Foreign Aid Bill OK'd By House, Sent To Senate

WASHINGTON (AP)—Weather mixed with politics today as the House shattered tradition with an early day-before-Christmas session in a fourth attempt to pass a compromise \$3-billion foreign aid bill.

At stake is not the money in the measure but a provision that would allow the president to arrange credit for the sale of surplus U.S. wheat to Russia.

President Johnson has said he wants the authority before Congress adjourns.

Twice Refused. The House twice refused to grant it, once when it passed the bill originally Dec. 16 and again last Saturday when it turned down a compromise containing a provision conditioning the authority on a presidential finding that the national interest required its use. The Senate originally rejected the House ban.

On both occasions, the House action was instigated by Republicans and accomplished by the votes of Republicans and Southern Democrats.

Second Try. A second try at a compromise was blocked last Saturday when absenteeism prevented a Rules Committee meeting to lay the ground rules for House consideration.

The third attempt was made Monday under procedure requiring a two-thirds vote for success. It fell two votes short of that number. It had the support of all 195 Democrats present and 7 Republicans and the opposition of 105 Republicans.

Majority Vote. Today's showdown will be determined by a majority vote, with Republicans aiming to send the bill back to a compromise committee and the President's forces attempting to send it to the Senate, which won't do anything about it before Friday and probably not until Monday.

As far as modern records go, the House never before has held a business session on the day before Christmas. Nor has it ever started a session as early as 7 a.m.

WASHINGTON (AP)—In an unprecedented Christmas Eve daybreak session, the House passed and sent to the Senate today a compromise \$3-billion foreign-aid appropriation bill giving the President authority to guarantee credit for private wheat sales to Russia.

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson's drive for pre-Christmas action on foreign aid appears to have bolstered his Democratic support while damaging prospective bipartisanship on foreign policy.

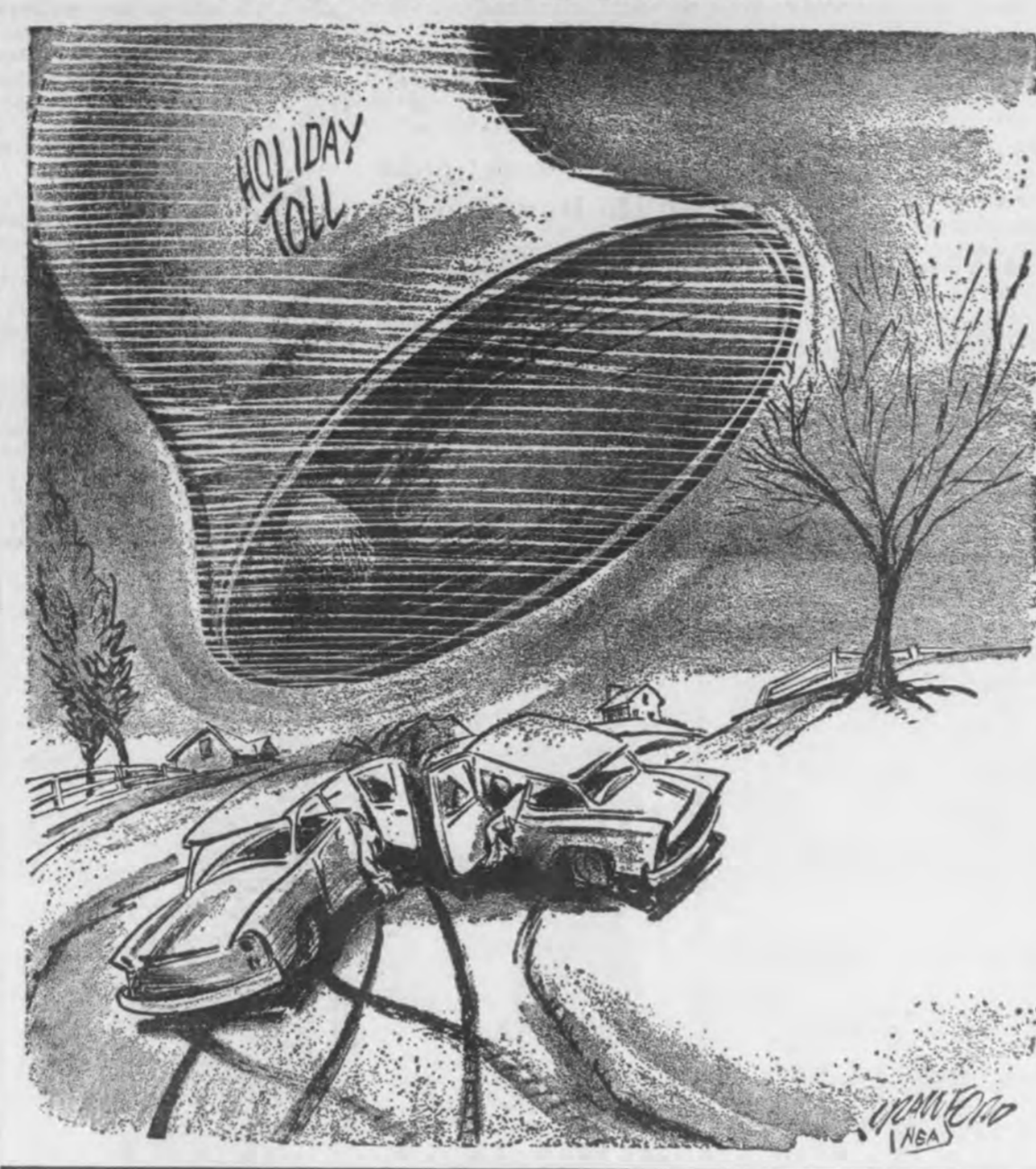
By dramatizing his demand that Congress surrender most of its holiday to work on the money bill, Johnson has irritated Republicans. He has put most of them in the mood to challenge his domestic proposals and to search for political motives behind his international moves.

Will Need Help. Johnson is going to need some help in 1964 to pass civil rights legislation from the very Republicans who were castigated by anonymous White House spokesmen for putting stumbling blocks in the road to passage of the foreign aid bill.

Republicans questioned the President's motives in demanding immediate action. They say—and Democrats concede privately—that the Agency for International Development (AID) would be better off under a continuing resolution that lets it spend at last year's budget rate than under the new bill's \$3-billion level.

'Heroes'. The resolution is in force until Jan. 31. Republicans argued that the new bill could have been passed any time before that without the "heroes" in which House GOP Leader Charles A. Halleck said the administration was indulging. Besides stirring up the Republicans with his act-now demands, Johnson risked his prestige on what one Democratic senator called "the worst possible issue he could have chosen"—foreign aid.

Pilgrims Flock To Bethlehem

BETHLEHEM (AP)—Crowded just as it was the day Christ was born, Bethlehem prepared to celebrate Christmas with a majestic procession to the oldest church in Christendom and a modest ceremony beneath the stars.

Thousands of pilgrims from around the world flocked to the Holy Land. Two hundred Jordanian police were assigned to special duty with army desert troops in Manager Square outside Bethlehem's Church of the Nativity. As many as 10,000 worshippers were expected to gather there for Christmas Eve rites.

Carols. Loudspeakers Monday night wafted carol music across the stone-paved square lit by garish neon lights, an electric sign reading "Welcome to Bethlehem" and the bright blues of the municipal Christmas tree, a misspelled umbrella pine festooned with Japanese lanterns, balls of tinfoil and a dazzling green and red star.

Souvenir sellers besieged each pilgrim with offers of postcards, rosaries or Crusader crosses. Ceremonies in the square promised to be a preview for the visit of Pope Paul VI to Bethlehem on the day of Epiphany, Jan. 6.

Quarrels. Many a Christmas Eve procession by the Roman Catholic Church has been upset by quarrels among the Roman, Greek Orthodox and Armenian churches, each of whom jealously guards special privileges within the ornate, marble-sheathed Grotto of the Manger.

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Summer Mourning Attire For Jackie

WASHINGTON (AP)—A spokesman says Mrs. John F. Kennedy's appearance in a white dress at Palm Beach, Fla., represented her summer mourning attire.

Pamela Turnure, Mrs. Kennedy's press secretary, said Monday that white is considered proper mourning wear during the summer or in tropical areas. Mrs. Kennedy has announced she plans to observe one year of mourning for her assassinated husband.

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Dixie Gets Heaviest Snowfall Of Century

(By the Associated Press) A fast-moving early winter storm which dumped the heaviest snowfalls of the century in some Southern states swept across broad areas in the eastern section of the nation today.

The pre-Christmas storm, fanned by gusty winds, disrupted air and highway travel, created hazardous driving conditions and inconvenienced millions.

16 Inches. The storm, on the first full day of winter, left amounts up to 16 inches in western and southwestern Virginia and up to 8 inches in the New York metropolitan area. It hammered most of the northern half of the Atlantic coastal region and other Eastern areas after sweeping across Southern states.

The snow, followed by sleet and freezing rain in many Eastern areas, was blamed for at least 15 deaths, mostly in traffic accidents on icy and snow-covered highways, exposure from cold and heart attacks induced by over-exertion.

Cold Air. Cold air dipped deep into parts of the Southland, notably across the snow-covered regions in Tennessee and Kentucky. The mercury plunged to 12 below zero in Memphis, Tenn., a record low for the city, which is covered by 15 inches of snow, the heaviest amount of the century.

Highway travel in the South was extremely dangerous on ice-covered highways. State troopers allowed only vehicles with snow tires and chains to travel on highways between Alabama and Tennessee, north Georgia and north Mississippi.

A white Christmas was assured for vast areas in the eastern two-thirds of the nation. The snow, after whipping across the South and Midwest sections Sunday, swept northward along the Atlantic Coast, into New England and inland to the eastern Great Lakes region.

The six-inch snowfall at the National Airport in Washington was the heaviest since Feb. 8, 1961. Government workers were dismissed two hours early because of the storm. In many other cities workers in government offices and business firms were also allowed to go home early.

Clear Weather. Generally clear weather was reported from the Mississippi River to the Pacific Coast. Temperatures generally moderated to seasonal levels in most of the area.

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DALLAS, Tex. (AP)—A tense legal skirmish over Jack Ruby's right to freedom on bond will resume Jan. 10 in a small courtroom a stone's throw from where President Kennedy was assassinated.

Attorney Melvin Belli — who charged his client cannot get a fair trial in Dallas — said he will seek a change in venue when the legal proceedings resume.

Ruby emerged from the hearing no better off than before. Judge Joe Brown said he must remain in jail without bond until Jan. 10.

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# Special Events Set For Tomorrow At Marquette Prison

Several special events have been scheduled for tomorrow at the Marquette State Prison, Warden Raymond J. Buchkoe announced today.

Special events include the Christmas holiday dinner "extras," movies, a talent show and hockey games, Warden Buchkoe said.

### Menu Listed

Christmas dinner at the prison for inmates includes ham, mashed potatoes and gravy, candied yams, buttered peas, celery sticks, mince meat pie, bread, coffee and candy.

The "extras" which are on the Christmas menu for the inmates are provided for under the inmates' own Inmate Welfare Fund, Warden Buchkoe noted.

The big dinner will be served at noon. In the evening, inmates will have a light supper, including soup, sandwiches, cocoa and fruit.

Special movies will be shown on Christmas Day, routine for which will be similar to a Sunday. Intramural hockey games also have been scheduled.

A special feature this year will be the home talent show, which will include vaudeville acts, country style music and comedy acts, under the direction of Robert Redman, director of recreation at the prison. Free drawings will be made during the show with special prizes such as electric razors, pen and pencil sets, dictionaries, other books, etc., being awarded.

For the first time, the new all faith inside chapel will be used on Christmas Day, Buchkoe stated.

The inside chapel was constructed with state funds. There is a drive under way to raise money for an outside chapel, for trustees who live outside the prison, inasmuch as no state funds are available for an outside chapel.

Announcement will be made later of the date for dedication ceremonies of the inside chapel, as at present there is no furnishings in the chapel, with the formal dedication being held up until the chapel is completely furnished, Buchkoe said.

# Romney Will Meet Mackie On Dec. 26

LANSING (AP) — Following some skirmishing by letter, Gov. George Romney and Highway Commissioner John Mackie have agreed to meet the day after Christmas to discuss differences over patrolling of the state's expressways.

The issue could turn into a free-for-all between Romney and Mackie, a Democrat who previously has feuded with the Republican Governor.

Romney sent Mackie a letter asking the commissioner to give up his idea of providing service patrols on the expressways.

Romney said highway department patrols would cost more than \$1 million a year.

Mackie replied his planning was to operate at first only on a trial and experimental basis at \$100,000 a year.

Romney retorted he thought state police could do a better job than any highway department operation.

"Further, it is now evident," said Romney, "that such a program could and should be financed from highway funds."

Romney added that the ultimate decision on financing would be up to the Legislature. Mackie, in opposing the state's

# Perishables, Gifts, 'Special' Mail Delivered Tomorrow

Parcel post gift packages and perishable matter, as well as all special delivery mail, will be delivered on Christmas Day, Postmaster John S. Courtney said today.

Courtney said, however, that there will not be any delivery of ordinary mail by carrier tomorrow, as Christmas Day is a national legal holiday. The delivery of the gifts, perishable and special delivery mail will be made in the residential area.

Post office windows will be closed tomorrow, with regular hours having been resumed yesterday at the post office. Regular hours are from 8:30 in the morning to 5 p.m., weekdays, and from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., Saturdays.

Courtney said that "anything appearing to be a Christmas package will be delivered tomorrow if at all possible." Special delivery mail and perishable packages are ordinarily

delivered on holidays anyway. During the Christmas holiday mailing period 11 temporary employees were hired by the Marquette Post Office to bolster the regular staff, with most of them doing clerical work.

# Study Of Parking Problem Asked By City Commission

Marquette's city commission has asked that a study be made of the parking situation here.

Action came at yesterday afternoon's regular meeting of the commission, following the receipt of a request from the chamber of commerce, calling attention to the parking problem.

### For Manager, Board Study

The commission ordered the matter referred to City Manager Thomas Moore and the city planning board, "for a report and action."

Clifton Wagner, chairman of the retail division of the chamber, said the chamber's executive retail committee had unanimously passed a request concerning the parking problem.

The committee said that "Marquette is fast becoming the shopping center of the Upper Peninsula," and "realizing that we have such a vast primary and secondary trade area, we request that special attention be given as soon as possible to the problem of parking in Marquette."

### Loss of Parking Areas

The chamber group said many facilities for parking have been taken over by the Area Redevelopment Administration group and that some have been eliminated due to the expansion of the highway by the federal government.

With these parking places being eliminated, there is justification for "immediate action" in this matter, it added.

Moore said he agreed that "something needs to be done," and added that "I believe we can do something, perhaps initiating a project this spring."

Commissioner Elmer K. Carlson noted that the commission had previously discussed the problem, and that it had in-

tended to do something, even before the chamber communication was received.

The commission also approved bills totaling \$76,807.68, of which \$45,332.96 was the net city payroll for the two-week period. (The latter figure included the employees' longevity pay for the year.)

Commissioner Steve A. E. Johnson presided at the meeting, as mayor pro-tem, inasmuch as Mayor C. Fred Rydholm was not present, with Rydholm's absence (he was out of the city) being excused by his colleagues.

# Large Numbers Of Christmas Displays Noted In Marquette

Marquette has an exceptionally large number of outdoor Christmas displays, judges in the city lighting contest reported today.

Judging in the Christmas residential lighting contest got under way last evening.

Residents with displays have been asked to keep them lit at least between 6 and 10 each evening for the benefit of judges and others viewing the exhibits.

This is the 11th year that the Kiwanis Club and the City of Marquette have sponsored a residential holiday lighting contest. When the program was first launched the number of outdoor displays was far less than are evident today, committee spokesmen said.

**More Exhibits Today**

There are homeowners in every section of the city putting up holiday displays today," said Frank T. McKeown, chairman of the Kiwanis lighting committee.

"Also, more persons are sticking to the religious theme in displays, thereby helping to 'put Christ back into Christmas.'"

The judges committee is composed of six persons, none of whom is a member of (or,

in the case of women, a wife of) a Kiwanian. Decisions of the judges will be final. Awards totalling around \$250 will be awarded again this year.

**Caroling Encouraged**

"We also encourage residents to enjoy what years ago used to be traditional at Christmas time, such as caroling, walking around in the evening, and at the same time enjoying the

beautiful holiday displays," McKeown said.

The religious theme is given heavy favor by the judges in making their decisions. Creative effort required also weighs heavily in the contest.

A \$50 savings bond will be awarded to the contest winner, being selected at-large from the city. Other prizes will be given out by sections.

**Boundaries Noted**

Boundaries for the contest are as follows:

**North district** — All homes north of Kaye Ave., including the north side of Kaye.

**East district** — All homes north of Washington St., south of Kaye Ave. and east of N. Third St., including those on

the south side of Kaye and the east side of N. Third.

**West district** — All homes north of Washington St., south of Kaye Ave. and west of N. Third St., including those on the south side of Kaye and the west side of N. Third.

**South district** — All homes south of Washington St., including those on the south side of Washington, with the exception of those in the Lakeview Heights and Shiras Subdivisions.

**Shiras-Lakeview district** — All homes in the Shiras Hills and Lakeview Heights Subdivisions, in accordance with their natural boundary lines.

However, on Christmas during all the Masses you have an opportunity to help these families and children that are in need of help. Your charity helps our Catholic Social Services provide clothing, shelter and food for the children who are in need. I am confident that you will show your customary generosity."

Expansion Of Care

Bishop Noa also stressed the

fact that the present expansion of services of child care and guidance has been made possible largely through the generosity of the faithful to this annual collection.

"Certainly in the spirit of the season, everyone will be generous in contributing to this great work of charity," he said.

"The diocese is conducting a schedule of services, centered at Holy Family Home, which covers every phase of child care and guidance in accordance with the law of charity and the strict requirements of the laws of the state and the professional standards."

Program Won Recognition

He noted that the diocese's program of child care and guidance has won recognition and high praise in professional circles.

"The Christmas present which you will give this year will help us to do even more than we have been able to do in the past in this field," Bishop Noa stated.

"During my last audience with Pope Paul VI, the Holy Father personally told me to impart his special Apostolic Blessing to God's holy people of the Diocese of Marquette. I am happy to impart this special blessing to you."

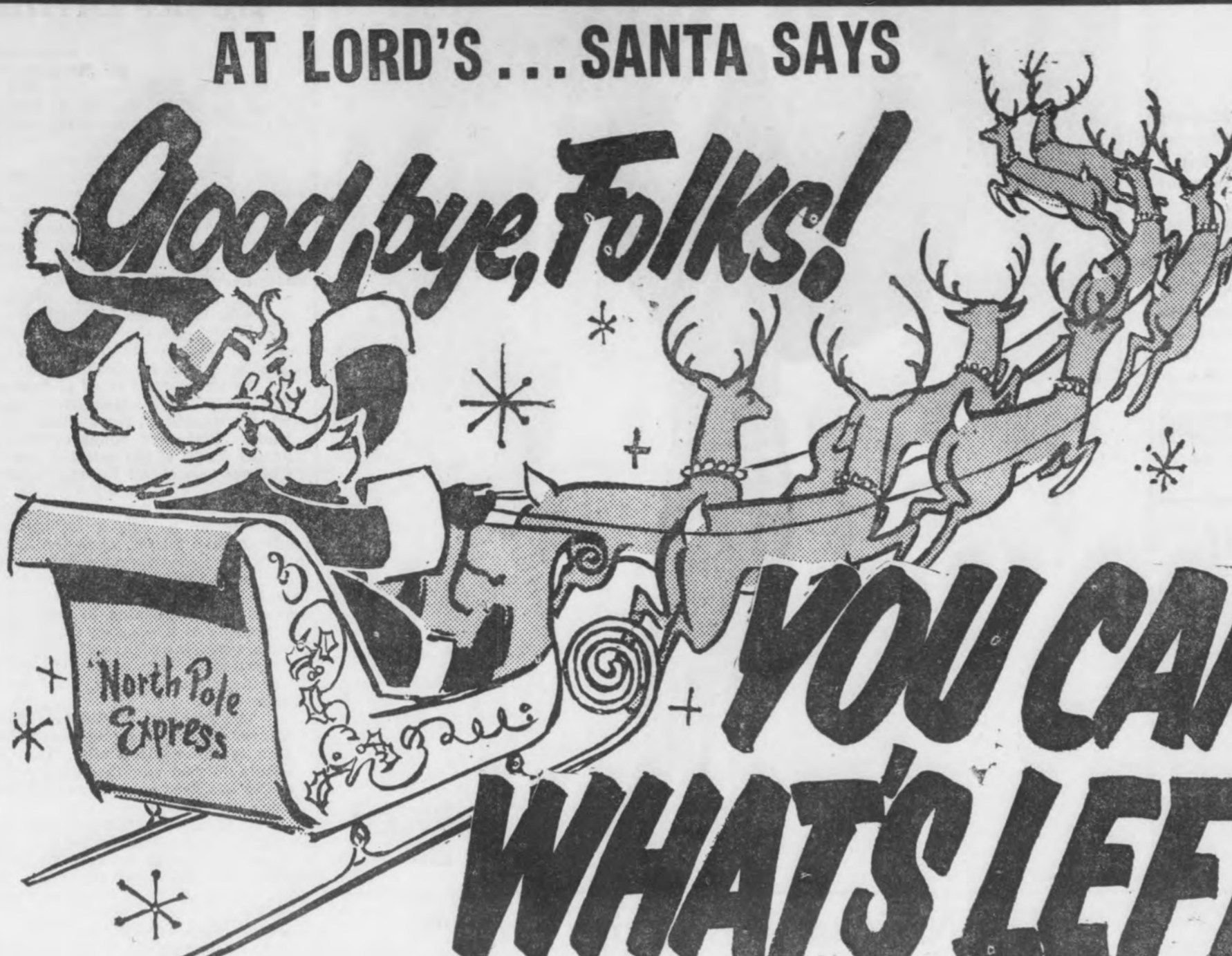

## Christmas 1963

America observes Christmas this year with the depressing influence of President Kennedy's assassination still with us.

