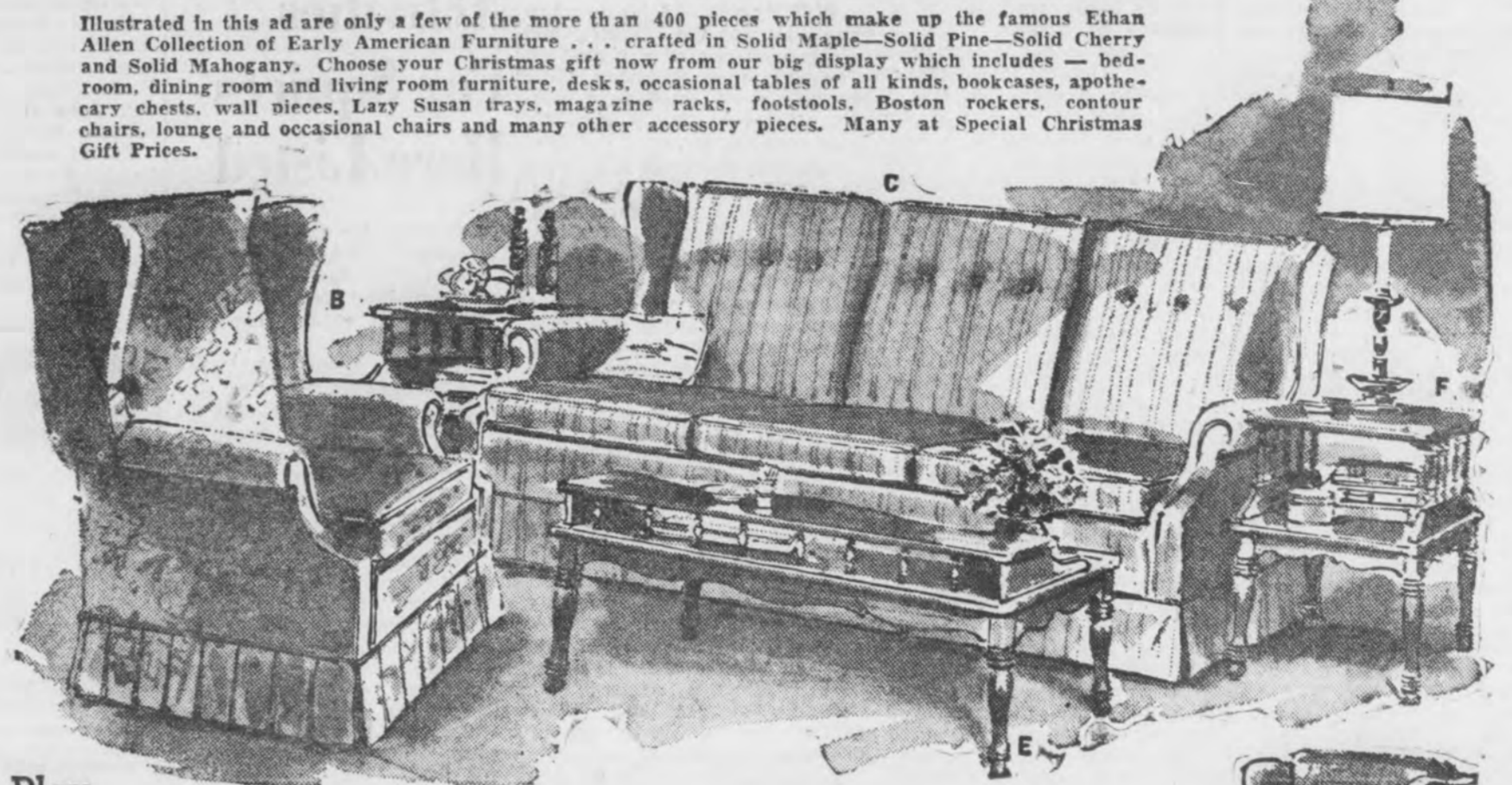

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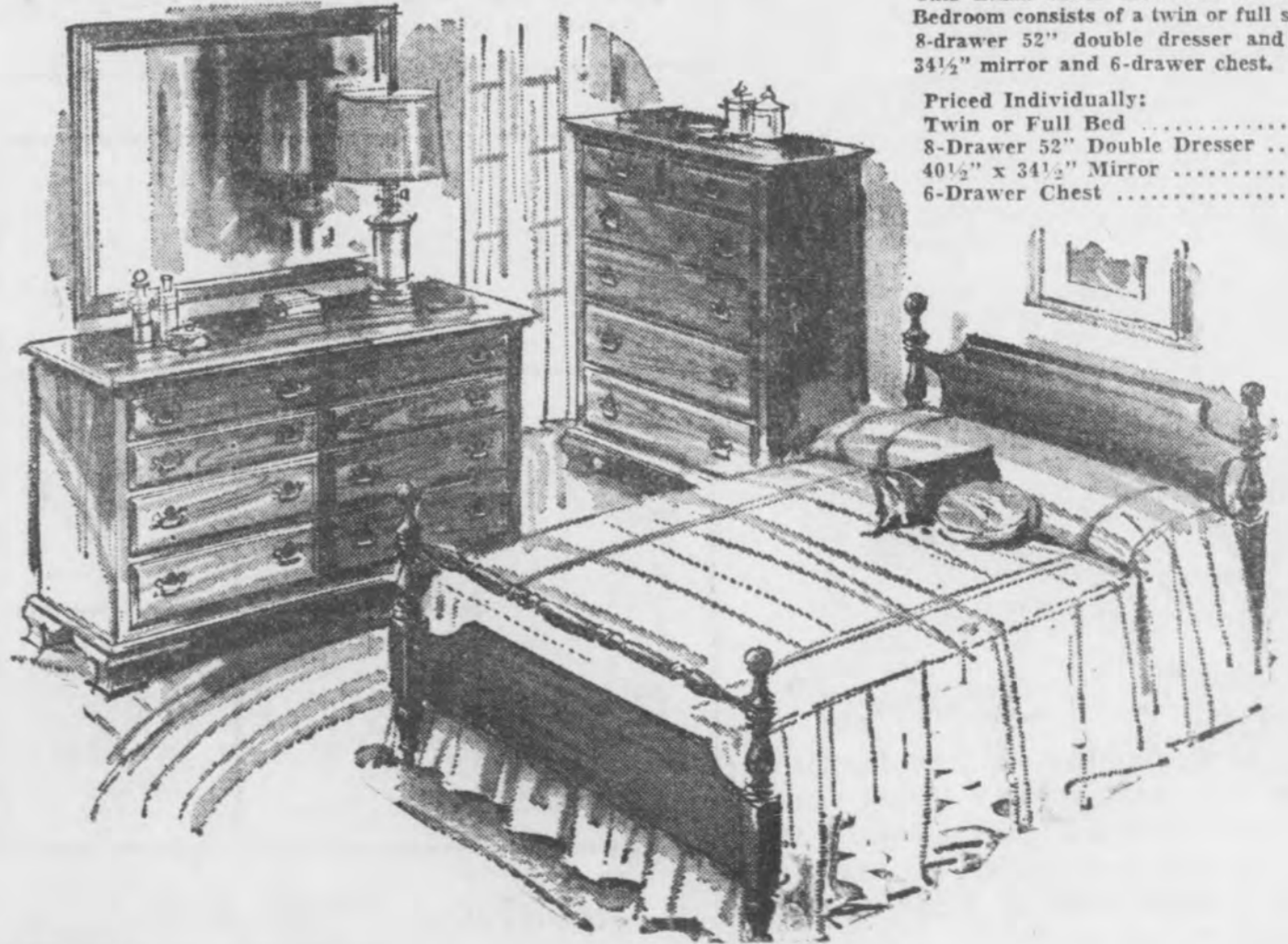
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Winter Strikes Area; 5 Below At County Airport

Winter has hit the area with full force, bringing fun for children, headaches for drivers, beautiful scenery and cold, but invigorating, temperatures.

Overnight the mercury dropped to 10 degrees, the lowest it has been in nine months in Marquette, and to five below zero at the Marquette County Airport in Negaunee Township.

Almost three inches of snow fell Saturday. During the heaviest period of snowfall, from 11 a. m. to 1 p. m., when a little over an inch of snow fell, drivers who didn't absolutely have to go any place stayed off the road.

Driving Tedious

Driving also was extremely hazardous from 1 a. m. to 7 a. m. Saturday, when a little over an inch of snow fell.

During the worst snow storms, people driving to and from K. I. Sawyer Air Force Base reported the trip took about three hours.

State police reported this morning that main roads in the Upper Peninsula were mostly bare, but slippery in spots. City streets were mostly slippery and snow covered.

Generally cold temperatures are expected this week, except for a slight moderation about Thursday. Snow flurries are expected frequently this week, with most snow falling Wednesday, late Thursday and Friday.

Temperatures in Marquette have followed a gradual drop from a mild reading of 43 on Thursday to 10 at 5:30 this morning, meteorologist Fred Mueller, said. The reading of 10 was the lowest temperature since a reading of 8 last March 18.

The average temperature

was about normal Friday, but it was five degrees below normal Saturday, when the high of 32 and low of 15 made a mean of 24.

13 Below Normal

Yesterday the high was 19 and the low was 13 (at 5 a. m.). Average was 16, which was 13 degrees below normal.

Subzero At Airport

At 7 last night the Marquette County Airport in Negaunee Township recorded its low of five below zero. It was the first time the mercury went below normal at the airport this season. Sawyer Base had a low of zero yesterday morning.

Other overnight lows in the Peninsula were 12 in Calumet, 10 in Escanaba and 11 in Sault Ste. Marie.

Snow Depth

Maximum snow depth here was five inches, with over three inches of snow on the ground this morning. Sault Ste. Marie had a snow depth of four inches this morning, the county airport had two inches, Calumet had one, and Escanaba reported no measurable amounts.

Snowfall Saturday amounted to 2.8 inches and only a trace of snow fell yesterday.

Cloudy skies with light snow are predicted for tonight. The mercury was expected to go up to 20 to 25 this afternoon and the low due tonight is 10 or 15.

For tomorrow and Wednesday, the prediction is cloudiness, snow flurries or light snow and continued cold.

For the next five days, temperatures are expected to average a few degrees below the normal extremes of 32 and 22. Precipitation is expected to total one-half to three-quarters of an inch.

Boy Admits Slaying Of Fenton Man

FLINT (AP) — A juvenile boy has admitted the stabbing and shotgun slaying of a Fenton Township man Saturday while another youth acted as a lookout, Genesee County sheriff's men said Sunday.

Detective Raymond Dudley identified the boys as Gary Holland, 15, and Danny Mungall, 14, both neighbors of the victim, Gordon Bowen, 44, a factory worker.

Dudley said the Holland boy admitted he stabbed and then shot Bowen after Bowen struck him. Holland was scheduled to appear before Judge George D. Stevens in a probate court hearing today. Both boys were held in the juvenile section of Genesee County jail.

Lookout

The Mungall boy acted as a lookout during the slaying, Dudley said.

Bowen's body was found lying face down in his home in the Pokenam Lake area between Linden and Fenton, about 12 miles south of Flint. A telephone was still clutched in his hand. Police said he had used it to call for aid before he died.