The spirit of Christmas with its message of "peace to men of good will" was so violated by the murder of the President that there has been a national examination of conscience which has turned many Americans' thoughts to the values symbolized by Christmas.

We have tended to let the materialism of the holidays become so strong an influence — so much more so than at Easter, for instance — that any soul searching brings misgivings about our national devotion to moral values.

The festivities of Christmas are not wrong, the occasion is traditionally one of thanksgiving for the birth of Christ, but unless its deep significance as a time of renewal of hope and of spiritual refreshment is exercised, the observance is empty of its true meaning.

In the Christian world, Christmas is observed in many varied ways and called many different things, but its essential meaning is the same: It marks the birth of Christ. For English speaking peoples "Christmas" comes from Christ's Mass.

Long before Christ, the Greek Socrates had offered his poverty as proof of his convictions. He lived for qualities of the mind, not for the accumulation of worldly possessions. In America, worldly possessions have come to be so prominent in the scale of values that they dominate thinking to a point where it is difficult to get acceptance of a person as important unless he is a person of means.

It was indicative of this national malady to have such accent put upon the private means of our new President and First Lady at the time of their accession. A visitor would certainly judge that our occupation (so often repeated) with the fact that Lady Bird Johnson had run the contents of her family handbag up into an estate of \$5 million made it our judgment that this was the most valuable thing she brought to the White House.

If this were so, America would be poor indeed, being able to count its possessions only at the cashier's window.

Jesus Christ, born in very humble circumstances, never acquired any means and was crucified a young man, but He influenced the world more than any other person because the religious faiths founded on His teachings and influenced by them have prevailed in so many of the progressive nations of the modern world. Many of His teachings still are part of the Jewish religion, and He is a prophet of the Mohammedan faith as well as the founder of Christianity.

### 60 Years Ago

—Marquette—

The engineers' report on the project of making Marquette Harbor a harbor of refuge has, according to a Washington dispatch, been submitted to the House, together with the endorsement of the secretary of war. This report was ordered in June 1902, when Congress directed the War Department to make the necessary survey. In the interval, the ground has been thoroughly looked over by the engineers. Their report is to the effect that the necessary sheltered area can be obtained by lengthening the present breakwater a distance of 1,500 feet, giving it in all a length of 4,500 feet. The cost of this improvement is estimated at \$303,000. The breakwater as it now stands measures 3,000 feet in length, about 2,000 feet of which has been rebuilt during the past few years in concrete. The original wooden structure was finished in 1894 and has cost, with repairs, \$469,732.44.

Last Sunday's issue of the Detroit Tribune contained a half-page write-up, with cuts, of the manner in which Dr. John F. Deadman of Sault Ste. Marie, brother of Dr. A. The Cleveland Cliffs Co. Monday secured from the fire department a couple of hose carts, which the council had authorized the chief to loan. The company purchased 1,000 feet of hose recently and will station a hose cart at the Lucy and at the Maas Mines, each provided with 500 feet of hose. The use of the hose carts was granted on condition that the equipment could be used by the department whenever the fire fighting apparatus provided by the city proved insufficient in coping with a big blaze. The Cleveland Cliffs people have taken this means of protecting their property in other places, and it has been found to work very satisfactorily.

### By-Pass Planning

Dear Sir:

I couldn't agree more with your Dec. 19 editorial declaration of the Marquette by-pass end as a "death trap" designed by the devil. I also believe in giving the devil his due credit.

Responsibilities for planning, approving and building highways are carefully spread from Washington to our city hall. It is likely that several hundred persons had a hand in the planning and design of our "monster." They all goofed.

Law requires, however, that final plans for such routes be reviewed and approved by the local legislative body. In this case, it was our city commission of that time. The requirement is supposedly one of the ways of checking a mistake before it happens. Our city commission, using if it so chose, the technical knowledge at its command at the time — did in fact approve this abortion on Feb. 8, 1960.

Your suggestions for correcting the death trap are worthy of vigorous support. But more important is our opportunity to forecast other mistakes about to be made — then avoid them.

We're proud of major new installations in our community; the high school, St. Luke's Hospital, St. Michael's Church and school and Northern Michigan University's growing campus. These points will in turn generate a need for a safe reasonably fast intracity traffic route. That route will not be satisfactorily planned and provided for after the installations are in use. The best thinking of those planning the university, the school, the hospital and the city must be put in the arena now. And all of these parties have at their command one of the best planning firms in the country — by way of a federal government program predicated on the obvious need for technical assistance to solve local problems locally. The Villian-Leman firm has helped other communities develop their plans effectively and in turn avoid death traps.

When the high school is built, the hospital enlarged and Northern seeks to house seven to nine thousand students and other university related activity, it will be much too late to manufacture a satisfactory circulation system. We elect a city commission to use good judgment and other resources it may have to carry on the affairs of the city in the public interest.

We of the public have the responsibility to "watch dog" this whole operation to see that it works. The devil, if it appears in this case (and I'm suggesting it did in the by-pass case) will be none other than those of us who are content to sit and let our instrument laden ship of city be flown through the fog by acres who prefer to fly by the seat of their pants.

WASHINGTON—On this Christmas Eve it would be nice if official Washington — a breed not given to humility — pondered the message of that night in Bethlehem when the VIPs were left off the invitation list. This was the greatest event in the history of Christianity. A King of kings was to be born, and such a happening would seem to have called for all the

trappings of royalty, all the trumpeting and flourishes of a great court. But that was not the way it was. Instead, the first Christmas was a triumph for those who have come to be known, patronizingly, as the world's "little people."

## Bodies Drifting In Mist

WASHINGTON — "It's like watching bodies drifting through a mist. We can see the direction of movement. We know the movement has been going on for several months. But we can't measure this movement, much less be quite sure of its immediate or ultimate purpose."

In this suggestive but non-committal manner, one of those who man the local watchtowers recently described the Soviets' gradual but persistent reinforcement of their Chinese frontier. The region to which the reinforcement is mainly directed is the border of the most remote and vulnerable of all the provinces of Communist China, Sinkiang, in Central Asia.

### Bitter Complaint From Moscow

Attention was first concentrated on the Sino-Soviet border last September, when one of Moscow's more violent denunciations of Peking included a bitter complaint against "5,000 border violations" by Chinese Communist troops and citizens. An intensified watch has been kept since then.

By the normal rules of demagogical interpretation, it must be added, the Moscow statement of last September was mainly significant for another passage warning the Peking leaders that they could count on no support from "the armed might of the socialist camp" if they pursued certain Chinese "aims and interests" which did not deserve that support.

At that time, there seemed to be some possibility that the Chinese might be considering another attack on the still-undefended Indian border. Thus the September statement had to be interpreted primarily as a deterrent reminder that the Chinese might have trouble on their own border if they made further trouble on the Indian border.

### Serious Border Fighting In 1960

What is so striking about the Soviets' reinforcement of their border with China is the fact that it has been continuing, without remission, ever since last September, and therefore long after there was any likelihood of another Chinese adventure against India.

The frontiers of Sinkiang, which are now being reinforced, are just about the most remote and least penetrable area of the Soviet Union. Thus it has been learned only within the last year that quite serious border fighting broke out in this area as early as 1960, just after Sino-Soviet relations soured for good.

It is not exaggerating, in fact, to say that there was a brief border battle between Soviet and Chinese troops, for organized military units were engaged on each side. Since news of this battle took nearly three years to seep westwards, it can be seen why the present position on the Sinkiang frontier is hard to estimate precisely.

### Warning Hints Printed

As to the Soviet troop build-up on this remote frontier, there can be little doubt any longer, even though the watchers only see "bodies drifting through a mist." Soviet military publications have printed warning hints. Soviet troops are known with certainty to have been moved from Poland, and other troops are thought to have been transferred from East Germany.

As to the motive of this Soviet troop build-up, however, there are almost no limits on speculation. One suggestive item of evidence is the fact that the Poles recently made a fairly desperate effort to damp down the Sino-Soviet dispute. Wladyslaw Gomulka sent personal emissaries for this purpose, to Moscow, to Peking, to Belgrade, and to Rome and Paris for meetings with the French and Italian Communist leaders.

Judging by the ever-mourning venom and hysteria of the Peking attacks on Nikita S. Khrushchev, the Gomulka effort has got nowhere, at least as yet. Moreover, the Poles, like all the other Eastern European Communists, enjoy and benefit from the freedom of action conferred on them by the Moscow-Peking split. Hence, it seems likely that Gomulka was trying to prevent something worse than a mere split.

Again, the area being reinforced by the Soviets is decidedly suggestive. For a sustained border conflict in Sinkiang, so remote from the center and so hard to supply, would certainly impose a maximum strain on the crazy Chinese Communist economic-military machine, even if the border conflict were carefully limited. If Moscow wants to test the possibilities of causing an economic-military collapse in Communist China, the Sinkiang border is a good place for a modest experiment of this sort.

The great majority of analysts until very recently pooh-poohed the smallest suggestion that really bad trouble might be approaching on the Sino-Soviet border. Very likely, this conservative view of the matter is still the correct one. But it has to be noted that border trouble has lately begun to be regarded as "a real possibility" — not a probability, mind you, but a possibility serious enough to be weighed with vivid, somewhat anxious interest.

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## Game Warden's World

Contrary to some opinion, a game warden is made up of bones, muscle, nerves and blood, the same as anyone else. The only difference is he sleeps less, works longer, travels more and spends quite a bit less time with his family than the normal human being.

In the course of earning his public pay, a warden is a policeman, lawyer, mechanic, first aid man, grave digger, searcher, referee, salesman, bookkeeper, speechmaker, good will ambassador and the husband of a wife who is his unpaid private secretary, switchboard operator, nurse, veterinarian, information bureau and confidant.

Some people call him a bum, but most recognize that, without him, the outdoors would be a no man's land, a lawless, unruly, corrupted anarchy void of fish and game.

So call him warden, conservation officer, brush cop or Joe, he is here to keep law and order. One night, he may be up in an airplane. Next day he may plod along on snowshoes. He may streak along in an ice boat at 80 miles an hour or turtle past in a duck boat, but barely moves against the wind.

Few jobs have so many duties. Hunters, fishermen and trappers must have licenses, the law says. Wardens must check for these. There are legal and illegal ways to hunt and fish. Wardens must keep things legal. There are open and closed seasons on fish and game. Wardens must keep violators from poaching, from hauling home more than their share.

Deer are killed by cars on highways. Wardens must collect these animals, sell them (if they are salvagable) or bury them (if they are beyond salvage). On the endless red tape of government, wardens must report every penny of state money they handle—and make up any deficits from their own pocket.

Men are killed or injured while hunting. Wardens must investigate and, with the sheriff, prosecute for reckless use of firearms.

Wardens must patrol the lakes for reckless speedboaters. Wardens often are called on for finding lost hunters. In emergencies such as plane crashes or fugitives on the loose, wardens are often called out to

patrol the territory that they—and few others—are well acquainted with.

And all this time, in laughter and tears—but without pay and praise—the warden's wife works endlessly through the hectic days and lonely nights of an extraordinary life filled with skunks and raccoons, blizzards and floods, telephones and doorbells, and not too rarely a habitual violator hellbent on vengeance against the man she has married.

In winter, when there is time, the warden must visit the county clerk and page through license stubs. If a name doesn't have a familiar ring, he checks it out. Perhaps it is a nonresident who bought a \$5 deer license reserved for the home folks. More than one out of state fisherman has been found using a Milwaukee railroad station as his home address.

What other chores? Repair equipment. Patrol refuges. Watch for snowshoe tracks which might indicate illegal beaver trapping. Guard spring holes, for here it is that trout gather when temperatures plunge downward. Watch for deer shiners. Answer letters, memos.

A warden's life is not a jolly one, not particularly safe and secure. Hazards surround him. He is in the woods with hundreds of rifle toting hunters. More than once, a warden has been shot at, wrestled with a rifle stock, bled to the ground, spilled from a boat.

There was the time when H. W. MacKenzie, former chief warden and department director, was accosted by three men, struck on the head with an ax and left for dead in the woods. Einer Johnson was shot in the back while questioning a fur poolegger. Barney Devine was so clubbed that even his wife failed to recognize him.

And there are the hours and miles on slippery, desolate, lonely backwoods roads.

True, the checks come regularly, though they are never large, considering the long hours, the early morning vigils, the night after night on patrol. Field wardens make from \$6,100 to \$7,800 a year.

But most of all the good things in a warden's life come through knowledge that in the helping hand he lends is the strength so sorely needed to conserve, restore and protect the natural resources that are yours and mine.

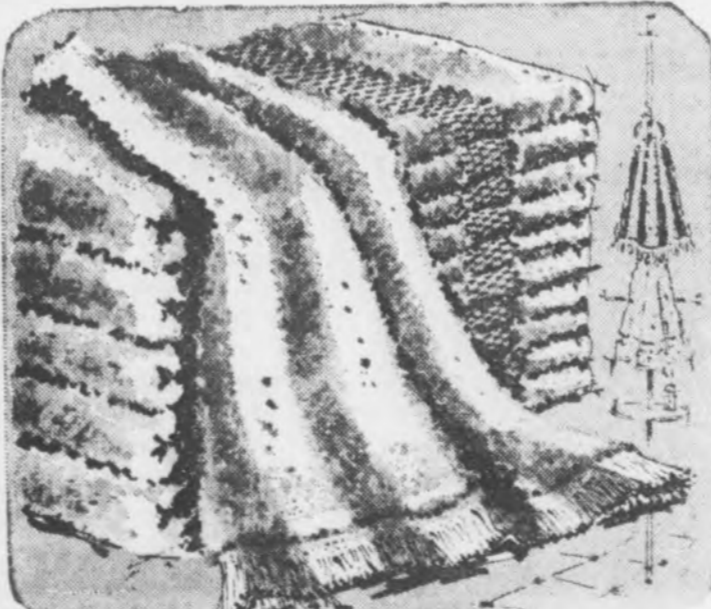
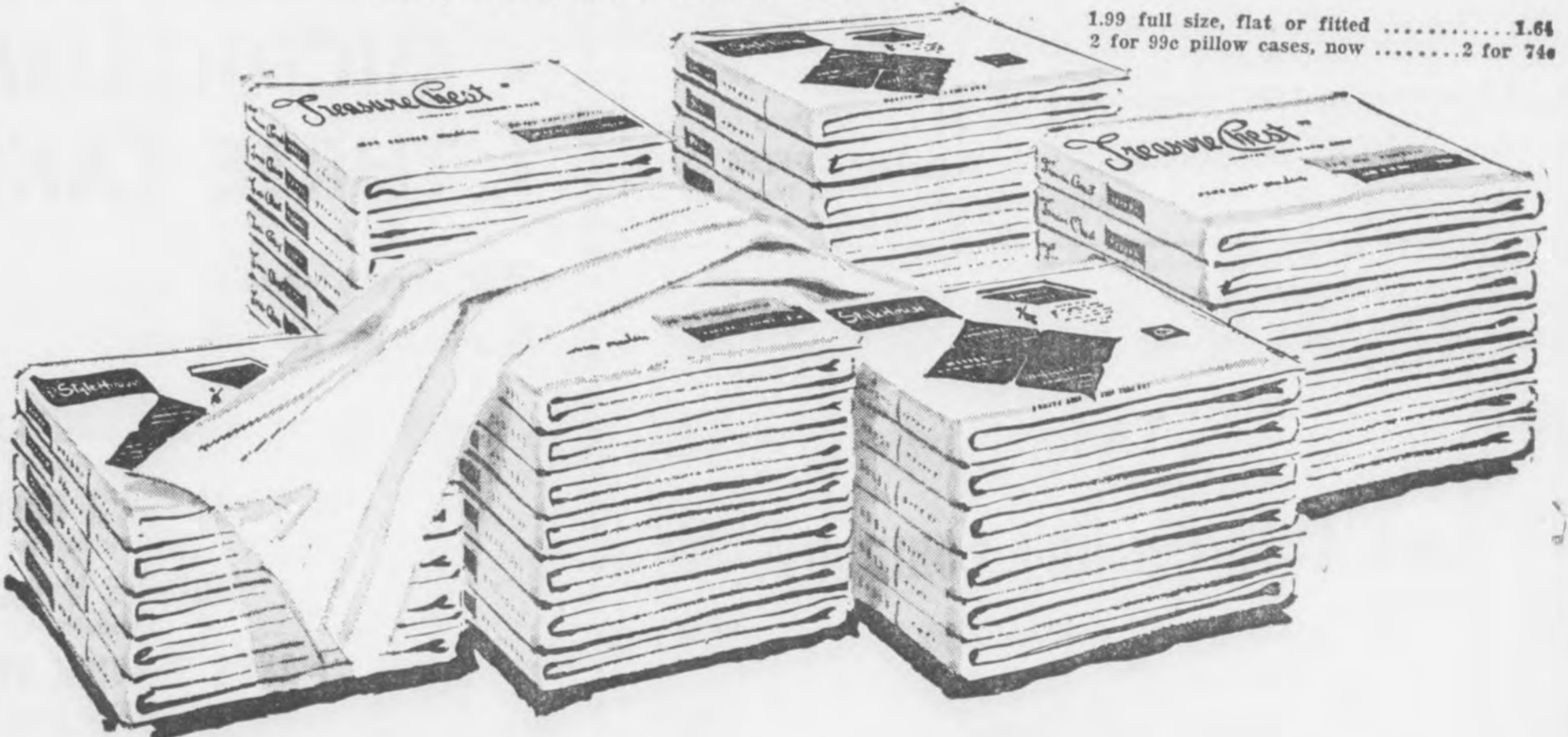

### Financial Scene: Interest Rate Juggling Effect Eyed

By SAM DAWSON  
NEW YORK (AP) — Interest rate juggling between sections of the nation and between competing savings institutions is bolstering the belief of those who look for general firming of interest after the traditional January lull.

Yields on savings are being raised now to 4.25 per cent or higher by some New York savings banks and some savings and loan associations in Florida. But in California, where the rates are still highest, some savings and loan groups say they'll cut back Jan. 1 from 5 per cent to 4.85 per cent. Most commercial banks are held by federal regulations to 4 per cent.

#### Competition High

In New York much of the competition for savings is between different types of institutions. In Florida, and to some extent in New York, the competition is with California where the higher yields have been attracting funds from across the nation — funds which Florida would like to use in its own building program.

Predictions of generally rising interest rates when the new year is well under way are coming from at least two sources. Chairman William McChesney Martin of the Federal Reserve Board has told Congress that if the federal tax cut is passed and stimulates the economy as hoped for, increased business borrowing will push interest rates up.

#### Tightening Seen

The U.S. Savings & Loan League sees a tightening next year in the supply of funds available for mortgage loans. Since it also predicts continued demand for mortgage money, the league looks for the trend

toward higher mortgage rates in some parts of the nation, which started late this year, to continue for several more months.

January could see a lull in any movement toward tighter money and higher costs. Business borrows in November and December to finance increased inventories. In January these loans are normally repaid. The return flow of money into the market makes credit easier and reduces pressure on interest rates.

#### Some Big 'Ifs'

But if business activity, and construction demand, continues high in coming months, the demand for more funds could tighten the market.

By the same token, if the economy turns down unexpectedly, the Federal Reserve's job

would be to ease credit as a possible stimulant, rather than to keep it moderately tight to fend off a runaway boom.

The board is also interested in keeping short-term rates fairly high to discourage an outflow to foreign money markets that would increase any threat to U.S. gold reserves.

# Copper Country's Great Christmas Eve Tragedy Took Place 50 Years Ago

 A "Constant Reader," Bernard Suino of Grosse Pointe Woods, called the other day with the reminder that this Christmas Eve will mark the 50th anniversary of a senseless, pointless tragedy in Calumet, in the heart of the Michigan Copper Country.

Suino is of the opinion there should be a "lest we forget" memorial of sorts in this column, to which I lend agreement. So, for reference let us turn now to a recent book by Paul M. Angle, "Crossroads: 1913," published by Rand McNally & Co.

In mid-July of 1913, the Western Federation of Miners, led by Charles M. Moyer, notified the mine owners of the area that there would be a strike unless the demands of the workers were settled by negotiation.

The men wanted an eight-hour day and minimum wage of \$3, but their principal grievance was directed at the one-man drill, which had been introduced in 1907. The new device, which had replaced the two-man drill by 1913, not only reduced employment but it was a "monster" to use. The miners had a phrase for it: "The widow maker."

Anyhow, the mine operators refused negotiations and a strike began in August. There were repeated clashes between the strikers and armed guards imported by the supervisors of Houghton County, so eventually Gov. Woodbridge N. Ferris called out the Michigan National Guard, all of it, 2,700 strong, with instructions to "end the violence."

The Guard succeeded in its mission. Moreover, for perhaps the first time in a labor dispute to that point, strikers freely admitted they received "a fair shake" from militia. That in itself is worth a footnote in history. But now we come to the inane tragedy, as Paul Angle has set it down in "Crossroads: 1913."

Angle writes, "the mine owners announced that they would introduce the eight-hour day on Jan. 1, 1914, and would reemploy all men except those guilty of violence."

"At the same time the formation of a Citizens' Alliance, organized for the ostensible purpose of bringing the opposing parties together, was announced. The strikers believed the Alliance to be only a front for the companies and would have nothing to do with it."

"Christmas approached, with no end to the strike in sight. On Christmas Eve the women's auxiliary of the Western Federation arranged a children's party at Calumet."

"By early evening the sec-

ond story hall was filled to capacity: this would be the only Christmas celebration most of the youngsters would have. Just as the program was about to begin, someone yelled 'Fire!' The children panicked, ran for the one narrow stairway — and piled up there. In a few minutes 72 died.

"There was no fire . . ." There was a brutal ending, too. The union president, Charles Moyer, refusing to accept a relief fund of \$25,000 from the Citizens' Alliance, was attacked by a group of armed thugs, who beat him and shot him in the back. They put him aboard a train bound for Chicago with the threat "to hang him if he should ever return to the Copper Country."

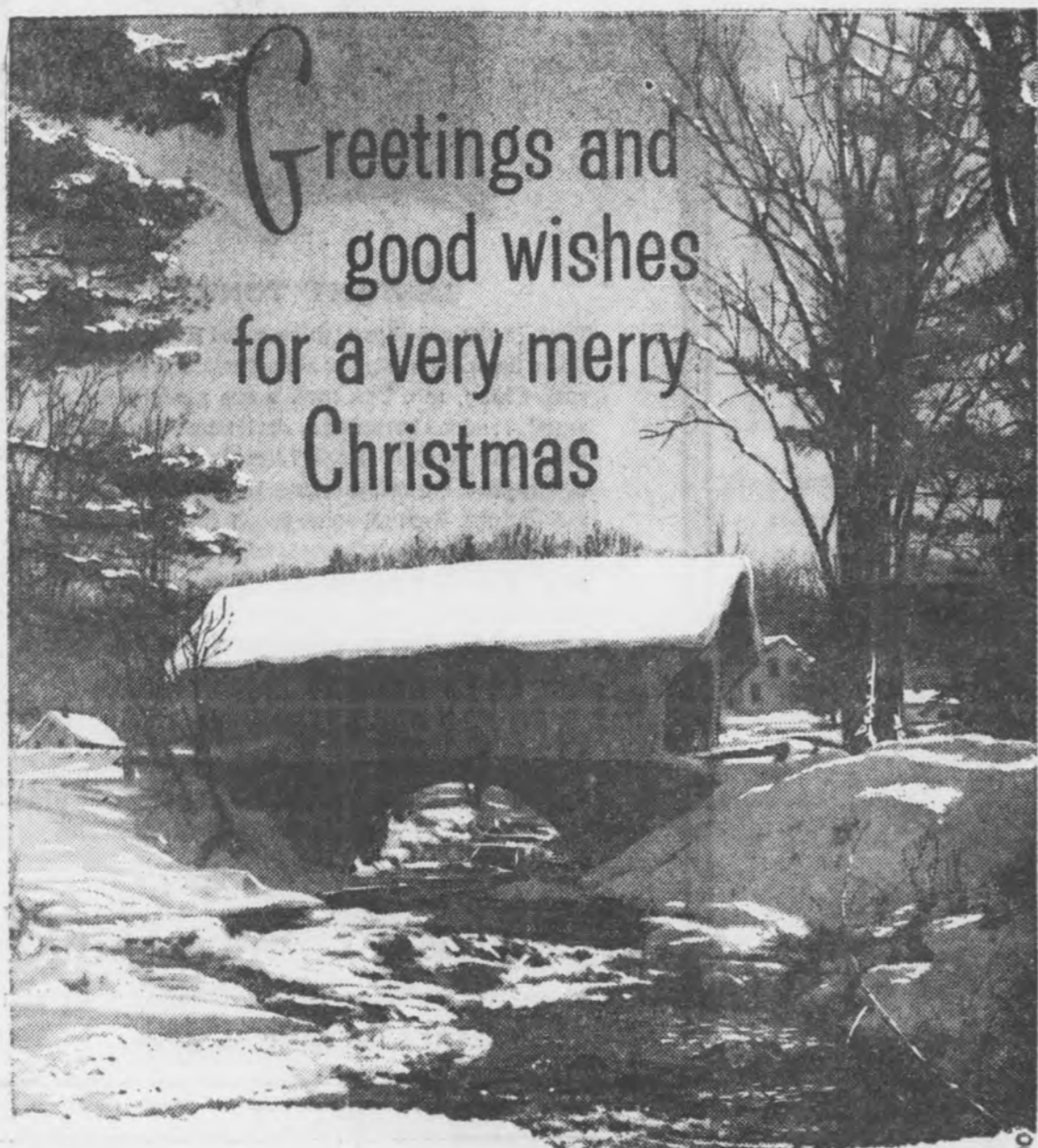
Author Angle provides these footnotes: "The man who yelled 'Fire' was never found, and a coroner's jury was never able to fix the blame for the tragedy. Late in April, 1914, the union, funds exhausted, capitulated. In fact the men had won all of their demands except union recognition."

### Japanese, Korean Students At NMU Spend Yule Far From Home

There's no place like home for the holidays, but Yoko and Bo won't be there.

Yoko Sugihara, from Japan, and Bo Heung, Lee, from Korea, students at Northern Michigan University, haven't been home in five years.

They'll spend Christmas with families in Marquette and, except for justifiable pangs of homesickness, they're as merry as any college student home for the holidays.

Yoko, who's been bubbling over with Christmas spirit since September, and Bo enjoy their adopted Christmas customs so much that they intend to take them back across the Pacific.

**Buddhists Join Christians**

Actually, both of them had celebrated Japanese and Korea versions of an American Christmas before coming to study in the United States. Bo points out that American Christmas customs have been spread overseas by soldiers, missionaries and government employees.

In both Korea and Japan, for instance, people say "Merry Christmas" — in English. In Japan, Yoko says, Christmas is highly commercialized and Buddhists join Christians in the festivities.

**Family Holiday**

Their favorite part of the American Christmas celebration is that it's a family holiday, a time for families to gather, put up decorations, sing carols and play games.

For Yoko and Bo, the American family holiday is a mixture of the bitter and the sweet. Seeing other Northern students holding reunions with their families makes the two foreign students miss their own families.

**Wrote To 18 Papers**

Yoko, who said, "I just telephoned my mother on her birthday—last March," wrote letters to 18 American newspapers asking for help in finding a sponsor for her studies in the United States. "First I wrote the letters and then I told my mother. She helped me to come because she'd want-

ed to study here when she was a girl, too."

One American Christmas custom they want to continue when they return home is the decorating. Although their own families decorate the rooms of their homes to some extent, Yoko and Bo love the Christmas trees and especially the outdoor decorations.

Bo, who rooms at the home of Harry Rajala, at 306 Waldo St., will spend Christmas Day with a friend in Marquette. He's a graduate student at Northern, transferring here this year from Piedmont College, Demorest, Ga.

**Celebrated Hanukkah**

For his four previous Christmas vacations in the U.S., Bo traveled to visit friends across the United States. Because he wants to get to know Marquette people better, he'll spend this vacation here.

Yoko will spend Christmas at 816 College Ave., where she lives with the John Kohlek family. For her first three winters in the U.S., Yoko lived in Detroit with a Jewish family, and with them she celebrated Hanukkah.

On Christmas Day, Yoko's family will invite their relatives for dinner. After a prayer, they'll feast on sukiyaki, a dish of meat, tender bamboo shoots, green onions and spinach, topped with soy sauce and eaten with rice.

**Prelude To New Year's**

When he was in Korea, Bo invited his Christian friends to his home to eat a special dinner cooked by his mother, to exchange gifts and to go to church after the celebration. But Yoko and Bo won't miss Christmas with their families half as much as they'll miss the New Year's celebration. Just as Thanksgiving is the prelude to Christmas here, Christmas is the prelude to New Year's in Korea and Japan.

**Celebrate For 2 Weeks**

For the Japanese and Koreans, New Year's is more than the big day of the year. It's celebrated for two weeks, from the first of January to the 15th. There will be parties

and more parties, special games for the New Year's celebration and visits to the graves of the families' ancestors.

People will wear their best clothes, and in Japan girls will wear special kimonos. Mothers will cook their special recipes, and in Korea, neighbors and relatives will exchange their specialties.

Although they dread the day they'll say goodbye to their American friends, Yoko and Bo, figuring that the more holidays you have the better, are looking forward to the day when they can combine the Christmas traditions they've learned in the United States with the New Year's celebration in their homelands.

Post Office Remodeling Job Okayed

MICHIGAMME — Modernization of the post office at Michigamme was assured today with announcement by Postmaster General John A. Gronouski that a contract has been awarded to Marshall S. Treado, Michigamme, to remodel and rent the building to the Post Office Department. "Although we are continuing to build new post offices where they are needed," Gronouski said, "we are constantly re-assessing our lease construction program to determine whether present buildings can be altered or remodeled to take care of an expanding volume of mail. In this instance it was determined that a modernization process would be more economical to the government and still satisfy the needs of the postal service in this area." Under the department's rental program Treado will remodel the building on Main St. and rent it to the department for three years, with renewal options running up to six years. The department's capital investment is limited substantially to postal equipment, while the building remains under private ownership with the owner paying local real estate taxes. The remodeling is expected to be completed about May 31, 1964. It will include the addition of 92 square feet of interior space; addition of toilet facilities; addition of hot water tank and fixture; remodeling the front of building; repair and repainting of exterior walls, and the addition of a lettered sign seven feet high, "U. S. Post Office, Michigamme, Michigan," across the front of the building.

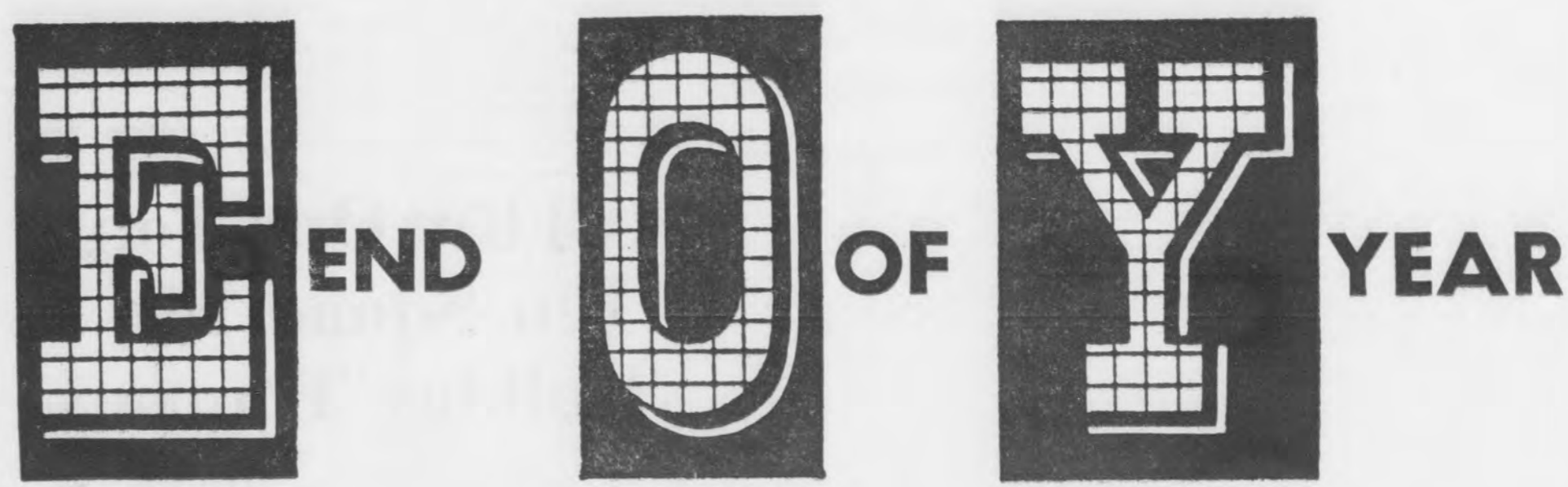

# Fight Promoters Split Over Effect Of Killing Boxing On Network TV

NEW YORK (AP) — Boxing promoters who have staged fight shows with and without television had differing opinions today as to whether a total black-out of fights on television will help or hurt the hardy old sport.

Herman Taylor of Philadelphia, 76-year-old dean of American fight promoters, said "personally I can't complain about TV," but added "there is no question about TV doing boxing no good."

**Live With It**  
"We have to live with TV," said Chris Dundee of Miami Beach, Fla. "I think a lot of fans look for the Friday night fights on TV."

"Boxing will enjoy a new lease on life," said Archie Litman of Pittsburgh. "It may take longer and be more difficult to develop headline attractions. But the fans will return to the practice of paying to see a fight."

"I think one show a week on TV would help boxing," said Sam Silverman of Boston. "It has kept interest up in boxing and done a lot for it."

Actually the ancient sport hasn't been knocked off the air waves yet. But the old guy is staggering.

Back in the 1950s there were six network fight shows a week. They were beamed over regional and national networks on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday,

and Saturday nights. Since 1944

The Gillette-sponsored Friday night bouts from Madison Square Garden and other major arenas, have been telecast since 1944. It is the longest continuous sponsored program on television.

It is the last regular fight program on television and it is tottering. The American Broadcasting Co. confirmed Monday that it plans to drop boxing from network scheduling in 1964, possibly in April.

A Gillette spokesman said: "This was the network's decision. We realize ABC's problem with declining ratings. Enough people just weren't watching the show and the network decided to drop it."

ABC and Gillette were reported seeking another sports program to replace the fight cards. Football, college and pro, is getting a large share of the TV advertisers' dollars.

# Howe Picked As Canada's '63 Athlete

TORONTO (AP) — Canadian sports writers and broadcasters have named Gordie Howe, veteran right winger for the Detroit Red Wings, Canada's outstanding male athlete for 1963.

The 35-year-old forward from Floral, Sask., one of hockey's all-time greats, barely edged out Russ Jackson, quarterback of the Ottawa Rough Riders of the Eastern Football Conference in the Canadian Press Poll.

In the balloting among 154 writers and broadcasters, Howe received 220 points and Jackson 215. Points were counted on a 3-2-1 basis for first, second and third-place votes.

**Broke Records**  
Howe scored his 545th career goal, Nov. 10, breaking the National Hockey League record set by the retired Rocket Richard of Montreal. Howe won the NHL scoring championship for the sixth time in the 1962-63 season, was selected as the most valuable player in the NHL for the sixth time and was named to the league all-star team for the eighth time.

"It's a tremendous thrill," Howe said of the latest award. "I will always treasure it."

CHICAGO (AP) — Ohio State registered its fifth victory in eight starts Monday night but Michigan State and Purdue were Big Ten losers in basketball.

The Bucks defeated Houston 79-62 at home as Gary Braddis hit 29 points and Jim Shaffer 20. OSU led by only four points early in the second half, but scored eight straight for a 39-27 bulge and never was threatened again.

At Provo, Utah, Michigan State bowed to Brigham Young 95-90 for its third defeat in eight games. The Spartans took a 52-50 halftime edge as Fred Thomann poured in 26 points. But he was held to seven in the last period and BYU took charge.

Jack Christiansen, whose San Francisco 49ers were the only team to beat the Bears in 14 regular season games, thinks the Giants will win. The Giants thumped the 49ers 48-14 later and there were complaints about rubbing it in.

**Leading**  
Buddy Parker of Pittsburgh and Nick Skorich of Philadelphia hedge a bit because of the weather, with snow and icy winds swirling around the East.

Wind and snow can make a mockery of the slim odds favoring the Giants, Parker, beaten by the Giants in the final winner-take-all game for the Eastern title, favors the Bears "under normal playing conditions."

Skorich, whose Eagles lost two to the Giants and one to the Bears, leans toward the Giants "on a day for football."

Don Shula of the Baltimore Colts refused to pick a winner. His Colts lost twice to the Bears and dropped the season opener to the Giants who made a great second-half comeback.

"I think the New York Giants will win," said Christiansen. "I feel the big difference is in offensive football. The Giants' offense is a better, more sound type based in good running and good passing. I feel the defenses are just about the same. The defensive lines and linebackers are old pros, the secondary for each a combination of experience and youth."

"I think the condition of the field is going to be a big factor," said Parker. "If it is frozen hard it will be in the favor of the team with the best passing attack and that gives the Giants and Y. A. Tittle the edge. It all boils down to the league's best offense against the league's best defense. Under normal playing conditions I would favor a defensive team like the Bears."

**Two Best Defenses**  
"This is a meeting between the two best defensive teams in the NFL," said Skorich. "Chicago has the better defensive line. Linebackers are about even. The Bears have a slight edge on defense overall with New York the edge offensively because of Tittle. Therefore, give the Giants a slight edge on a day for football. If weather is bad and defense dominated, the Bears rate the edge. Tittle has had bad days in bad weather and this could be the difference."

### Englishman Started Yule Card Custom

As much a part of Christmas as the tree, the giving of gifts and the holly wreath are Christmas cards.

In ancient times, the custom of exchanging greeting cards among friends (and, in modern times, businesses) was unknown. The practice is a little more than a century old and is supposed to have been initiated in this country in Albany, N. Y.

#### Idea Caught Fire

It seems there was a dry goods merchant by the name of R. J. Pease in the capitol of the Empire State who thought it might be a good idea to "greet" his friends and customers at the holiday season by way of a Christmas card. The idea caught fire in his imagination and soon he had designed, printed and mailed the first examples of Christmas cards in the United States.

Of course, his intent in sending his "greetings" at Christmastime to his friends wasn't altogether altruistic. He used the card as an advertising device as well.

#### Another Symbol

It was by coincidence that another new symbol of Christmas was introduced at this same time. It was when Victoria of

England took unto herself a German-born consort by the name of Prince Albert. In Germany, the tree had long been a part of the Christmas festivities, and when the prince changed addresses from Germany to Buckingham Palace, he brought his German custom of the decorated Christmas tree with him. The idea "took," became popular in England and was transplanted to the United States.

Actually, the first commercial Christmas card is credited to an Englishman named Henry Cole in 1843.

Cole never intended that his idea be commercialized. All he wanted to do was create a novel way of saying "Merry Christmas" to his friends. Thus he designed a card commissioned a British Royal Academy artist by the name of John Calcott Horsley to execute the work. It was a simple card depicting a typical family of that time gathered together at a holiday dinner.

At the conclusion of the work, "Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year" were added, a thousand copies lithographed and later hand colored.

He sent out his cards to his friends and little dreamed that he had created a Christmas tradition. They were an immediate success — and have continued to be successful.

#### STAR SINGING

As they go from house to house at Christmas, modern carol singers may be aided by the rays of an electric lantern or a flashlight. This reflects an old custom known as star singing. Early carolers in Eur-

ope used to make their rounds carrying a large, lighted star, representing the Star of Bethlehem. Later the star was replaced by lanterns and torches.

#### SHOE TREATS

Spanish children, at Epiphany, expect the Three Kings to bring them gifts, and they set out shoes filled with straw or

grain for the horses the Kings ride.

#### DECKING THE HALLS

Decorating with red and

green, traditional at Christmas, traces back to the early use of red-berried green holly to "deck the halls."

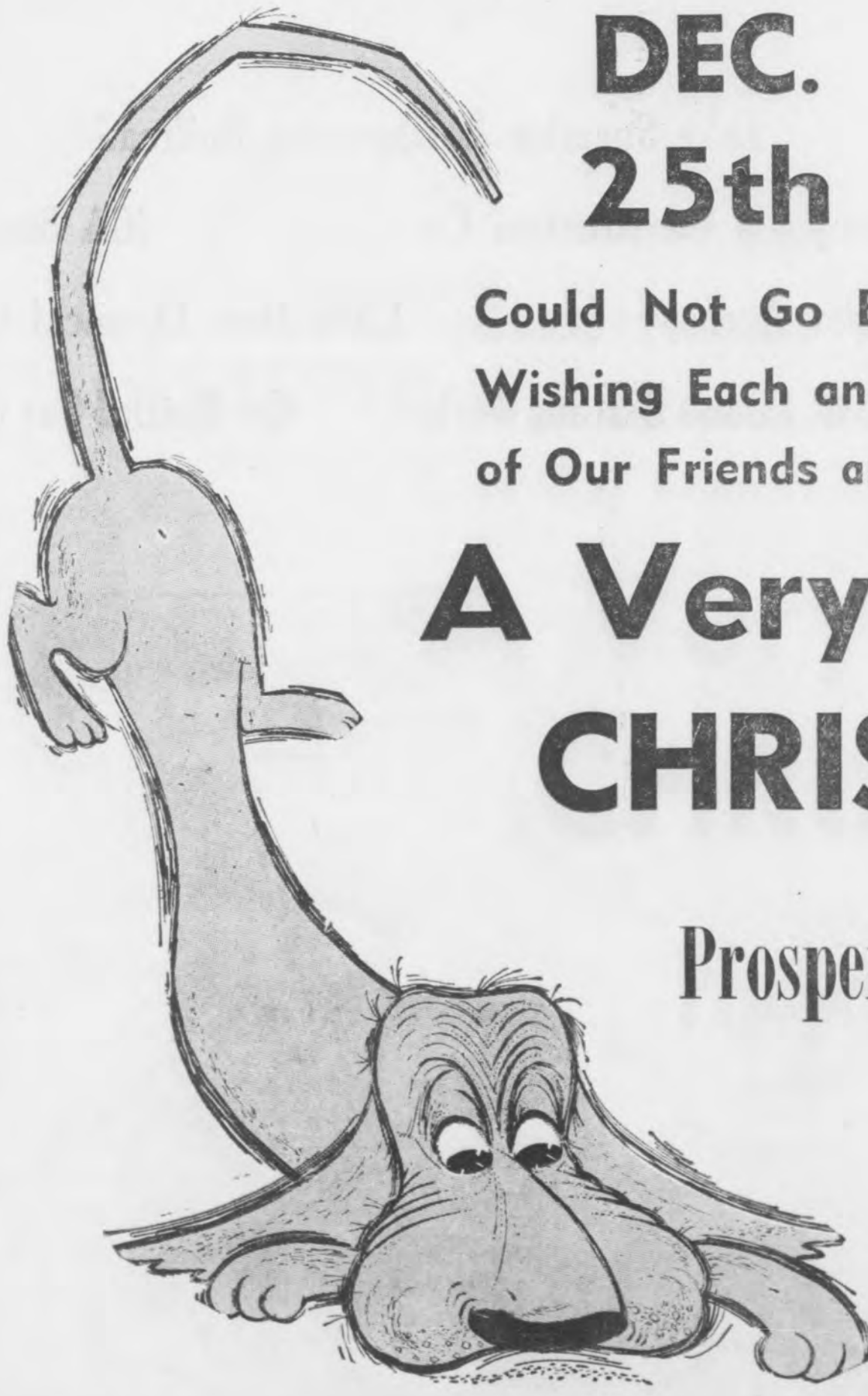

## Host Of Superstitions Tied In With Yule Observance

The willingness of people all over the world to believe myths and legends that have been passed down from generation to generation is well known.