Holland told Dudley he had gone to Bowen's house Saturday to borrow bread. He said Bowen accused him of stealing \$235 last summer and had struck the boy with his fist. Dudley quoted Holland as saying he stabbed Bowen with a kitchen knife and then ran home, got a 12-gauge shotgun, returned and fired at Bowen through a window. Deputies said Holland's boots fitted footprints under a broken window at Bowen's house.

Second Shot

Dudley said the boy told him he returned later and fired a second shot into Bowen's back as he lay on the floor.

Dudley said Holland admitted taking the \$235 from Bowen last August and giving \$110 of it to Mungall.

Robert F. Leonard, Genesee County Prosecutor, said Bowen, a Fisher Body employee, often kept an eye on neighborhood children when their parents were out.

An autopsy indicated death came from either the first or second shotgun wound. The knife was not found.

Deer Season Gunfire Toll Boosted To 5

(By the Associated Press)
A 54-year-old hunter from Manitowish Beach was shot and killed with his own gun in the closing hours of Michigan's deer hunting season Saturday.

Benjamin C. Morris was the fifth gunshot victim of Michigan's 15-day regular deer hunting season, which ended at sunset Saturday, and the preceding week's special Upper Peninsula season.

Morris' body was found by other hunters east of Devil's Lake, near his western Lenawee County home. State police said his gun apparently discharged, striking him in the chest, when he tried to climb a fence.

The 1963 death toll compared favorably with the 14 hunters killed during last year's deer season.

Seven hunters died of heart attacks—two more than in 1962. And 42 were wounded, compared with 51 a year ago.

Kennedy was declared dead at 1 p.m. The chief neurosurgeon, Dr. Kemp Clark, gently told Mrs. Kennedy the news she had guessed.

Like Greek Tragedy
"She, like everyone else around there had a paralyzed look. We just couldn't believe this could happen," the priest said.

The events of that day and the ordeal that followed for Mrs. Kennedy were like a Greek tragedy.

There was hardly time to think. And there was to be no privacy for this widow. She had lost an infant son three months ago and now her husband, just at a time when the family was preparing to observe the birthdays of their two children, Caroline, now 6, and John Jr., 3, and to spend a happy Thanksgiving with the Kennedy family at Cape Cod.

In the 75 hours from Kennedy's death until his coffin was lowered into a grave at Arlington National Cemetery Monday, Nov. 25, Mrs. Kennedy was spared little.

Public Display
The death and funeral of John Fitzgerald Kennedy and his widow's grief were a public display.

The world knew of the private and touching moment at the hospital when Mrs. Kennedy had tearfully kissed her husband's lifeless lips and put her wedding ring on his finger.

Then the bronze coffin was closed, never to be opened again in public.

Mrs. Kennedy had started to show the determination to carry on in her husband's tradition of personal courage.

In contrast to the many happy occasions, it was an eerie sight at Andrews Air Force Base in Maryland, where a great outpouring of reporters, cameramen and officials had gathered in the floodlighted 6 p.m. darkness.

Air Force One
The Kennedys had walked gaily aboard the Air Force One jet two days before. Mrs. Kennedy had turned to wave to son John, who took the helicopter ride from the White House to see them off.

Now a great, ungainly yellow cargo lift lowered Kennedy's casket, with Mrs. Kennedy standing beside it, holding tightly to the hand of her brother-in-law, Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy. Her face showed her anguish, but she retained composure.

A grey Navy ambulance waited. With so many there to help her, Mrs. Kennedy somehow reached out to open the ambulance door herself.

No Sedatives
They went to Bethesda Naval Hospital. For almost 10 hours Mrs. Kennedy waited there while doctors performed an autopsy and the President's body was prepared for burial.

Mrs. Kennedy stayed there because she did not want to leave the body, aides said. She took no sedatives.

With courage rarely seen, she began almost at once to plan the funeral. She wanted it to be "as distinguished a tribute as possible," the White House said.

She approved the burial in a site among Arlington National Cemetery's 126,000 dead, she requested an eternal flame in his memory, she started discussing plans for a monument.