Because Christmas — and the festival of the holiday season — is so interwoven with mysticism, legend and historical records, many superstitions have resulted in various countries.

**Created In 1882**  
The very Santa Claus story itself is perhaps the greatest of all the Christmas myths, and as research has revealed, is expressed differently in various parts of the world.

As a matter of fact, the actual modern symbol of Santa Claus with his round belly, twinkling eyes, rosy cheeks, flowing white beard, driving his reindeer-drawn sleigh across the sky on Christmas Eve from the North Pole where he has a mammoth toy factory, was created in New York as early as 1882, a mere 81 years ago.

There are, however, equally as fanciful beliefs in other parts of the world, and while there is no documentary evidence to support actual belief in these superstitions, they are nevertheless accepted as legend and passed on, keeping them alive.

**Peasants' Belief**  
For example, if you were born on Christmas Eve in Scotland, it wouldn't be at all amiss if you believed that you had the power to see spirits and, yes, even to command them to do your bidding.

If this idea gives you pause and you mentally raise a quizzical

eyebrow in disbelief, consider the peasantry of France. These gentle folk believe (the story goes) that all babies born on Christmas Eve will have a ready and facile tongue. We wonder if by that they mean "gift of gab."

But that isn't all with these French folk of the countryside. They also believe that those babies born on Christmas Day will be gifted with logic; a moot quality, one often born with the progenitor of argument. But, ah, the maidens of France who, born on Christmas Day, come in for the big boon, for these lucky mademoiselles, it is said, will be witty, wise and virtuous!

The Silesians have a pixieish sense of legend — or perhaps humor — when it comes to the gifts earmarked for babies born on Christmas. And how they arrived at this equation beggars logic, because they claim that all such babies who see the light of day on this holy day are destined to be either lawyers or thieves!

In Ireland — land of the leprechaun and other little folk from never-never land — they have a belief that if one dies on Christmas Day, he goes straight to Heaven. The doors to Paradise are open for such fortunate, and Purgatory is completely bypassed no matter what kind of malefactor the deceased was on earth.

The farmers of Denmark have a legend they keep alive — but this one is couched in the economic formulas of life. They believe that baked goods, and particularly bread that is made

right, and send me my true love tonight," is a jingle that is highly romantic and might be applied to either sex. But not so

in northern England. In this region of our English cousins, a maiden with yearning heart used this as a supplication for a mate, but only if she placed a piece of holly under her pillow during the observance of Christmas.

One word of warning to unmarried ladies who might find themselves, for whatever reason, in the Swiss Alps. Beauty is beauty, and no one denies the majesty of the Alps nor that the invigorating climate of this part of the world is for the hardy ones. But should our Miss be wielding her alpenstock high on the mountain and meet up with a romantic Swiss gentleman who offers her a sprig of edelweiss, she's had it. This is the signal of a marriage proposal, and when the unwary Miss accepts, she accepts the donor with it. (That's at Christmas time, of course.)

## Carols Descended From Folk Dance Of Middle Ages

Today's Christmas carol is a domesticated descendant of a lively folk dance.

The carol started out in the Middle Ages as a circular coun-

try dance, called a "carole" in French, according to World Book Encyclopedia. Some of the early Christians looked askance at dancing, however, and the carol soon lost its steps.

The lyrics of the songs that had accompanied the dance began to change, too, and eventually the "macaronic" style appeared. This consisted of tacking a Latin phrase on to the popular lines, so that the people sang:

Make we joy now in this feast  
In qua Christus natus est  
They didn't necessarily understand the Latin, although it carried on the sense of the song, but the stately Latin words gave them a religious image.

In 1223 St. Francis of Assisi started the custom of placing a creche, or miniature Nativity scene, in the church at Christmas time. People began to act out the events of the Nativity — one of the steps in the development of mystery plays — and then to compose carols to sing with the plays. These led to the French noels, strictly Christmas songs, which, in turn, inspired the English carol.

Carols, both secular and religious, flourished in England until the Puritans substituted their more spiritual hymns.

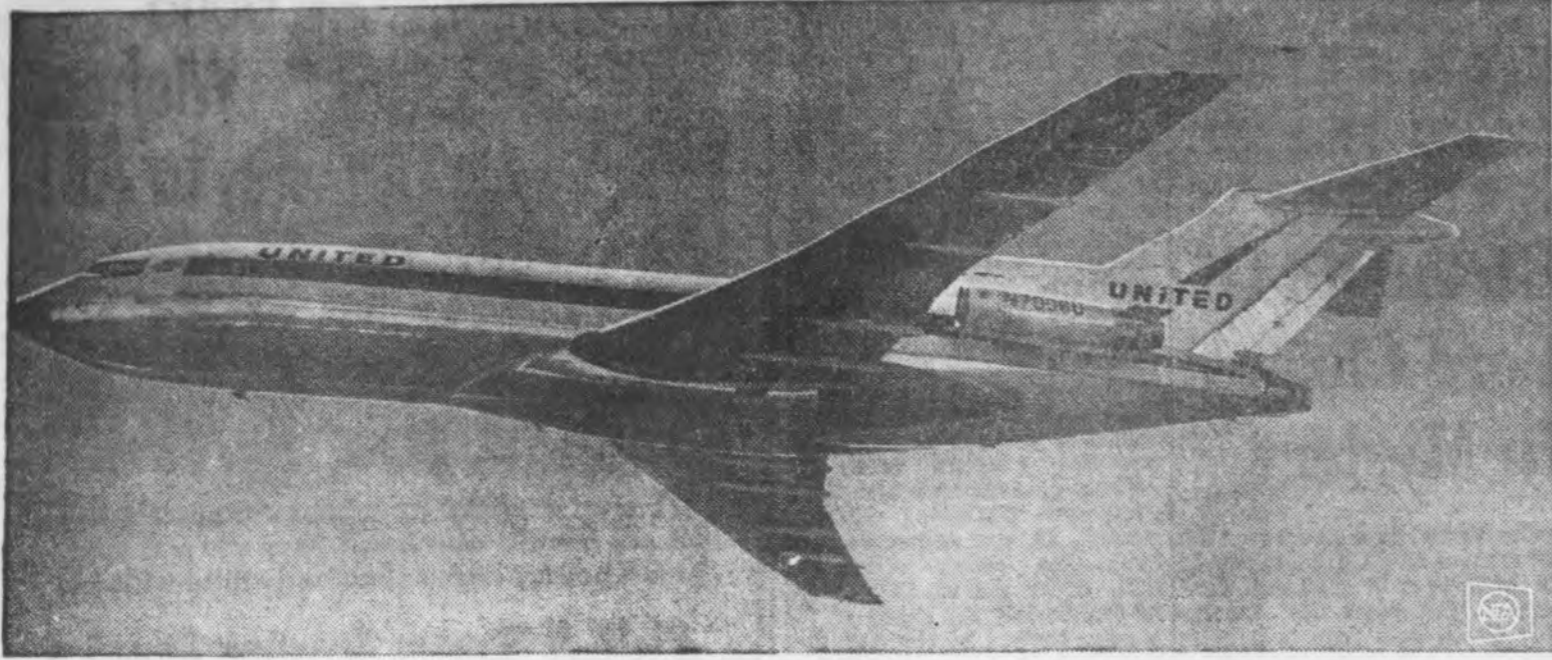

**Little Girl Inspired Yule Rose Legend**

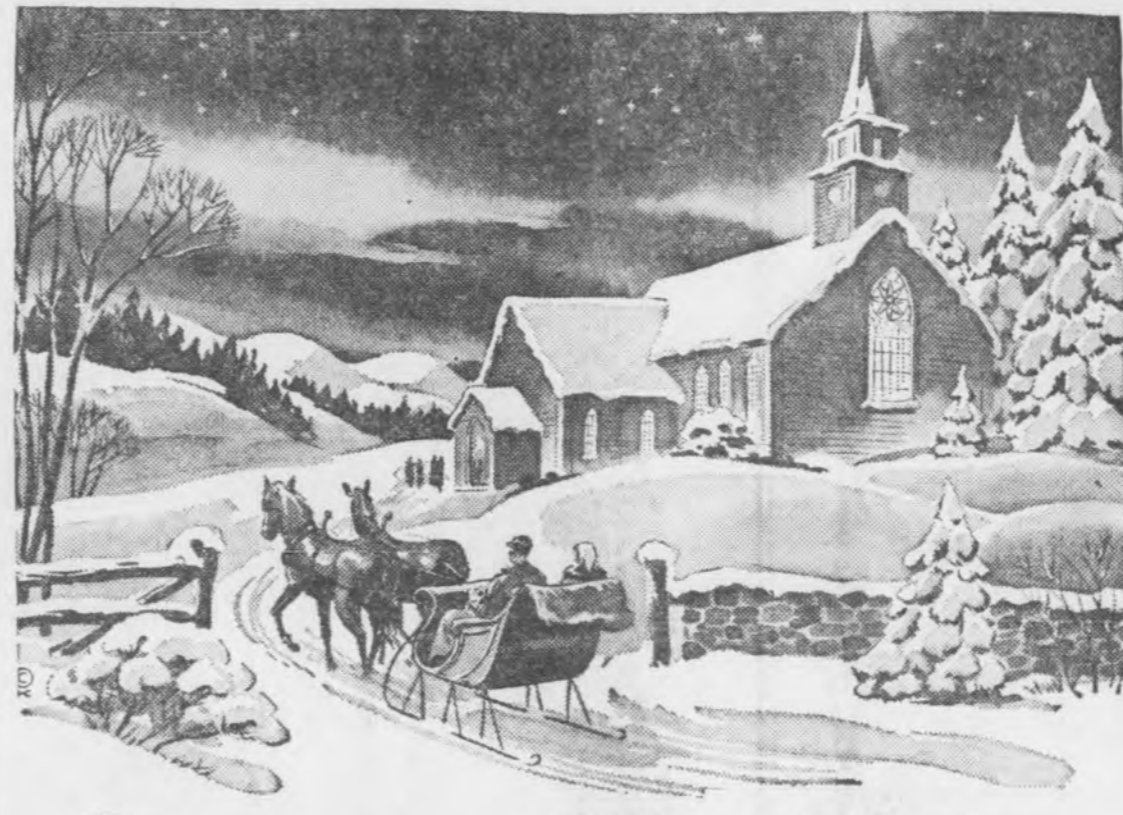
The legend of the Christmas Rose says that a little girl followed the shepherds as they

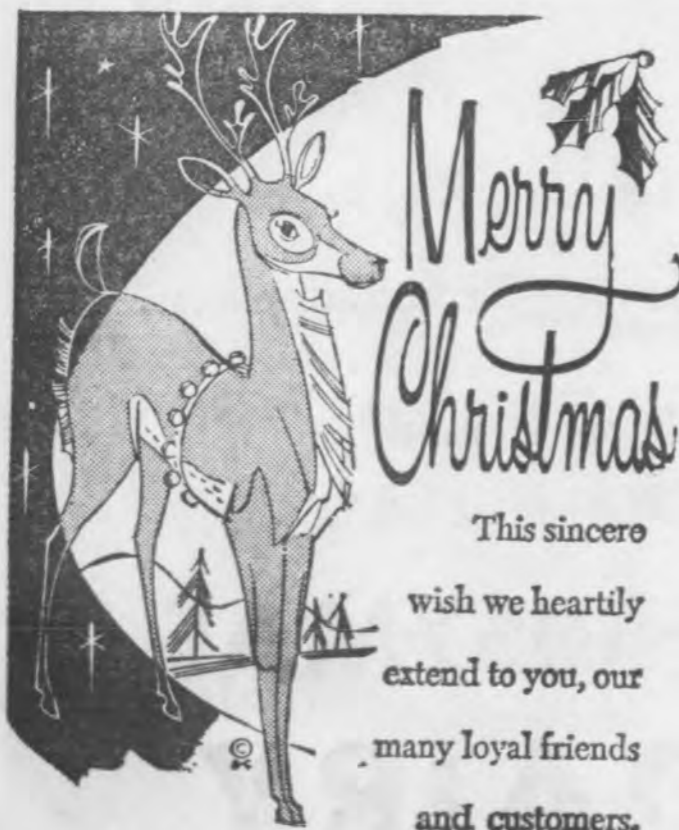

Holy Thorn Tree Blossoms Every Yule In England

him the Holy Grail used at the Last Supper.

As St. Joseph came toward the town, he stopped to rest on the crest of a hill. He drove his

staff into the ground and it took root immediately.

The next day, Christmas Eve, it had become a Thorn Tree and was covered with blossoms.

The Mysterious "Christmas Tree"

In Glastonbury, Somerset, England, stands a tree called the Holy Thorn which is believed to have bloomed without fail on Christmas Day for over a thousand years.

The famous legend of the Thorn Tree says: Two days before Christmas, sixty-three years after the birth of Christ, St. Joseph of Arimathea, who had with him the Holy Grail, paused to rest on a hill outside of Glastonbury. He drove his staff into the ground. It took root and the next day, Christmas Eve, it had grown into a flowering thorn tree.

Animals Had Major Roles In Nativity

Long before the birth of Christ, Isaiah the prophet predicted "the ox knows his Owner, and the ass his Master's crib" (Isaiah 1:3). Because of the part animals played in the Nativity, legends have grown up all over the world about them.

It was a widespread story that animals had the power of speech at midnight on Christmas Eve and that they then knelt in adoration.

**Song Of Praise**  
Bees hummed a song of praise then, but only those dear to God could hear them. Birds sang all night on that holy Eve, and their song was more melodious than ever . . . and because the cow warmed the Baby Jesus with her breath, it is sweeter than that of any animal.  
The lovable St. Francis, friend to men and nature, felt

that all creation should rejoice at Christmas, and since the dumb creatures had no other way of doing so, they should have better food and more comfort.

He asked that people throw corn and grain on the streets for the birds to enjoy the festival too, and all, as he says, "for reverence of the Son of God Whom on such a night the blessed Virgin Mary did lay down in the stall between the ox and the ass."

A phenomenon occurs every Christmas, not known by many, that may be witnessed by anyone in the Cathedral of the Close in Washington, D. C., or Glastonbury, Somerset, England.

It is the story of the Holy Thorn Tree that blossoms in England every Dec. 25 and in Washington some time during the same month.

The legend relates that two days before Christmas, St. Joseph of Arimathea approached Glastonbury. He carried with

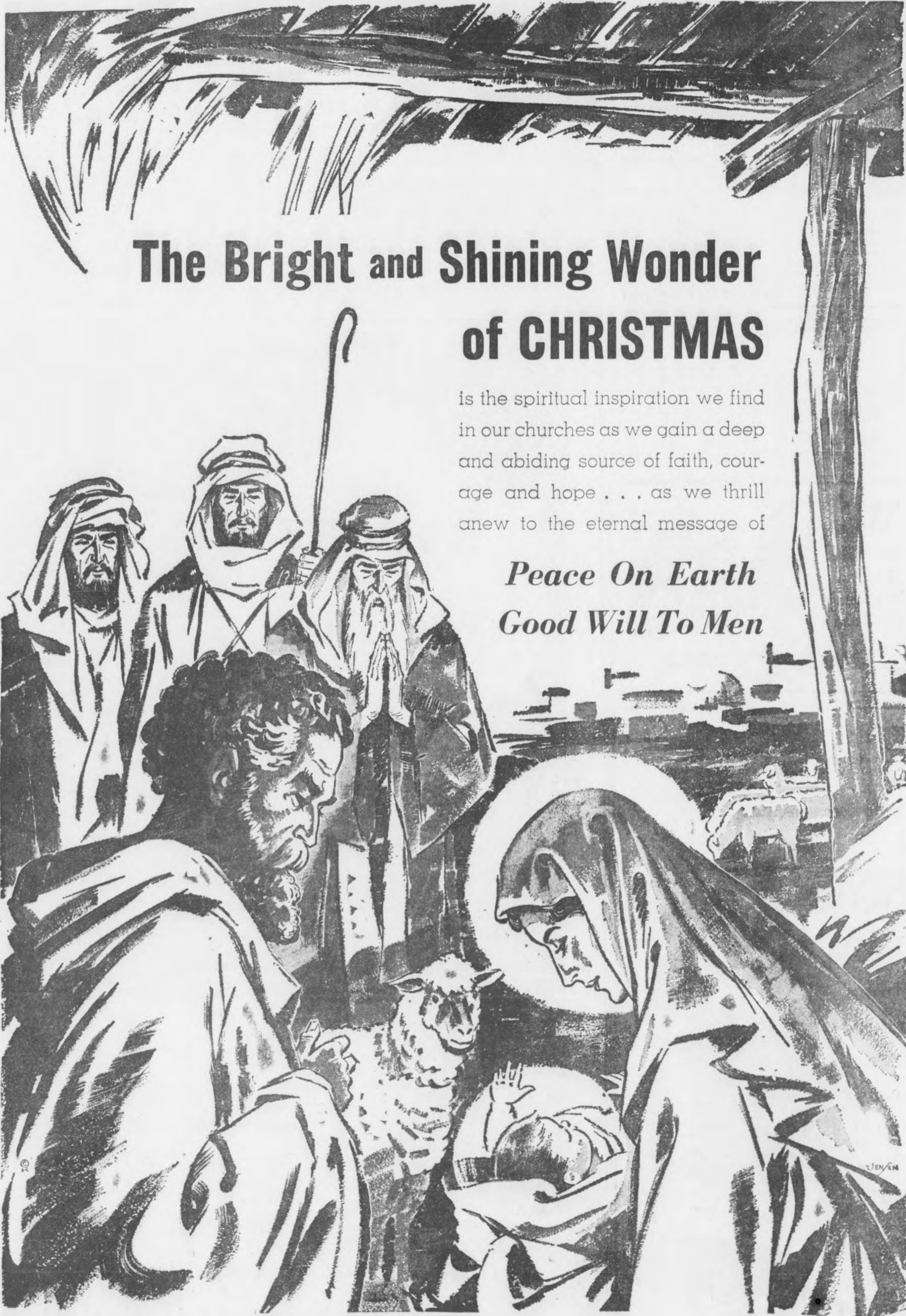

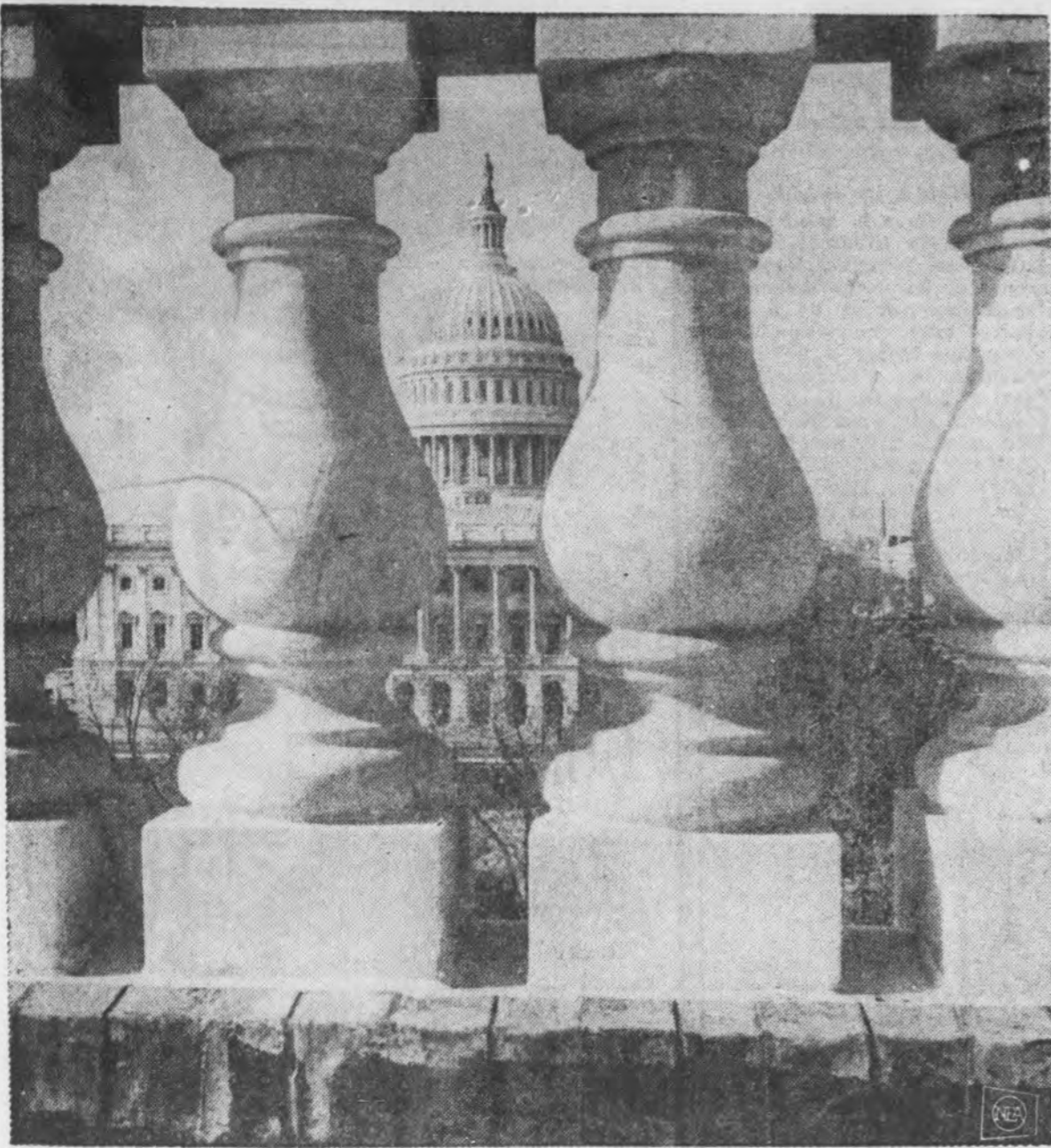

"The stockings were hung by the chimney with care, in hopes that St. Nicholas soon would be there. . ."

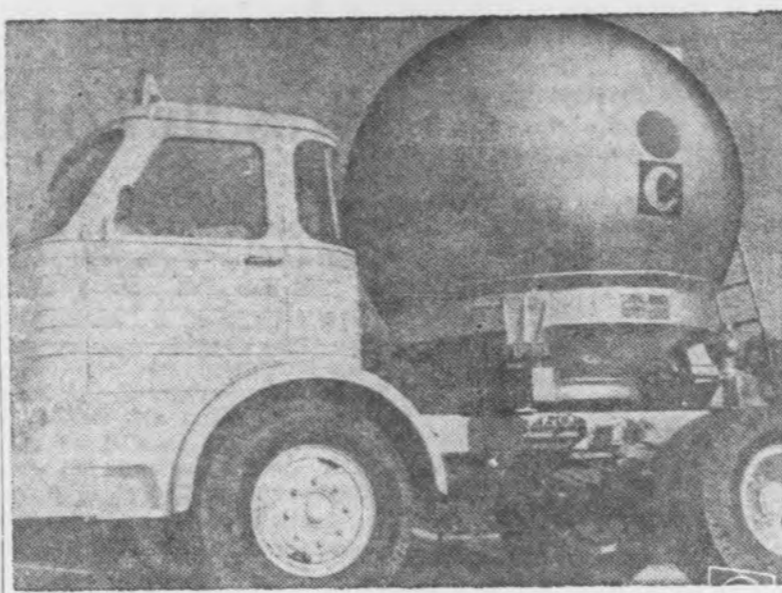
It's not known how this tradition got its start, but there is a lovely legend about the custom's beginning.

Master of ceremonies will be the Rev. Dominic Zadra.

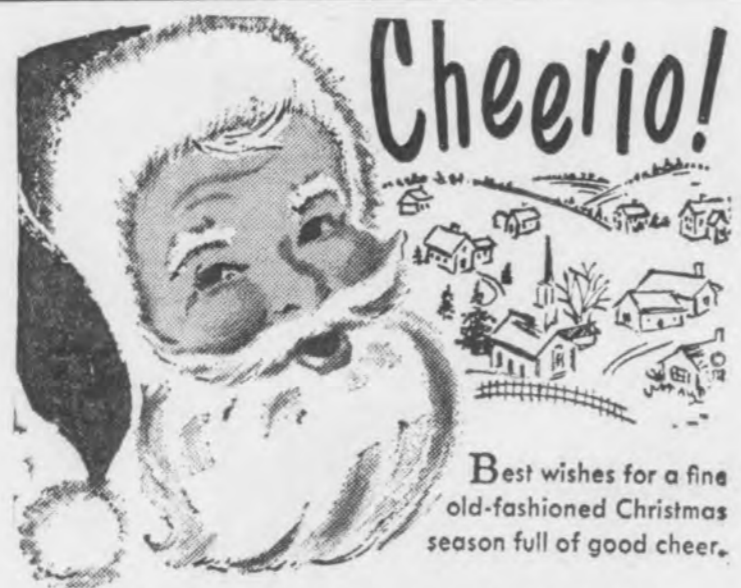

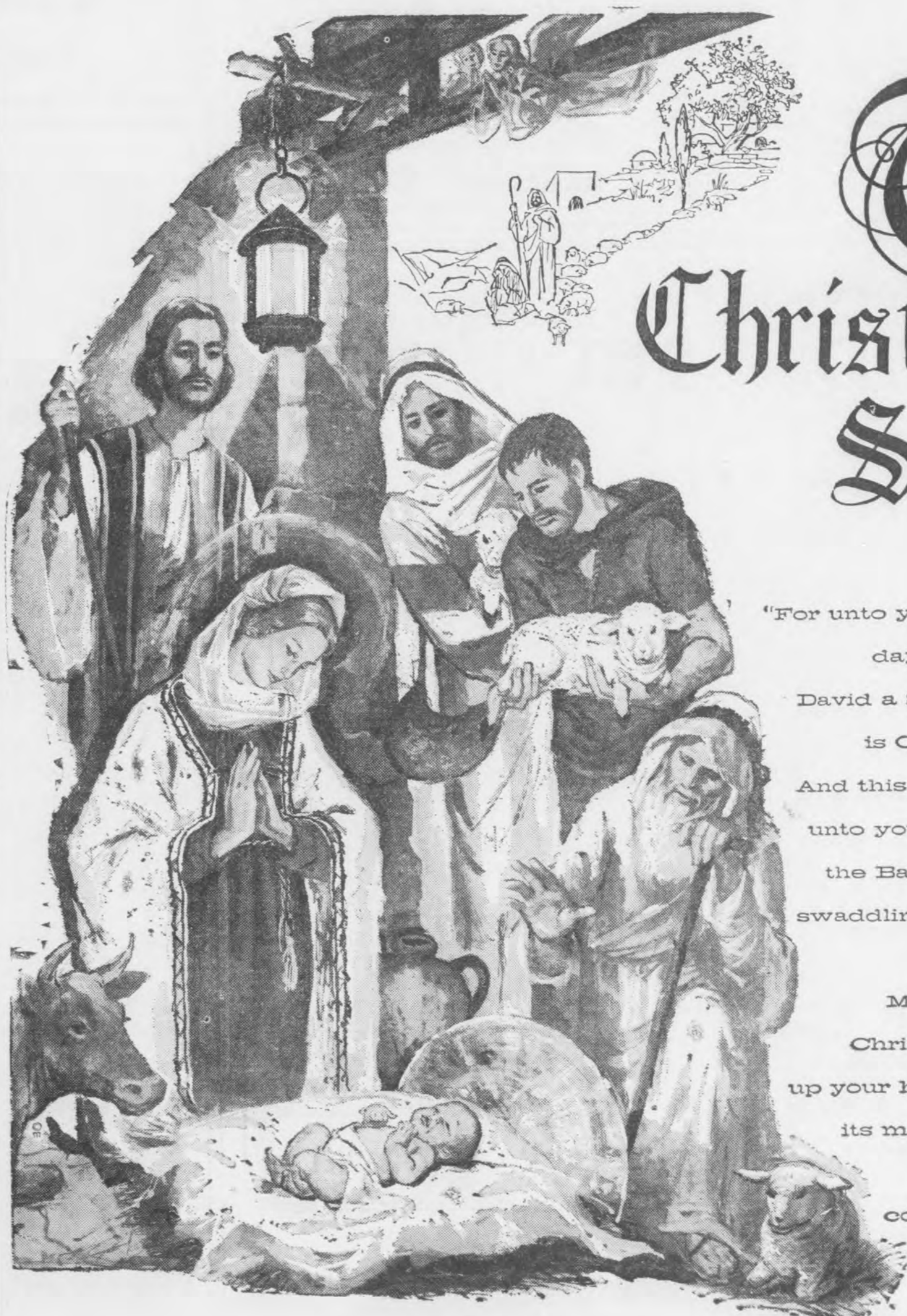

MSU Researchers Studying Christmas Tree Genetics

EAST LANSING — How do you like your Christmas trees? Short or tall? Fat or thin? Researchers at Michigan State University are trying to give you the kind of tree you want. And they believe the genetic approach to growing better Christmas trees is the least expensive for all concerned.

**It's A Business**

Christmas tree growing is no longer a hobby... it's a business. Three million Christmas trees were sold last year in Michigan for a gross income of \$2.5 million to growers. These tree farmers want to know the best place to get good seed and the best methods for growing better trees.

Jonathan W. Wright, MSU forestry scientist, is heading up a research team to find the answers to these problems. The researchers are trying to find which races of trees can be crossed and whether or not something useful can be obtained from these crosses. Wright explains that genetic differences in height, needle length and color can be found in trees whose seeds come from different parts of the world.

**Blue-Green Trees**

Take, for example, Scotch pine Christmas trees. The best seeds come from Scotland, Spain and southern France. They produce popular blue-green trees. On the other hand, seeds that come from the Ural Mountains separating European and Asiatic Russia tend to produce undesirable yellow-needled trees.

Wright is tracing the development of the various races to find which trees are best adapted to Michigan soil and climate. Genetic studies are being made on Scotch pines which have come from 180 different parts of Europe and Asia. These

time trying to measure color differences in trees because not everyone makes judgments in the same fashion. What looks like light yellow to one scientist may be bright yellow to another.

Perfectly Straight Trees

The height of trees is a little bit easier to measure, but it's not always consistent when the trees are grown in different areas. In one instance, Wright and his colleagues compared three Scotch pine stands from Europe and found that, in the nursery, the tallest trees came from the stand which had been the shortest in Europe.

Some things are fairly certain, though. For example, the MSU scientists know that perfectly straight Christmas trees can be grown from Latvian tree seeds. However, these trees are only moderately fast growing — at least they don't grow fast enough to make them ideal for Michigan growers.

Knows No Boundaries

Another interesting phase of Christmas tree research points up that science knows no international boundaries or Iron Curtain. Wright says Russia, for example, is very cooperative about sending seeds and literature to this country. Czechoslovakia even sent photos of their tree stands.

As these studies continue, MSU scientists hope to be able to break down all communication barriers between the U. S. and foreign countries.

1st American Christmas Was In 1619

The first "true" Christmas in America was celebrated 344 years ago, in Jamestown.

But the first time a Christian ever spent a Christmas in the new world was in 1492 when Christopher Columbus' ship was wrecked on the island of Bohio, Haiti. On Dec. 6, St. Nicholas Day, an island chief sent Columbus and his crew food for a good meal.

Capt. Smith was the first man to spend Christmas on the soil of the Colonies. At that time, he was a captive of Powhatan an Indian chief.

Women Arrive

That first significant Christmas was held in 1619. It was

the first December there had been women settlers.

The very next year the Puritans began their fight to abolish the celebration, as they held it to be frivolous and pagan. In 1659 a law was enacted making the celebration of Christmas illegal.

It was 27 years later, in Boston, that the first legal Christmas celebration was held. Then in 1856, the day was made a legal holiday in the state.

Christmas Goes On

During the period that Christmas was outlawed, the Dutch settlers had gone ahead with their festivities, and it is mainly to them that we owe thanks for keeping many Christmas traditions alive in this country.

The Germans together with the Dutch introduced to this country most of the "trappings" of our secular Christmas celebrations... holly, decorated evergreen trees, the inspiration for our Santa Claus, many car-

ols and other things as well. In a nation as young as ours, as large as ours and populated by so many different nationalities, races and religious sects, it is difficult to pinpoint the "American" Christmas. It has changed a good deal in the past 344 years and differs in many regions.

CHRISTMAS IN ITALY

Santa Claus is gaining favor with Italian children, but the traditional gift-giver, especially south of Rome, is Befana. Usually represented as a gray-haired witch who rides a broomstick, she brings toys for good children, but a stocking full of coal or ashes for naughty ones. Legends say, variously, that she misdirected the Magi or that she refused shelter to the Holy Family. Repenting, she now goes around the world on Christmas Eve, seeking the Christ Child and doing good to children.

HULA-SKIRTED SANTA

Not to be outdone by anyone else, Hawaii has its Christmas too. But no reindeer; no

sleigh. Their Santa arrives on the beach riding an outrigger canoe, and to top it all off, "Santa" is a hula-skirted girl

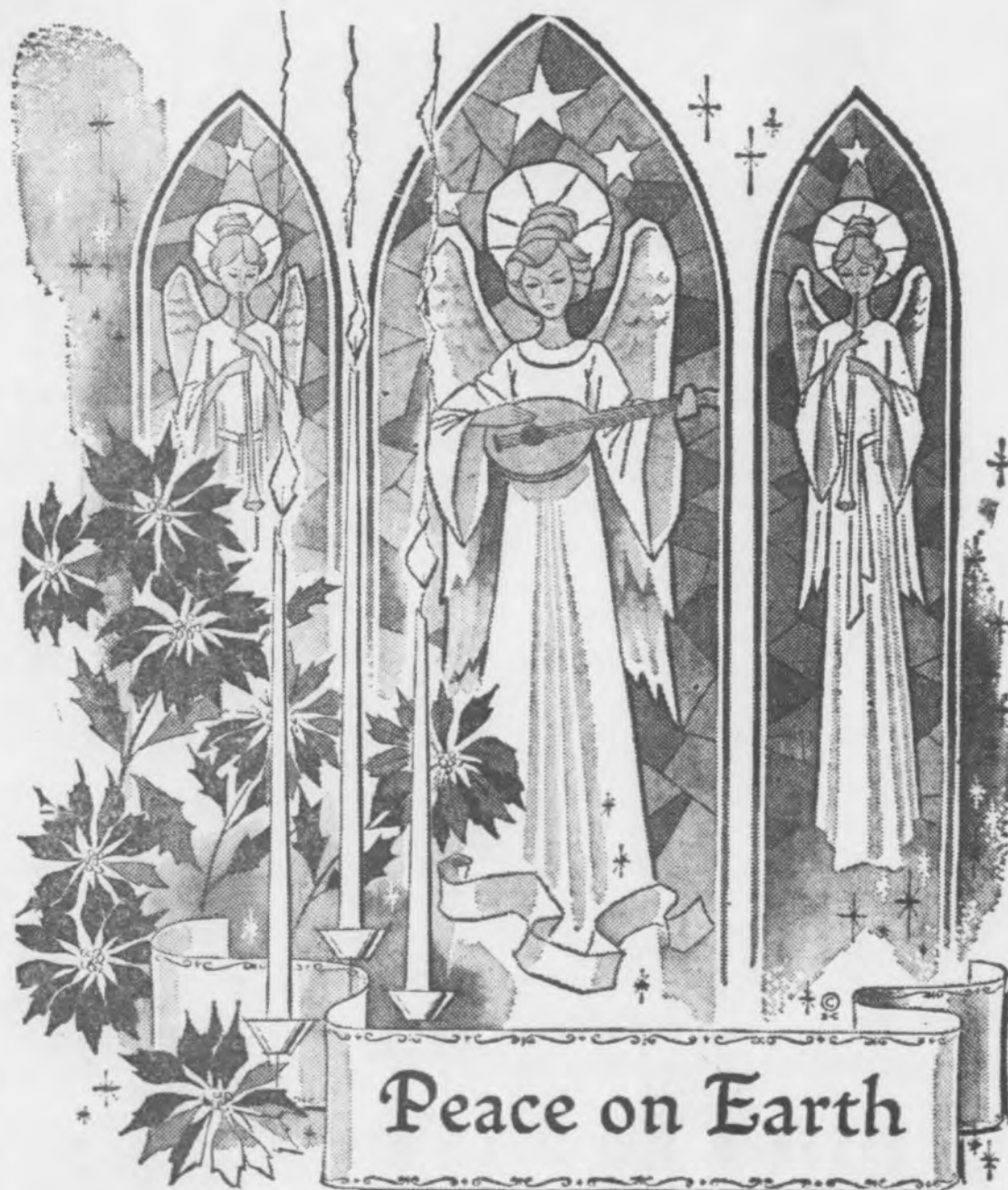

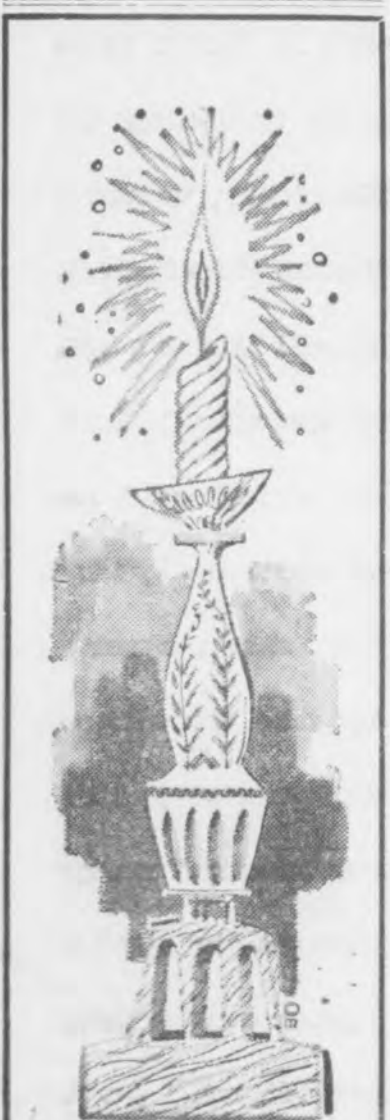

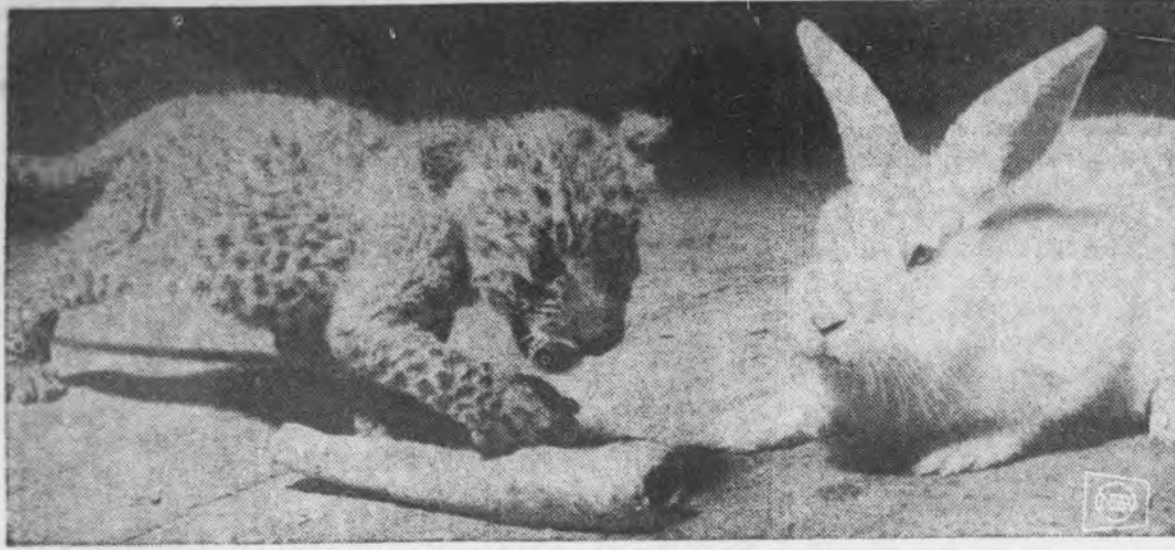

St. Lucy is little known in most countries, but in Denmark, Switzerland and some others, it is this saint who is responsible for the distribution of gifts.

And so it goes throughout the world. Regardless of the legend, the Yule holiday is the spirit of unselfishness, the wonder of children's joy, all combined in one joyous song and praise of thanksgiving, of beauty, that is Christmas.

**Civil War Christmas Eve Livened By False Alarm**

ANN ARBOR — A false alarm stirred up plenty of excitement in a Civil War camp where the Union boys were just settling down to celebrate Christmas Eve 100 years ago.

Amos Abbott of Romeo, who was serving in Co. A, Ninth Infantry, relates the humorous incident in a letter he wrote home to his brother. Six of his letters are in the University of Michigan Historical Collections.

**Guns Discharged**

Amos, then in camp in Muldrew Hill, Ky., writes: "About those Christmas Eve, just as those in our tent were ready to eat supper, we heard several guns discharged and in a few moments several more, and then our drums commenced to

beat the 'long roll' and we all knew what to do. We made all speed to 'buckle on our armor' and 'fall in' to ranks.

"We were then marched inside the fort and drawn up in 'battle array' to meet the hosts of all 'secessionism' — should they come.