Mrs. Kennedy chose to pattern Kennedy's funeral after that of Abraham Lincoln, similarly martyred almost 100 years ago.

Bloodstained Badge
At 4:25 a.m.—16 hours after he was shot—Mrs. Kennedy brought her husband home to the White House. Mrs. Kennedy would not change her clothes and the bloodstained badge was there as she followed the casket into the White House.

Once home, Mrs. Kennedy had to face her children, and make plans for a future home she quickly decided would be in Washington.

The next day, Mrs. Kennedy took her children to pray at the casket in the East room. Then more than 4,000 friends, officials, congressmen, diplomats, staff members and newsmen came to pay respects in a day-long downpour of rain that seemed to symbolize the tragedy.

NEW YORK (AP)—Business — and all the producers and consumers whose affairs are tied directly or indirectly to it—today enters the final stretch of 1963 with more than the usual quota of question marks.

What happens in the next three or four weeks can remove or deepen — more than in most years — the uncertainties that cloud the future as the final month starts.

December is the month that traditionally makes or breaks the year for most merchants since it is usually their biggest sales period. And this, in turn, sets a pattern for their suppliers all the way back to raw materials and countless jobs.

It is also a month of bonuses for workers and for stockholders and of the semitraditional year-end rally in the stock market. It is the period for the adjusting of accounts for tax purposes, for assessing the temper of the times, and the prospects for the months just ahead.

Gov. Romney Expected To Oppose Bill

LANSING (AP)—One of the most sensitive issues facing Michigan lawmakers this week will be a bill which would permit elected county officials an extra two years in office.

Gov. George Romney is expected to ask the Legislature not to approve the measure because "it would be unfair to voters."

The Governor will speak on this and other recommendations Tuesday evening at a special session on implementation of the new Constitution.

Extension
The bill, which, in effect, grants present county officials a two-year extension of their terms until 1966, is the work of a legislative committee on implementation. It is based on the Constitutional Convention's intent that county officials run on the same ballot with the Governor, in even-numbered years between presidential elections.

Atty. Gen. Frank Kelley, who opposes the bill, feels the officials should run for re-election in 1964.

'Bed Sheet Ballot'
The committee fears this may create an unwieldy "bedsheet ballot." Their findings had the guidance of one of Kelley's staff, but the attorney general later ruled that the new constitution gives the Legislature no authority to extend the terms of