"I happened to be in the front section of our company and the duty assigned to me was the very honorable one of 'guarding the gate.' As this was supposed to be the most dangerous position, we were consoled by the very comforting assurance that when we were all shot down, our places would be taken by Section 8.

**Killed In Action**

"Well, we stood waiting in

the cold about two hours but 'many secesh' presented himself so we concluded to go back and 'try it over again.' We went back and had a good sleep although we heard guns at intervals during the night.

"There would have been no need for alarm had they only considered that the night before Christmas is the commencement of a 'grand jubilee' among the Negroes which lasts until New Year's.

"Christmas we were excused all duty except guard. Most of the company joined and got up a 'big dinner' of baked pigs and

chicken pies. We, in our tent, got up a dinner by ourselves. Abbott was killed later in action at Murfreesboro.

**BIRTHDAY OF CHRIST**

Ordinarily most folks believe that Dec. 25 is the date acknowledged by the world since the beginning of the Christian era as the birthday of Christ. Actually, for three centuries following His birth, Christ's nativity was celebrated in January, March, April, May, September and October — and all by various Christian groups.

**Bells, Bells, Bells**

Through the ages, bells have served many purposes — announcing the approach of vehicles, for instance, or signaling the beginning of curfew. Early associated with churches, by medieval times the pealing of the bells had come to signify the rejoicing of the Christmas season.

An early custom was the tolling of church bells on Christmas Eve, during the hour before midnight. The tolling announced the death of Satan, and at midnight joyous peals told of the birth of Christ.

In England, where bell-ringing is an honored, family-taught art, the tuneful bells ring out at seven-thirty on Christmas morning.

It takes years of training and practice to learn the ringing of complex "changes," as the different chants and tonal combinations are called.

**Symbols Of Yule Differ Everywhere**

The beauty in all children, the wonder that lights up their faces and gladdens the hearts of everyone at Christmastime is eloquent tribute to the holy idea behind the festival celebrating the birth of Christ.

In many lands, the symbol of Christmas and Santa Claus is different. In America and many other countries the appearance of Santa Claus is the signal for the holiday season to begin.

**Flowing White Beard**  
The jolly, round, rosy-cheeked character with the flowing white beard is the fellow responsible for the bringing of gifts. He drives a sleigh drawn by reindeer, and rides across the night sky on Christmas Eve from the North Pole, hopping from chimney to chimney with his pack of toys for all good boys and girls.

But the origin of Santa Claus dates back many centuries to many lands where the symbol of Christmas has taken many forms.

**Born In Petras**  
Strangely enough, St. Nicholas was born in a remote town in

Asia Minor by the name of Petras. It has been told of this great, hardest working saint of all, the many and wonderful deeds of good for which he was responsible. He helped the poor and needy and saved the lives of many.

Believe it or not, he is the patron saint of bankers, pawnbrokers, children, unmarried girls, sailors and thieves. He lived a long time ago and is said to have died about 343 A.D.

**Symbol changed**  
About the year 950 A. D. Russia adopted St. Nicholas as her patron saint. Later the Laplanders followed suit as did the Samoyeds. Legend has it that this is where St. Nick acquired the story of the reindeer and sleigh.

And with the changing of the locale, so changed the symbol of Santa Claus. In Germany, France, Switzerland, Holland and Luxembourg, Santa Claus is recognized as a horseman on a beautiful white steed, loaded down not only with gifts for the good children he visits, but whipping rods for the naughty ones. He makes his ghostly ride Dec. 5.

In the early days of the American colonies, the Dutch brought with them their idea of what St. Nick was supposed to look like. He was called "Santeklas" and was a severe, lean, spiritual looking gent in long robes. Not at all like our version of Santa.

He was gradually transformed to the happy fellow he is today through the efforts of an American cartoonist by the name of Thomas Nast in the 19th century and since then, the traditional Santa Claus, reindeer and sleigh as we now know them came to stay on the American scene.

**Passed Into Limbo**  
In many countries, the Christ Child or Kristkind, is the giver of gifts. Others falling in the same role are less known and many of them have passed into limbo. This would include Tante Aria, a cloud goddess who, ac-

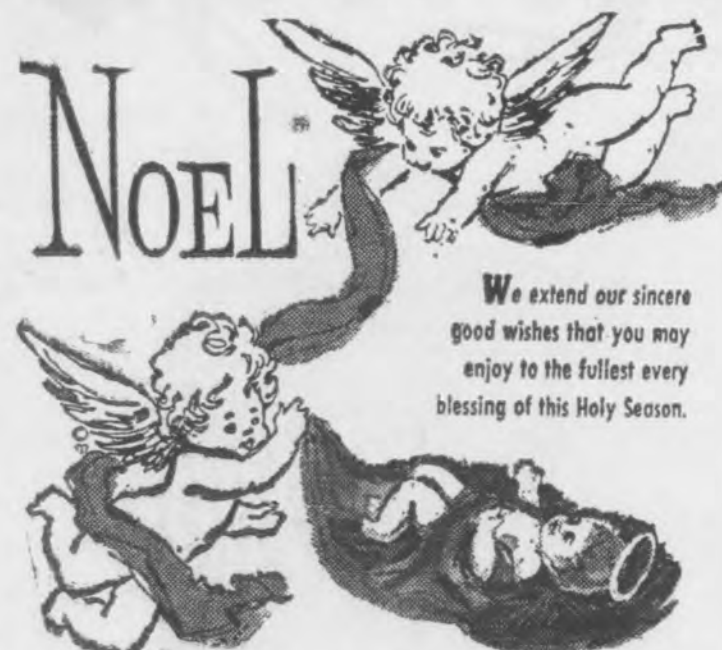

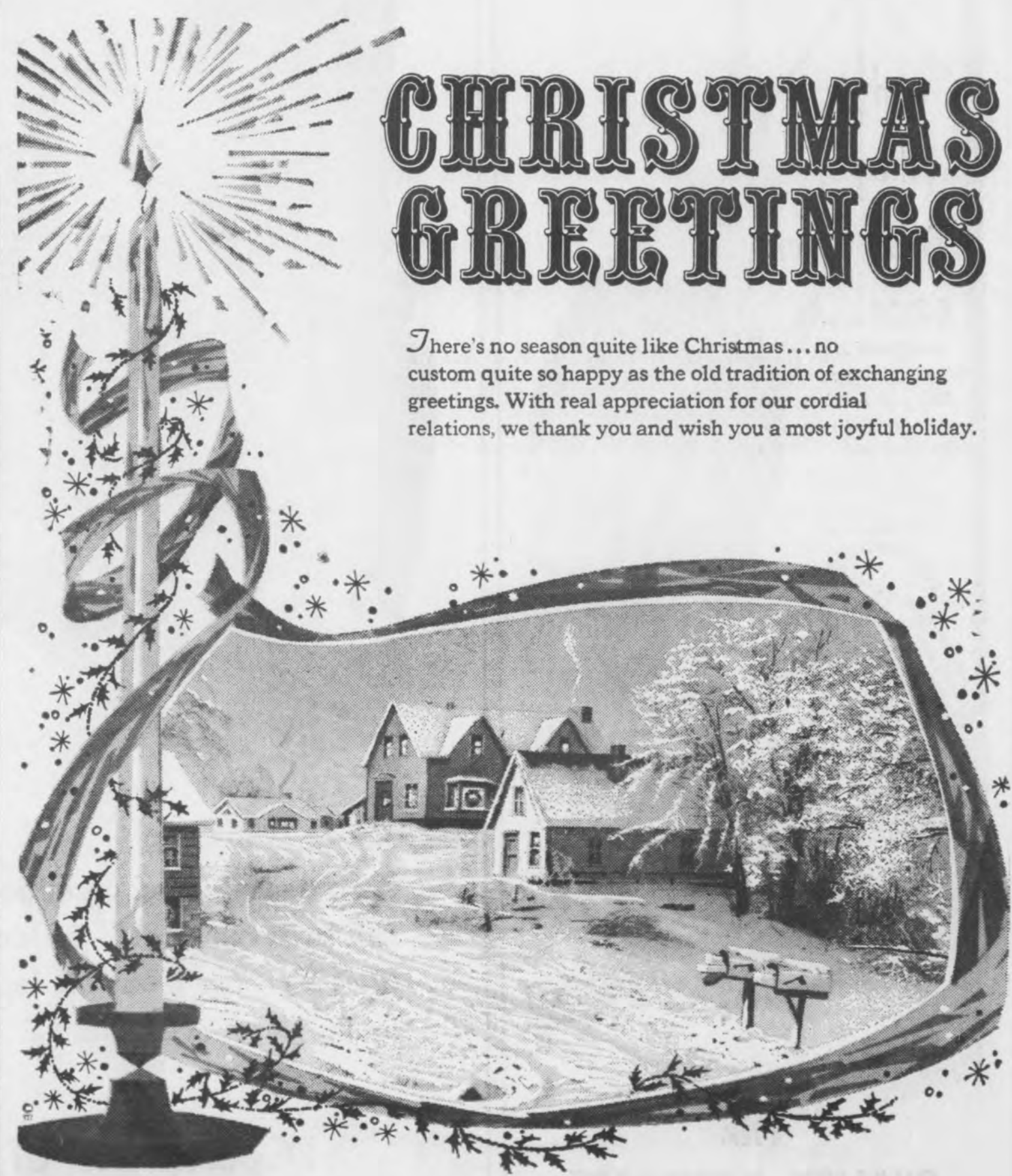

### The Trees Of Christmas

Growing in popularity, however, are the fragrant Eastern red cedar and such long-needed trees as the Scotch pine, an immigrant to this country, and the red pine.

The goose rates high in Scandinavian countries along with a number of other meats and fish. The French, Irish, Germans and Hollanders also look with favor on the goose.

In Sweden, a suckling pig generally dominates the Smorgasbord; Latin countries select lamb, and the Englishman prefers roast beef.

### St. Francis Popularized Carol Singing

Regardless of the derivation, it was St. Francis of Assisi who was credited with having given popularity to carol singing when he is said to have conducted a Christmas service singing the Gospel and giving a sermon in song.

When minstrels and folk singing swept the land back in Richard the Lion-Hearted's day, carols were kept alive through the simple folk in community after community, who passed them down from generation to generation. But it was not until the 15th Century when the custom finally broke away from the

austerity and somber chants of the church and reached its popularity and magnificence.

#### Forbade Celebrations

But then came the Puritans in the 17th century who sternly forbade joyous celebrations at Christmas, and the singing of carols went into a decline.

It wasn't until the 19th century before the singing of carols

again came into open public popularity. And this was only made possible through the illicit printing and singing of carols in the privacy of the homes of the people who loved them dearly.

In 1840 the world famous "Silent Night" appeared in print, and today its beauty resounds the world over in every Christian land at Christmastime.

### Santa Image American As Apple Pie

Claims to the "new look" have come from various quarters of the globe, Paris and its Dior included, but the one indisputable fact emerges from all claimers of fame for the naming of the tag, and that is, Santa Claus was the harbinger of the "new look" back in 1882 with a "Made in U.S.A." label indelibly stamped on the seat of his pants.

That doesn't mean to say that the spirit of Santa Claus isn't a composite one, nor that his very make-up isn't a combination of many things from many lands beginning with St. Nicholas through the Germanic Krist-kindl and back to ancient and even pagan times.

**Severe-Looking Character**  
But it's the round-bellied, jovial, ruddy-faced character with the flowing white beard driving his reindeer - drawn sleigh across the night sky on Christmas Eve to which reference is made, and this is definitely as American as turkey and apple pie.

It started, however, with Santa as a severe-looking character, tall and grim, and to boot, he was riding a tall, thin horse. A far cry from our present day conception of the old boy.

**Borrowed From Dutch**  
Then followed the name, and the English children borrowed the Christmas Saint from the Dutch, but it became a prob-

lem for the small-fry as well as their parents pronouncing his name, and through trial and error, many variations came to pass until the name Santa Claus was adopted to remain for all time.

Irving, an early chronicler of

American Colonial days was, of course, influenced by the early Dutch settlers in New York and what came out as a result of his efforts was a Santa Claus that wore a broad-brimmed hat, sported big baggy breeches and smoked a long stemmed pipe. Very Dutch.

To top it all off he had his "Santa" driving a wagon, which too, was symbolic of the early Dutch settlers in New York.

Then came the year 1382 and with it two men who were destined to change the entire concept of Santa Claus in America, and who were responsible for the "new look" of the old gentleman and Christmas that has swept the world.

**Moore's Famous Poem**  
Clement Clark Moore, a professor of divinity at a New York theology seminary, sat down one day and began a poem that went, "Twas the night before Christmas, and all through the house, not a creature was stirring, not even a mouse; . . ." Of course, it was a poem that became famous overnight and has retained its popularity through the years. The name of it is "A Visit from St. Nicholas," and is known in every English speaking nation in the world.

It was Moore who described Santa Claus as a round-bellied, twinkly-eyed jolly old man with rosy cheeks. But that wasn't the end of it. He also added the sleigh and reindeer.

**Nast's Illustrations**

When Thomas Nast, a famous cartoonist for the Hearst newspapers, read the poem, he was inspired to illustrate it. And it was his creation of the Santa Claus we know today that took hold of the imagination of the people and was firmly established as the accepted Santa Claus, potbelly, rosy cheeks, twinkling eyes, flowing white beard, reindeer, sleigh and all.

Actually, Santa Claus—U.S.A. version — is only 80 years old, but the "new look" created in our time has come to be accepted throughout the Christian world, and even if he isn't the giver of gifts in all countries, he nevertheless is as much the symbol of Christmas as anything else at Yuletide.

#### 'HOME OF THE BREAD'

The meaning of the word Bethlehem, the city where Christ was born, is "home of the bread." Although Beth resembles our word bread, and Iehem is close in sound to home . . . actually the translation is reversed: Beth is home; Iehem is bread!

### Holy Land Birthplace Of 3 Religions

It is questionable whether many people realize the geographical area that comprised the world around which Christianity grew. It is also more amazing to contemplate the world today and the influence Christianity has had upon civilization, when it is reflected that all the events the Bible records occurred in an area no more than 80 miles wide and 400 miles long!

The area known as the Holy Land is small indeed. The historical events, however, which have taken place in this tiny piece of land, have almost literally taken civilization by its heels and shaken it into a realization of the difference between good and evil, even though in some parts of the world this realization is not openly acknowledged.

#### Startling Contrasts

Within these small boundaries, contrasts can be found that are startling. For example, near Galilee the rainfall is abundant, while not far distant the desolateness of the Negev desert is well known. Within a distance of 15 miles one can travel

from heights of 2,600 feet above sea level to 1,297 feet below sea level.

The oldest inhabited city in the world is in the Holy Land. It is Damascus, which has been continuously inhabited from the earliest recordings of Biblical times to the present. The old wall around Damascus still stands and is so thick in places that many families have carved out homes from its massiveness.

#### 10,000 Years Old

The oldest city in terms of founding dates is Jericho. It is said to be 10,000 years old. However, it has not always been inhabited. There have been four

Jerichos at various times, each not more than two miles from the previous sites.

Also in this fabulous land is the River Jordan. It now is a muddy stream not more than 50 feet wide that's deep in the springtime and dry during the hot summer months.

#### False Impression

Many people are under the false impression that the Sea of Galilee is really a sea. It is not. It is a lake 13 miles long and eight miles wide.

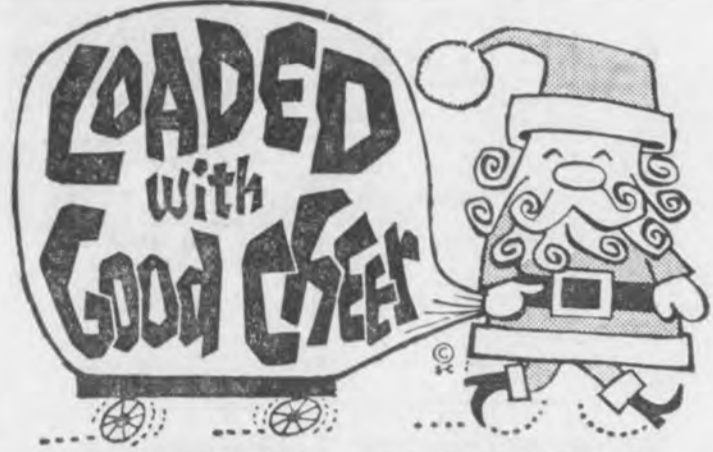
There is one place in the Holy Land that is more famous than any other — Jerusalem. Even today, it is a walled city that

has been besieged and razed more than 30 times, rebuilt at least six times and is little more than 80 acres in area. Outside the wall of Jerusalem is the famous Garden of Gethsemane and the Mount of Olives.

#### Barren Small Town

Nazareth, the city from which Joseph and Mary started on their trip to Bethlehem, is now a barren small town.

The Holy Land is the birthplace of three of the world's great religions: Christianity, Judaism and Mohammedanism. Still a land of controversy and conflict, it is prayed one day the teachings of Him who said, "Peace on Earth, Good Will Toward Men," will be needed.

**Christmas Observance Once Illegal**

Celebration of Christmas — the most widely observed religious holiday of the modern world — was at one time illegal in early American history.

Colonial New England did not celebrate Christmas, according to researchers at Compton's Pictured Encyclopedia, because the stern Puritan colonists believed that such activities were wholly pagan and forbade them by law. Christmas came to the American colonies while it was the subject of strenuous controversy in England. English Puritans condemned it as "popish" and the secular celebration as a "wanton Bacchanalian feast."

**Act Of Parliament**

Opposition of the English Puritans to festivals culminated in an act of Parliament in 1647 which abolished the observance of Christmas, Easter and Whitsunide. This was echoed in the American colonies in 1659 when Puritans enacted a law in the general court of Massachusetts to punish those who "kept Christmas."

The law read, "Whosoever shall be found observing any such day as Christmas or the like, either by forbearing of labor, feasting or in any other

Christmas Eve, a large candle is burned which could be snuffed out only by someone named Mary. As it is reported from the Emerald Isle, "Who knows on some Christmas Eve, Jesus, Mary and Joseph may come again; not to Palestine, but to the Holy Isle on the farthest edge of Europe."

**Bayberry Candles**

In ancient days, brightly burning candles were as much a part of Christmas as the religious significance of the holy day. And it was in ancient times when the bayberry candle held particular significance. It was believed that if the candles burned bright and clear throughout the Christmas season, the coming year was certain to be happy and prosperous.

Then, too, in Colonial days, bayberry branches were dipped in wax and used instead of candles when animal fat for the making of candles was in short supply.

**Offended Moral Sense**

The law was repealed in 1681 but many of the Puritans were not reconciled to this action. Secular reveling at Christmas had often interfered with religious devotions and offended the Puritans' moral sense. This intensified their sectarian hostility to the religious observance of Christmas — an attitude they

maintained for the better part of two centuries in parts of New England.

**Slaves Given Holiday**  
The fun-loving Dutch colonists of New Amsterdam, however, celebrated Christmas as their chief holiday. They brought the old customs from their homeland, especially the Christmas stocking and observance of the feast day of St. Nicholas.

In the Southern colonies, the planters celebrated the yuletide with feasting, singing and dancing. On many plantations slaves were given a holiday as long as the great yule log burned.

**Washington's Bold Venture**

The latter half of the 18th century saw a swing of attention to the realm of economics and politics, and religious controversies became of less importance. The fact that English and Hessian troops celebrated Christmas during the Revolutionary War may have added a patriotic note to the denominational controversy.

Gen. Washington crossed the Delaware River on the night of Dec. 25, 1776, to surprise and defeat the Hessian troops stationed at Trenton, N. J. In the opinion of one writer, Wash-

ington's bold venture succeeded because the Hessians were enjoying their customary Christmas revels and failed to maintain the usual watch and patrols.

**Some Churches Closed**

However, denominational opposition to the ecclesiastic observance of Christmas continued into the second half of the 19th century. An account in the New York Daily Times for Dec. 26, 1855 read:

"The churches of the Presbyterians, Baptists and Methodists were not open on Dec. 25 except where some mission schools had a celebration. They do not accept the day as a Holy One, but the Episcopalians, Catholic and German churches were all open. Inside they were decked with evergreens."

In the 20th century, all denominations have embraced Christmas widely, both as a religious and as a social celebration. Today men, women and children in every Christmas land crowd into churches to give their thanks. More than one fourth of the world's population — about 800 million people — profess some form of Christian faith.

**Yule Music Heard Before Christ's Birth**

Centuries before Christ's birth when Bethlehem shep-

herds heard angels sing, "Glory to God in the Highest" Christmas music had been performed! Psalms about the Messiah's Nativity were composed many generations before by David, a shepherd boy of Bethlehem (who later became the second king of the Jewish nation).

About Christ we find David singing "Thou art fairer than the children of men; grace is poured into Thy lips" (Psalm 45:2) reminding us of the Christmas hymn, "Fairest Lord Jesus."

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A favorite modern carol "The Little Drummer Boy" (telling of a poor boy who had no gift to give the Child Jesus except

a solo on his drum) recalls to us David, the poor boy-shepherd who shouted out happily, "Unto Thee will I sing with the harp, O Thou Holy One of Israel!" (Psalm 71:22).

David also gave us a preview of the well-known "We Three Kings" when he sang, "The kings of Tarshish and of the isles shall bring presents: The kings of Sheba and Saba shall offer gifts" (Psalm 72:10). These psalms and other canticles from the Old Testament which tell in prophecy of events concerning the birthday of Jesus Christ can be considered Christmas music in a very real sense!

The way the story goes, the "Christ Child Candle" was burned in windows to light His way if He made an earthly visitation. It was also lighted in atonement for the night of His birth when shelter was denied Mary and Joseph in Bethlehem.

**Poinsettia Tropical Gift To Yuletide**

The poinsettia is blooming on acres of gift-wrapping paper, greeting cards and window ledges.

Unlike such ancient and traditional Christmas symbols as holly and mistletoe, the red and green poinsettia originated in tropical America.

Joel Robert Poinsett, who went to Mexico in 1825 as the first United States minister there, so admired the wild scarlet plant that he brought the first specimens to the United States. He successfully grew them on his estate at Charleston, S.C.

American botanists named the plant after Poinsett in 1836. "Beautiful Euphorbia"

It was later found that a German botanist, Karl Ludwig Willdenow, had already described and catalogued the plant as Euphorbia pulcherrima, or "the beautiful Euphorbia." But the popular name, poinsettia, stuck.

Other countries call it the fireplant, Mexican flame leaf, shepherds and lobster plant.

Promotion of the potted poinsettia as a special Christmas plant was begun in 1911 by Paul Ecke of San Diego County, Calif. The 400-acre Ecke ranch is today the world's largest poinsettia farm.

More than 90 per cent of all United States commercial poinsettias are grown in San Diego County. There are two separate harvests.

**Blossoms Blanket Hills**  
In early spring, rootstock is dug up and sent to growers

who pot and nurse the plants for the Christmas season. The tiny roots must be carefully tended and watered, usually in a greenhouse.

During the second harvest, three weeks before Christmas, blossoming branches are cut from the fields of poinsettias to ship as floral decoration. Workers hurriedly gather blossoms from daybreak to dark. The branch ends are dipped in boiling water to seal them, then dipped again in an acid bath to assure that the fragile blossoms will arrive fresh at markets throughout the country.

The annual Mid-Winter Poinsettia Festival in San Diego County extends from mid-November through Christmas. Scarlet blossoms blanket the hills. Judges measure prize blooms by yardsticks and climb ladders to determine the height of roof-high plants.

**In Several Colors**  
Though the poinsettia has to be potted and protected in northern states, the perennial thrives in moist, shady areas of the southern United States, Mexico and parts of South America. Red is the most common color, but there are white, pink and yellow varieties.

The poinsettia's bright blossom is not the flower but highly modified petal-like leaves or bracts. The actual flowers are tiny, yellow rosettes in the

A USAF bomber pilot, a Swiss housewife, the wife of a Lebanese physician — people like this, along with professional artists, have put their talents together to bring help and hope to needy children in underdeveloped countries. They have donated a score of paintings to UNICEF — the United Nations Children's Fund — to be used on greeting cards which are sold to the general public. Three of the cards are reproduced above. The proceeds from a single

10-card box at \$1.25 can protect 50 children from tuberculosis or supply the penicillin to cure 10 cases of yaws, a crippling tropical disease. UNICEF greeting cards started 13 years ago, inspired by a simple drawing of a seven-year-old European girl showing her gratitude for help from UNICEF. Last year, more than 25 million cards were exchanged around the world.

and candlelight processions. Epiphany is observed festively all over the country, but it reaches heights of pageantry among southern Indians. The Otomis and Aztec descendants march to the shrine of the miraculous Lord of Chalma, in a valley southwest of Mexico City, in what is probably Mexico's greatest pilgrimage.

**Means 'Appearance'**  
In Christian tradition, whatever the form of observance, Epiphany commemorates the manifestation of Jesus as Christ the Savior. The word itself means "appearance."  
Three significant events which supposedly occurred on the same date though in different years, are associated with Epiphany: the visit of the three Wise Men, or Three Kings, to worship the infant; the descent of the Holy Spirit during Jesus' baptism; and His first miracle, changing water to wine at the wedding feast of Cana.

Even primitive Christians seem to have celebrated Epiphany on the 12th day of Christmas. In the Middle Ages, it was the custom to present plays in churches. But solemn observances largely disappeared in the bawdy atmosphere of Elizabethan England, giving way to wassail. Shakespeare's "Twelfth Night" reflects the merry mood. The play was probably first presented in a command performance at Whitehall Palace on Jan. 6, 1601, an occasion when Queen Elizabeth entertained a distinguished Italian guest, the Duke of Bracciano.

**Visit From La Befana**  
Twelfth Night revels later declined in popularity, but customs such as feasting and staging masques still survive in parts of England. In Europe, children disguised as kings roam the streets on Epiphany, singing hymns and carols. In Italy, millions of children awake on Epiphany to find their stockings filled with presents from La Befana, the good-hearted crone who takes the place of Santa Claus. French and Swiss children look

forward to a special Twelfth Night pastry, a rich "cake of kings" in which a coin, black bean or china figure is hidden. Whoever gets the prize is king for the day.  
In France, a portion of the Epiphany cake is often set aside as la part de Dieu or "God's share." It is given to the first poor person who comes to the door.

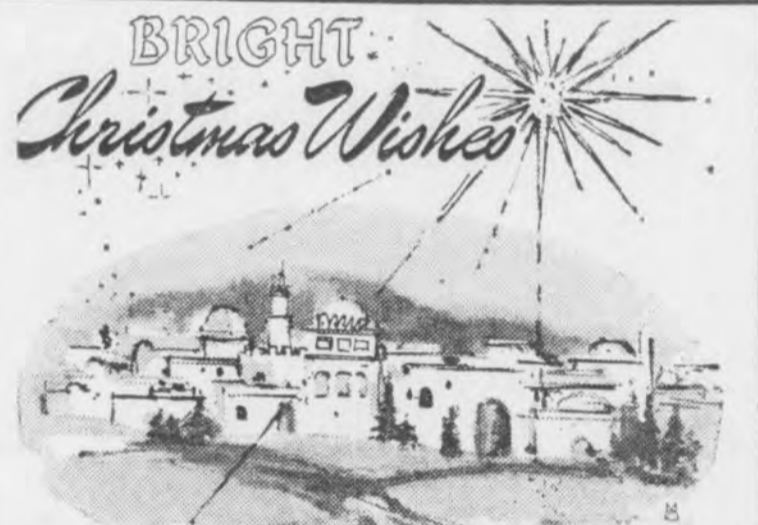

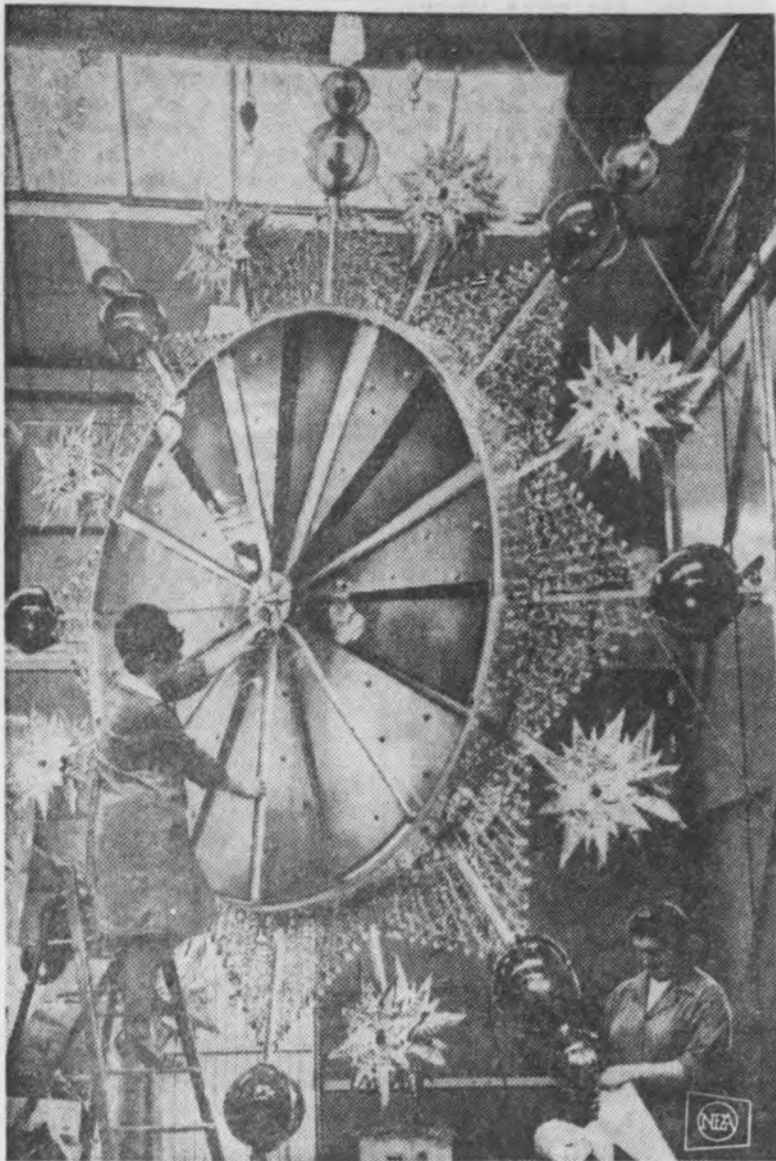

### Four Apostles Composed Original Christmas Story

On each man, according to his place, light falls at a particular angle. To each, the view is different. Yet it is the same light.

Out of this interplay of sight and light, of subject and object, comes the iridescence of Christmas.

#### The Way Truth Comes

In its original telling, as handed down to the modern world, it is four stories. None is alike. Yet it is a single story. It is the same substance, clothed in sundry array; the same vision, from varied perspectives.

That is the way truth comes to man.

And that is the way it is told in the books of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John, the oldest records of the day of the Lord.

#### Anachronistic Designation

Each of the narrators sees separate facts, yet one event. Each sees a special set of scenes, actions and circumstances, yet one meaning. Each sees parts of one whole; distinctive portraits, yet one person—Jesus the Christ.

The stories are called the Gospels, but this plural designation is an anachronism, which means the "good news" from God.

It came suddenly, but was understood slowly.

That is characteristic of news.

and of mankind's assimilation of its significance. That is the manner in which the first chronicles of Christmas were put on paper.

They took form gradually, under the reverberating impact of the occasion, as minds and hearts absorbed it, experienced it, and increasingly grasped its implications.

#### Parts Of Totality

In this way does history sharpen its gaze. Time is required to bring the burst of fact into focus.

Yet the primitive accounts of the coming of Christ were largely compiled in its immediate aftermath. Thus each sees only parts of the totality.

The material was assembled as collections of contemporary reports and observations for a contemporary audience.

#### Men's Logic Staggered

They were the documentation of an affair that had staggered men's logic and thrilled their souls.

Writing was limited and laborious in those days. Most information and learning was passed on by word of mouth, from generation to generation and from community to community.

At first, the advent of Jesus and His message were circulated in that fashion.

As time went by, and roving evangelists spread the news of His sojourn on earth from country to country, it became apparent that the unwritten testimony should be recorded, lest it be forgotten or mistold.

#### Manuscripts Undated

Fanciful tales and exaggerations had arisen, mingling with the authentic story. To guard against them and to assure a reliable account of what happened, the man who knew set about drawing up their summaries.

None of the existing manuscripts bears a date, and the precise time and place of composition cannot be definitely established. However, early tradition provides many pointers.

#### Additions, Revisions

Journals of various church fathers of the first 150 years after Christ, quoted by the ecclesiastical historian of the 3rd Century, Eusebius, offer many details.

The clues suggest that additions and revisions occurred, in some cases, before all the books reached their present finished form.

The process may not have been completed until around the end of the first century. But the original documents, on which the final versions are based, clearly came much earlier, while Christ's apostles still lived.

#### Who Wrote First?

Mark's account generally is

considered the oldest in its present form, and apparently underwent little editing after it first was composed in apostolic times. However, the ancient journals say Matthew wrote first.

Assuming this is so, scholarly studies indicate that later renditions of his book, as it now stands, also incorporated material from Mark, while retaining distinctive qualities of its own. Luke also may have drawn from Mark.

#### Gentle Physician

Nevertheless, the initial versions of the books, aside from combinations, are attributed in the earliest church records to the authors whose names they bear.

Matthew and John were among the 12 apostles, with first-hand information. Luke, a gentle physician drawn into the movement by the great missionary Paul, did wide-scale research and interviews to gather his report.

#### Scion Of Jerusalem

Mark, a rich young scion of

Jerusalem, was a young lad in Jesus' time, but got his material from the Apostle Peter. Their accounts differ in content and tenor. John's terse, weighty sentences and short sentences explore the mystery and grandeur of the event. He is more concerned with meaning than incident.

#### Methodical Style

Matthew, in orderly, methodical style, concentrates on ethical implications, recounting 21 parables and the eloquent Sermon on the Mount. Mark is a book of crisp, fast-moving action. He pauses only for four parables, in the hurrying tempo of deeds.

Neither he nor John refers to the genealogy or birth of Jesus, nor to the visiting Wise Men, the star, the manger, or the shepherds, but plunge immediately into the consequences. It is Luke who uncovers the most graphic scene of the nativity.

#### Time Of Turmoil

The writers worked in a time of turmoil. Israel smoldered with fires of revolution. Preach-

ing about Christ was alternately outlawed or suspect as sedition. Fear of reprisal had silenced many.

In this atmosphere, those who were among the first to know the gift of Christmas set about putting it into a form that could be handed on to the generations up to now, and yet to come.

#### Famed Carols Born In 13th, 18th Centuries

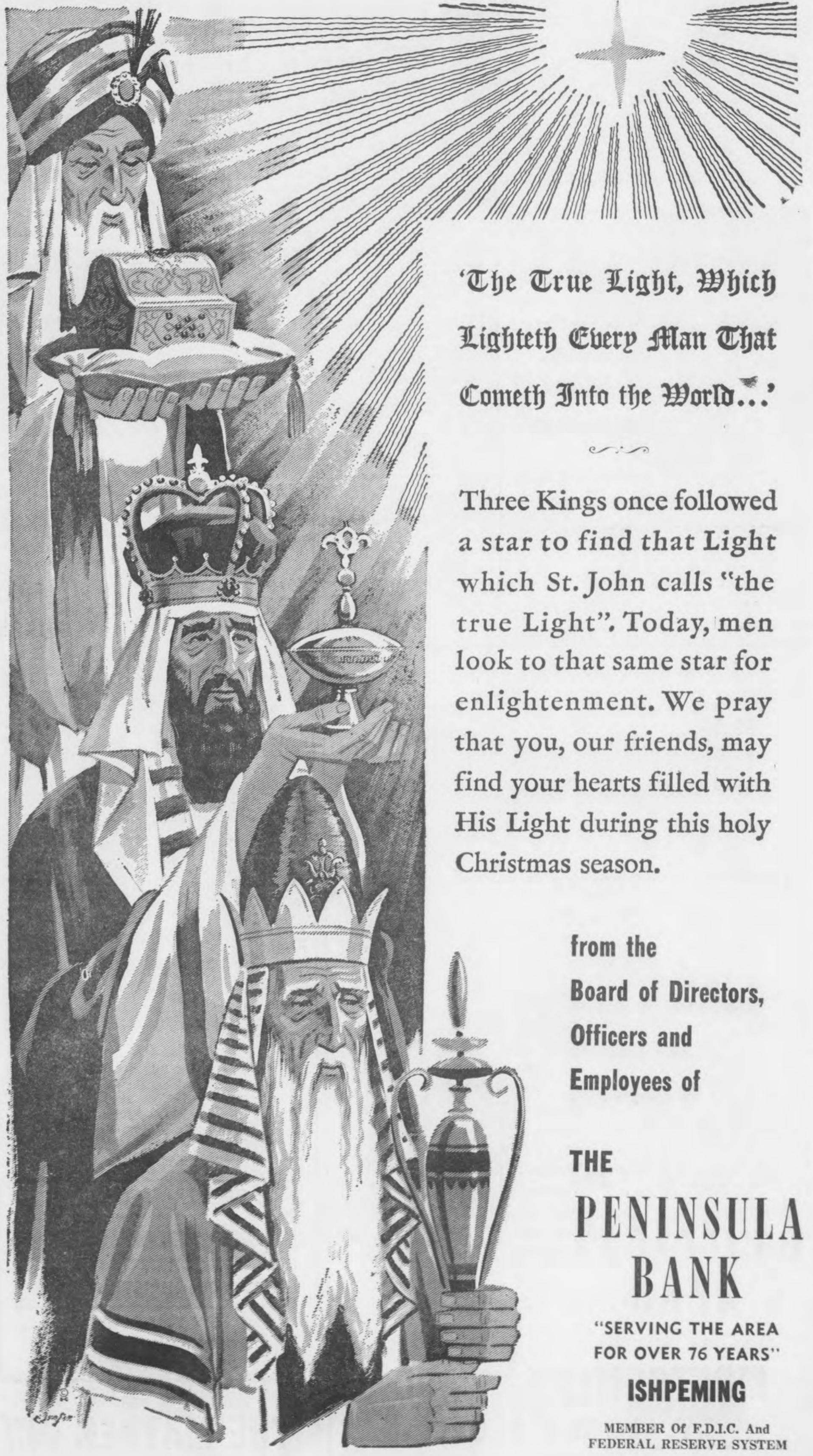
It was the tolling of the church bells one Christmas morning back in 1730 that inspired Charles Wesley (younger brother of the founder of the Methodist church, John) to write the famous, "Hark, The Herald Angels Sing," and the immortal "Oh Come All Ye Faithful" (Adeste Fideles) is said to have been written as early as 1221.

There is no more wonderful expression of the Christmas season than the carols — and ours is the heritage for this wealth of beauty.

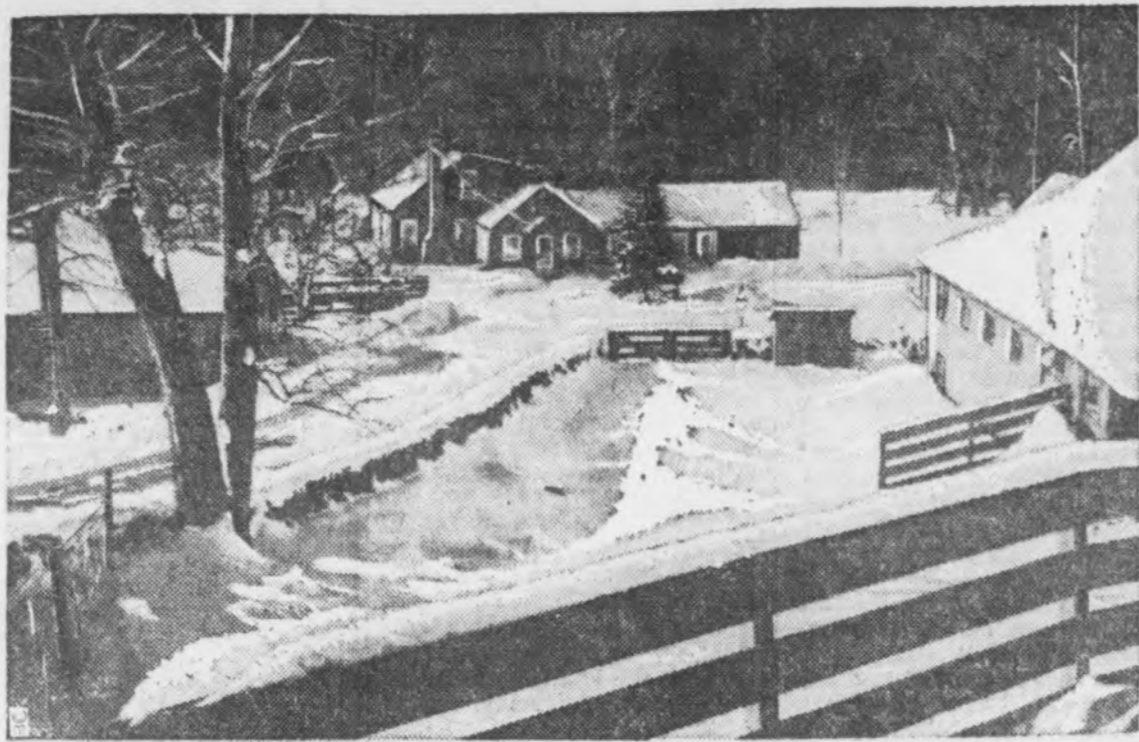

### 'Messiah' Embodies Yule Spirit

Of all the music associated with Christmas, perhaps no composition so well embodies the spirit of the holiday as Handel's "Messiah."

The great oratorio has enthralled countless audiences. It has been said to have brought more money for charity than any other single piece of music.

### Vision Of Christmas



Quiet country landscape covered with snow is traditional vision of Christmas cherished by most folks. Even in climes where snow never falls, dreams of a white Christmas dance in the heads of young and old. With a little imagination, Christmas is always a winter wonderland.

And it marked a rebirth for its composer. A Has-Been In 1741 George Frederick Handel was virtually a has-been in 1741. London had grown tired of his Italian operas and of him. More than once he had barely missed being thrown into debtors' prison, and his health was beginning to fail.

Then came a commission from the lord lieutenant of Ireland and the governors of

three charitable institutions for Handel to conduct a series of charity concerts, reports World Book Encyclopedia. He began to compose a new piece for the tour.

**Resounding Success** Handel was not an especially religious man, but something seemed to possess him as he worked. For some 23 days he kept to his study, refusing to see any visitors, leaving his food untouched and working through the night. Now he played the harpsichord, now he sang, then back to the writing. His servants thought he was going mad. Often they found him in tears. When he finished the "Hallelujah Chorus," he declared, "I did think I did see all Heaven before me, the great God himself."