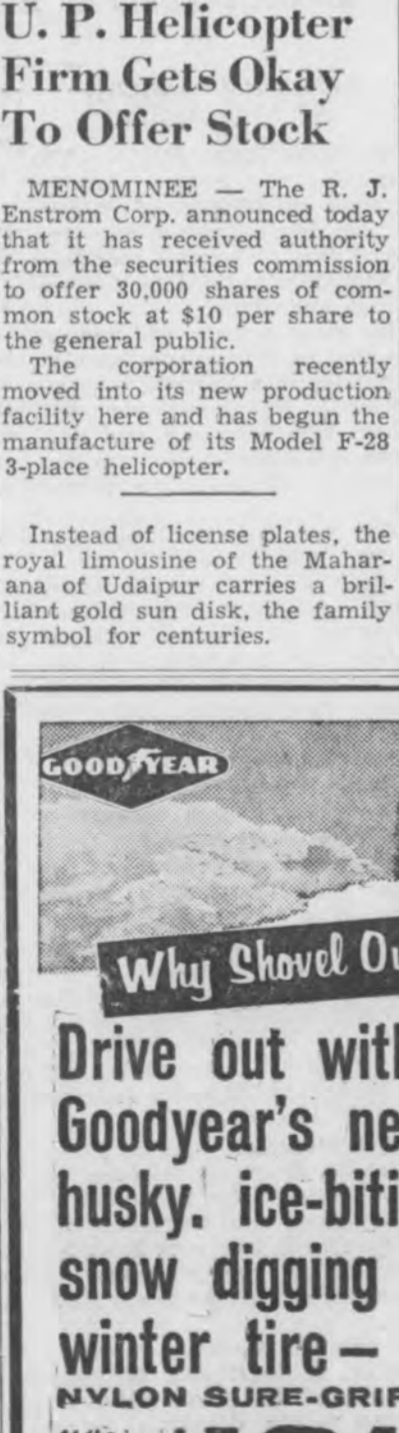

Jackie May Still Be Trendsetter

By JEAN SPRAIN WILSON AP Newsfeature Writer — With the flag from her husband's tier tucked under her arm, Mrs. John F. Kennedy lit the torch of eternal light and walked away from the crowds into private life.

Did the grieving First Lady with this gesture also relinquish her role as the nation's style and cultural pacesetter? "She will always be a leader in my opinion in whatever she does, or wherever she goes," Oleg Cassini paid tribute to his beautiful client whose choice of simple, easy-fitting costumes have been followed by women around the world.

Yet Kenneth Battelle, the hair stylist who created a rage for bouffant coiffure by teasing and puffing the hair of trendsetting Mrs. Kennedy, hopes fervently that the curious, admiring eyes that have followed her so long will now turn away.

Deep Respect — "Mrs. Kennedy has always had a deep respect for our rights of privacy," he says with great emotion. "We should grant her that respect now. She is my client, my friend, and a great, great lady. I love her."

Early in the presidential campaign, John Fairchild, editor of Women's Wear Daily, a powerful fashion trade publication, dubbed Mrs. Kennedy "Her Elegance." That title has remained with the majestic beauty. It's a title she cannot go back on, he says, because she has so much to contribute—"youth, glamor, culture."

"I think she will go on being a trendsetter because she has become a leader in her own right," Fairchild contends. The role self-consciously played was never of her own choosing but foisted on her by her own copyable good taste and intellect.

But her self-consciousness is a part of her charm, he says. Fairchild and Cassini, who have sometimes disagreed, fully agree that Mrs. Kennedy was always above mere fashion.

"Mrs. Kennedy transcends the narrow point of view in fashion," said her couturier. "She was great in success, and she was great in tragedy. She is an example to all youth of what high morals and great character can achieve with dignity and heart."

She is now a symbol to the American people, Cassini says, "a rallying point for everything." The usually witty, dapper designer with the continental manner said that he hopes to continue to have the privilege of working for her.

Mrs. Kennedy was the first President's wife to select an official couturier. Hopeful that the bereaved widow will eventually renew her interest and leadership in the arts is Henry F. Dupont, who, as chairman of the committee for White House restoration, worked closely with her.

"What she has done in the White House is absolutely marvelous. It was her idea, and everything that has been done is so well thought out," he says. With August Heckscher as her cultural consultant Mrs. Kennedy sparked the nation's interest in good music and dance by inviting the country's talent to perform in the previously staid White House halls.

"No one will ever be able to describe adequately what her tastes and discernment meant," he said. "She lent her brightness to the whole cultural world."

Car Smashed, Driver Hurt In L'Anse Area Accident

According to state police, the cows, owned by Paul Peterson, were walking across the roadway when the Konstenius car approached.

Miss Konstenius and her passenger, Lynn M. Ross, 17, Baraga, were shaken up, but did not require hospitalization.

The front end of the car was badly damaged, and the vehicle had to be hauled away by a wrecker.

Tragic End Of Christmas Tree Shipment Of '12 Told

MANISTIQUE — On a gray November morning in 1912, Capt. Herman Schuenemann was buying provisions at a Manistique grocery store for his last trip to Chicago with a cargo of Christmas trees.

At the same time, his three-masted schooner, the Rouse Simmons, was being loaded at the dock at Thompson, a few miles west on the Lake Michigan shore.

"How's the Christmas tree business?" the grocer, Joseph Van Dyke, asked Schuenemann with more than casual interest. Van Dyke had financed Schuenemann's operations for years, providing about \$900 in food and cash to the captain while woodsmen cut spruce in Schoolcraft County.

The tall, 41-year-old captain with the black mustache replied: "All right I think. We've cut some nice trees, but we're a little late this season."

Returning to Thompson, Capt. Schuenemann watched the unloading of trees from flatcars of the "Haywire road" — the Manistique & Lake Superior Railroad, which had tracks running from the Thompson dock north through the woods country as far as Shingletown.

After checking to see that the cargo was well distributed and glancing again at the threatening late afternoon sky, he shouted the order for the 125-foot schooner to set sail.

The order shocked the master of the ship, Capt. Charles Nelson, who was Schuenemann's partner, and he argued in vain for delay of the departure. Just two weeks before, a storm had caused wide destruction on the Great Lakes and another gale was rising.

But Capt. Schuenemann had chartered the 200-ton Rouse Simmons from Capt. Manus Bommer of Beaver Island, and he was anxious to get his cargo to Chicago.

The ship was cut from its moorings, a tug pulled it away from the dock and the accelerating wind caught its sails and carried it into open water. The date was Nov. 22.

The sailing was the last for the Rouse Simmons.

Carrying a shorthanded crew of 15 and the wife of Capt. Nelson, the schooner traveled 100 miles of storm-tossed water before dawn. By morning, the gale had backed into the east and the lake was hidden by a raging blizzard.

That day, the Rouse Simmons was sighted of Kewauqua, Wis., flying distress signals. The Kewauqua Coast Guard station telephoned the Two Rivers sta-

New Atomic Energy Badge Can Be Earned By Scouts

Hiawatha Council, Boy Scouts of America, with headquarters at Marquette, announces that all second and first class Boy Scouts and Explorers are now eligible to earn the atomic energy merit badge — the 105th in the series.

Dr. Glenn T. Seaborg, Ishpeming native who is chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission and is himself a former Life Scout with 25 merit badges, took part in a ceremony in New York when he honored 34 Boy Scouts and Explorers of four states who were the first to qualify for the new merit badge.

Irving Feist of Newark, N. J., international commissioner of the Boy Scouts of America, read the names of the 34 recipients in a ceremony witnessed by members of the American Nuclear Society and the Atomic Industrial Forum at a special session of their joint annual meeting.

Merit badges are provided in the Boy Scout organization to encourage boys to increase their skill in things they like to do. They give boys a chance to try out new activities that may result in new interests. Currently there are 105 subjects ranging from agriculture

to zoology, falling into 15 groupings. These cover animal husbandry, aquatics, arts, building, campercraft, citizenship, communication, conservation, crafts and collections, nature, outdoor sports, personal development, plant cultivation, public service and transportation.

Last year 1,722,928 merit badges were earned by America's Boy Scouts. Before qualifying for a merit badge, a Scout meets with the counselor in the subject he has chosen. The counselors are men who are successful in their respective fields and interests who believe in Scouting enough to give valuable time to help Scouts advance.

Requirements for the new atomic energy merit badge were developed by a committee of experts who began work on them in 1957. The requirements allow a Scout to demonstrate the concepts of atomic energy by doing simple projects.

The first part of the requirements includes questions on terminology, atomic structure, isotopes, fission, historical contributions by scientists and radiation protection.

The second part is designed for Scouts who could not borrow or build a Geiger counter and includes building and explaining a model of a nuclear reactor, an experiment in shielding theory using light and

heat, and a field visit to a medical user of X-ray. The final requirements are developed around the use of a Geiger counter and include experiments on the general theory of the Geiger counter as a detector, on shielding, and on tracers.

The NFL draft will go 20 rounds, until bidding rights within the league are reserved on 280 players. The eight AFL clubs earmarked 160 players.