On April 13, 1742, 700 people crowded into a Dublin music hall for the premiere of "Messiah." It was a resounding success.

At the first English performance a year later, King George II was so overwhelmed by the "Hallelujah Chorus" that he rose from his seat and stood throughout the section. The audience, of course, followed the example of their king, and so began a custom which survives to our day. Despite the king's appreciation, however, London was not ready to accept Handel, and the concert failed. It was not until Handel began directing annual benefit performances of "Messiah" at the London Foundling Hospital in the 1750's that his adopted countrymen came to recognize it as a masterpiece, and once again gave him their acclaim.

**FROM QUEBEC?** "Angels We Have Heard on High" is a French carol, although some sources say that it originated not in France but in Quebec, Canada.

### Observances Of Christmas Vary Widely

There was a time when Christmas was celebrated differently in various parts of the world. However, in this atomic-jet age, distances have shrunk and the symbols of the Yuletide season have become for the most part

international. Germany, for example, is credited with establishing the custom of decorating the evergreen tree. St. Nicholas (Nikolaus) makes his rounds with candy and nuts for the children on Dec. 6 with the more personal gifts arriving on Christmas Eve, delivered by his majesty Kristkindl.

#### Mexico's 10 Posadas

England hangs on to her customs, and the small-fry pin their stockings to the fireplace on Christmas Eve much as American youngsters do. Then it is that "Father Christmas" fills them in time-honored tradition.

Mexico focuses its attention on the Christmas season with 10 "posadas" commemorating the Nativity from Dec. 16 to Dec. 26. During this period nearly everyone acts out the Nativity scene, or at least sets up a creche in miniature, as well as on a grand scale. On the 10th day, the Christ Child is added.

#### 'Strewing Night'

"Posada" means inn or lodging and carries with it Joseph's request for lodging for himself and Mary. In many regions, an actual procession is enacted—with a "Joseph" and a "Mary" mounted on burros seeking shelter, asking for help through a song entitled "Letania." Despite all this tradition which is clung to, Santa Claus and the U.S. style Christmas tree are fast making inroads on custom.

Holland has a word for it — "Strooivand" — literally meaning "strewing night." Actually, it's sort of a bribe-game the children of the Netherlands play on Dec. 5. They simply place their shoes in front of the fireplace filling them with hay and carrots for good old St. Nick's horse. It is expected that the

old boy will fill the children's shoes with goodies and toys.

#### Unusual Delicacies

Brazil makes the punishment fit the crime, so to speak, and Papa Noel makes his Christmas rounds trimming the traditional trees with cotton and bits of popcorn in lieu of the snow they never have in this tropical country. No sleigh-rides here,

so the order of the day is picnics and excursions.

Scotland has some unusual delicacies for the holiday season, with New Year's Day the signal for the giving of gifts. Haggis is a favorite dish, and this is what it consists of: the heart, liver and lungs of a sheep or a calf, minced with suet, onions, oatmeal and seasoning and boiled in the stomach of the

animal. New Year's calling is traditional, and it is expected that the visitor bring with him a handful of coal.

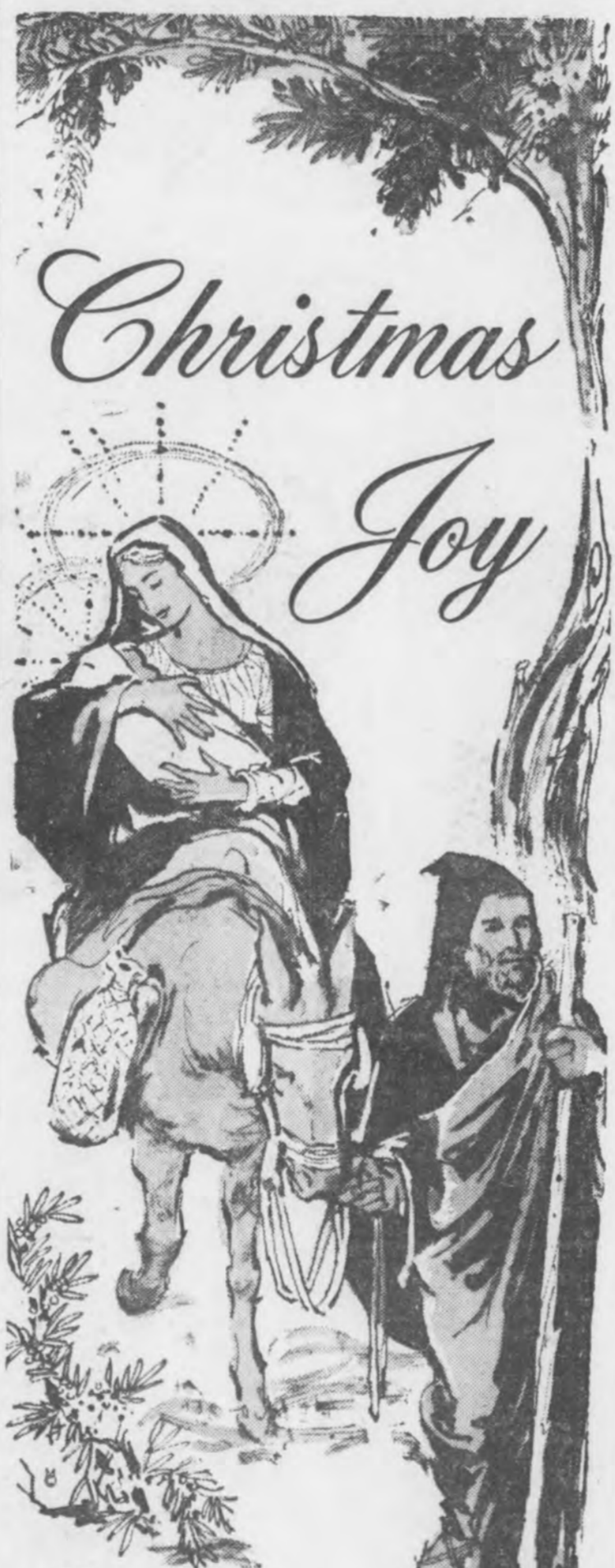

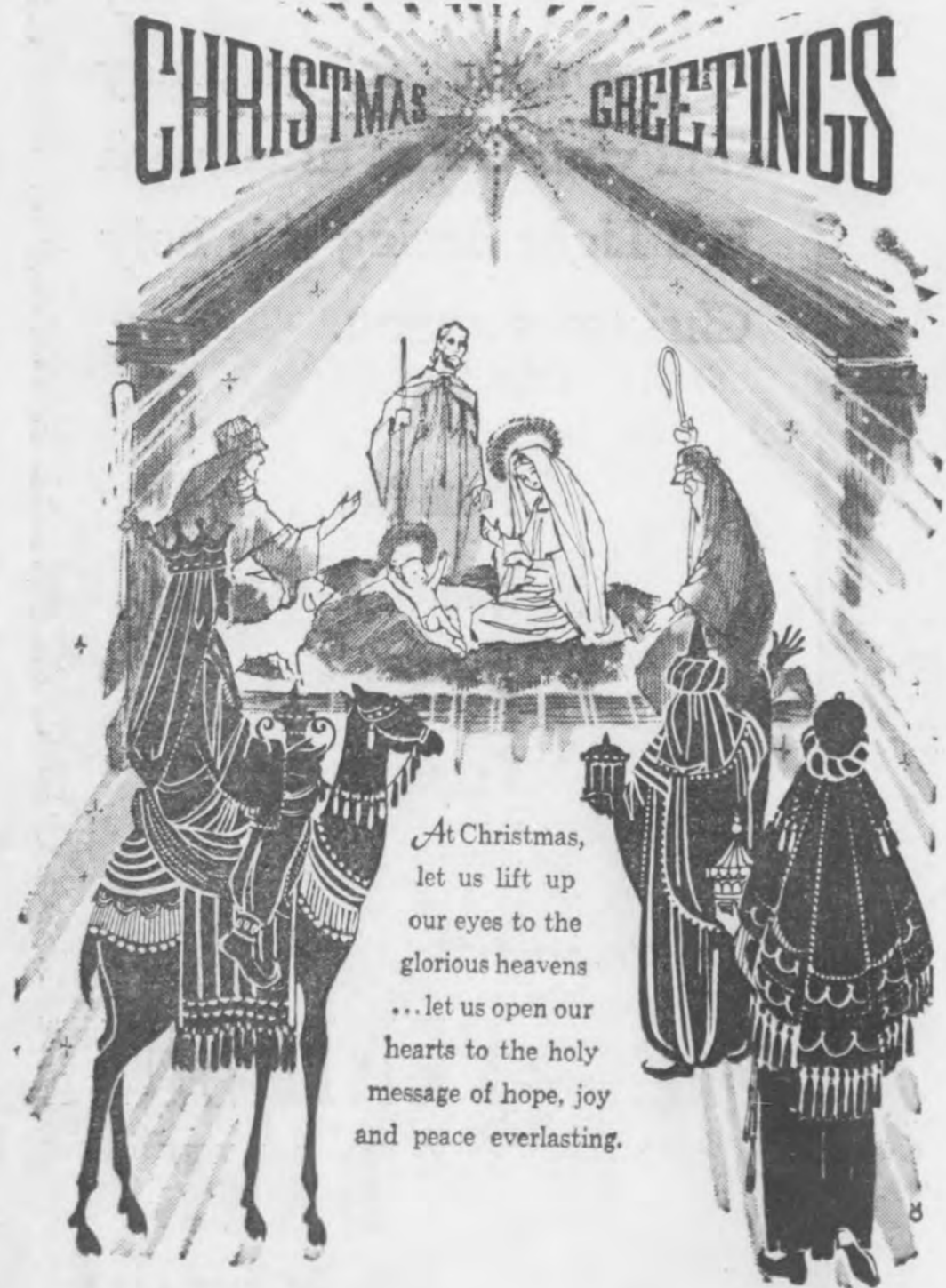

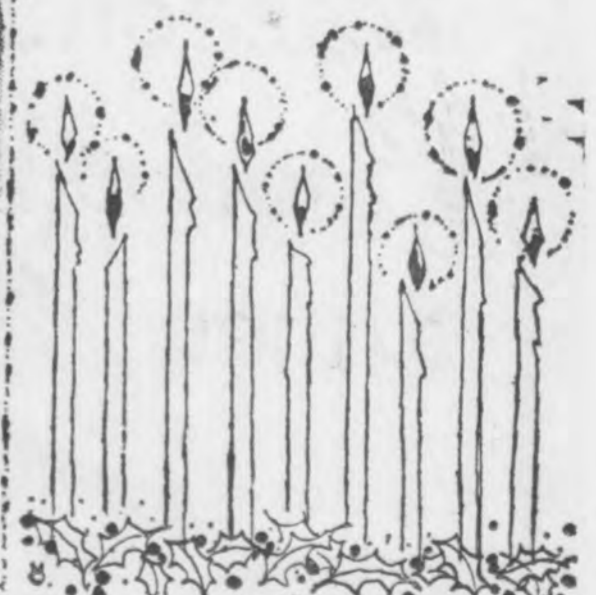

## December Sky Part Of Christmas

ANN ARBOR — "The December stars belong to Christmas as much as the carols, wreaths and greens," Univer-

sity of Michigan astronomer Hazel M. Losh points out.

In addition to the mystery of the Christmas Star, the heavens "seem to outdo themselves in decorations," Prof. Losh notes.

Turning to the east, "some of the most beautiful and colorful stars of the whole year are on display:

- "Auriga, the large five-sided figure, ruled by the bright yellow star, Capella, rises soon after sunset.

- "The Pleiades, followed by the rest of Taurus, rises at about the same time as Capella. Taurus is symbolized by the great letter 'V' with its orange star, Aldebaran, at the end of the lower prong.

- "Orion and the brightest of all stars Sirius, climb out of the east and cross over the

south meridian around midnight. The winter constellations center mostly around Orion with his two Hunting Dogs and the Hare below him. Those who devised the constellations evidently intended to depict a hunting scene with the Dogs pursuing the Hare, and it in turn crouching low close to Orion seeking his protection.

- "Sirius in the figure of his Greater Dog (Canis Major) is easily identified by extending a line downward through the Belt stars. From time immemorial, Sirius has been watched, admired and revered, rising as it does in the early evening around Christmas time. It was the 'star of the east' pointed to by three wise men of Orion," Prof. Losh says.

## Bethlehem Star Still A Mystery

ANN ARBOR — The Star of Bethlehem still remains an astronomical mystery.

"Popular interest in astronomy reaches its peak this month with the symbol of the Christmas Star, but astronomers are continually reminded that any satisfactory explanation or time of the Star of Bethlehem's appearance is out of the question," says University of Mich-

igan astronomer Hazel M. Losh. Perhaps the thing to do is pick out the symbol in the sky that you like best and make it your own Christmas Star, Prof. Losh suggests.

She says the date of Christmas has been believed to bear a real relation to the sun and the winter solstice.

"It is thought that this Christian celebration was set to agree with the earlier pagan festival, attendant upon the rejoicing in the turning northward of the sun at the winter solstice."

When the sun reaches the winter solstice, it comes to the most southerly point in its apparent yearly journey around the earth.

Says Prof. Losh, "Although the narrative about the star is too

incomplete and the date of its appearance and the early calendar too uncertain to give a basis for astronomical explanation, the bright planets (such as Venus, Jupiter, Saturn) are always promising and alluring.

"It is often suggested that an unusual configuration of the bright planets may have given the appearance of an extraordinarily bright star and could have easily been the sign," the U-M astronomer explains.

### DATE UNKNOWN

No one really knows at what time of the year Christ was born, but Christians have celebrated Dec. 25 as His birthday since the 300's, according to World Book Encyclopedia.

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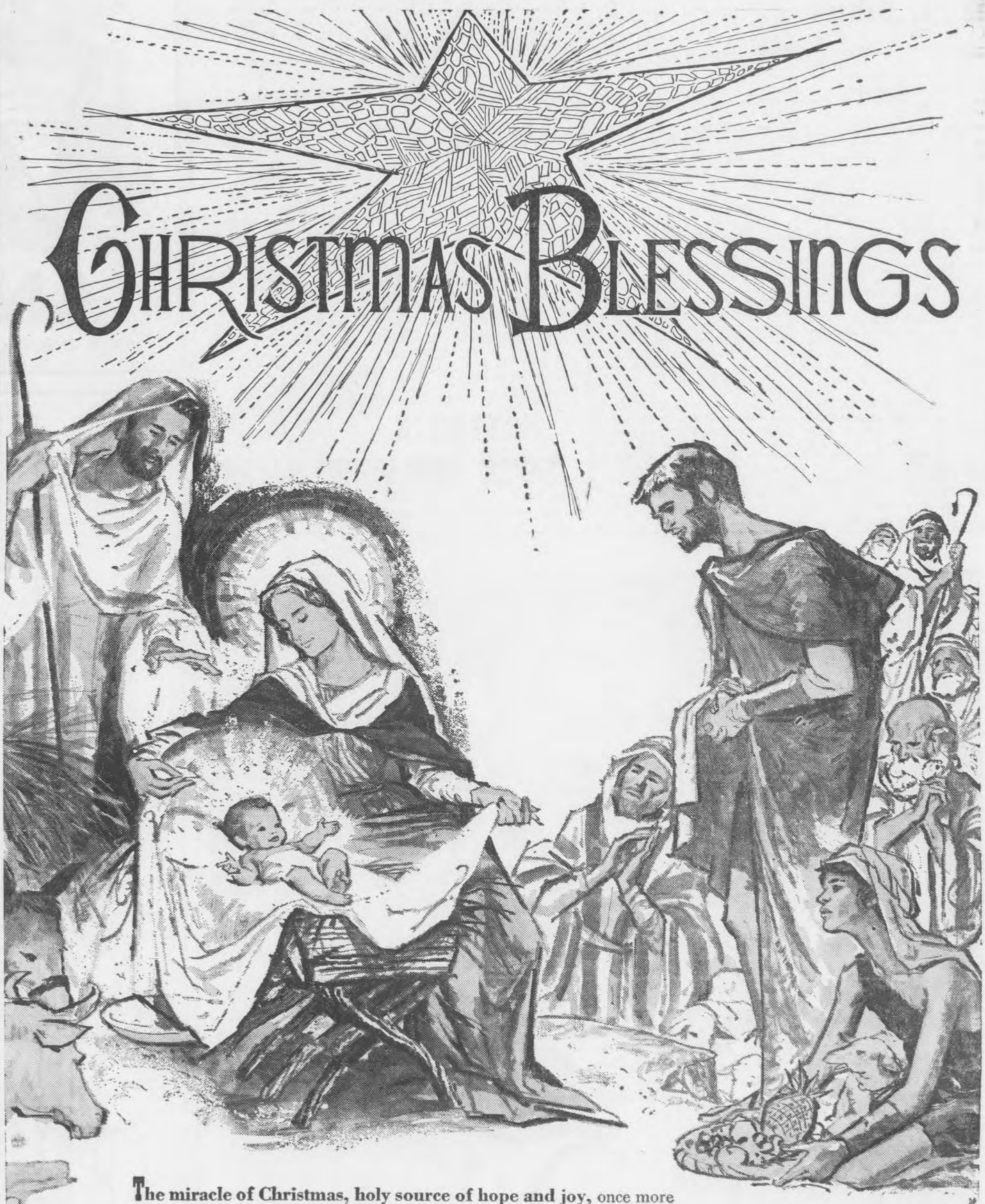

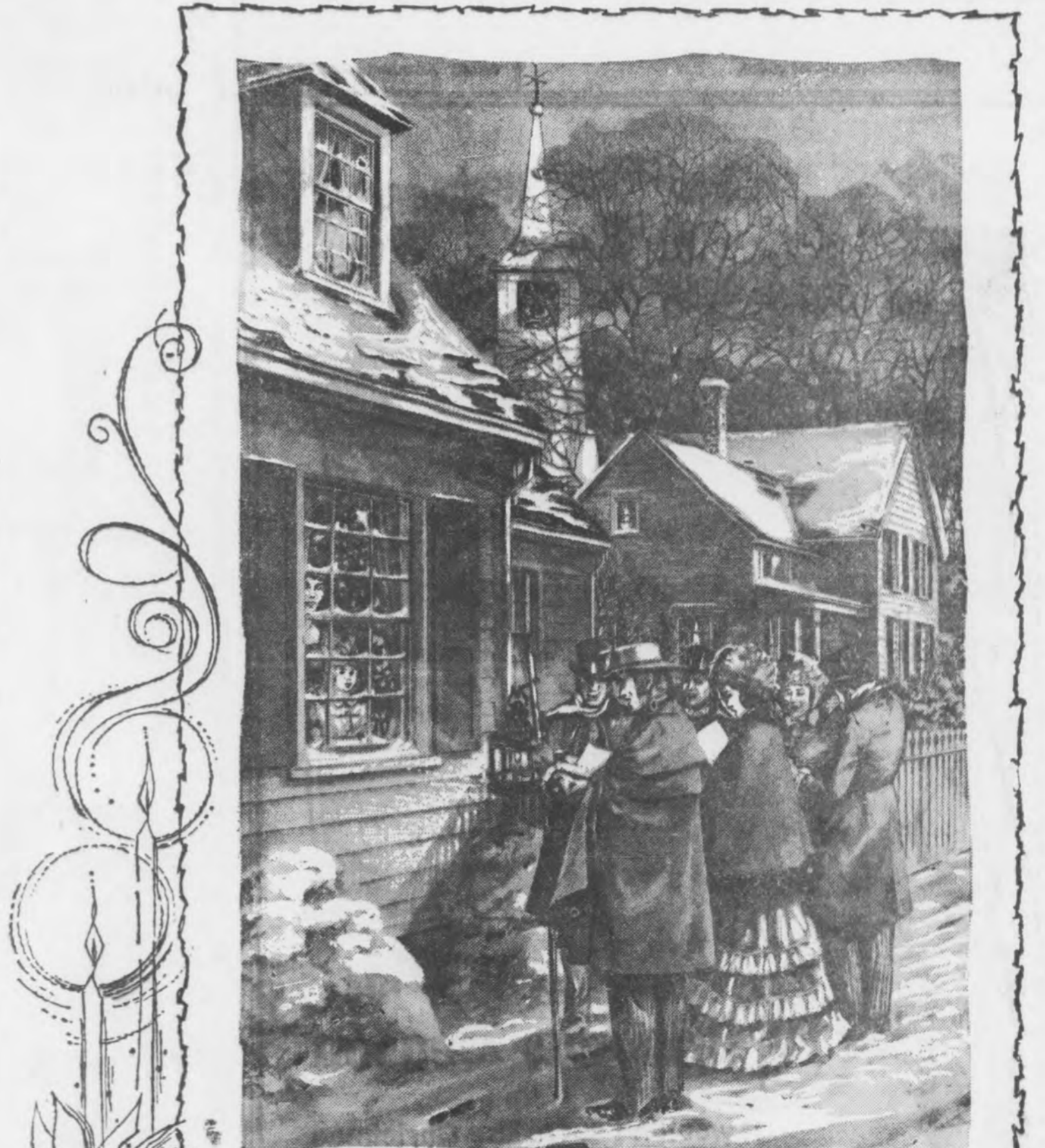

**Jordan Opens Bethlehem To Pilgrims**

A gate in Jerusalem in opened wide at Christmastide to permit pilgrims to pass from Israel into Jordan to worship in Bethlehem.

As the crow flies, it is only five miles to the place of Christ's birth. The little hilltop town is a magnet for the many

hymn, "Thy Little Ones, Dear Lord, Are We."

The Rev. Mr. Bostrom will preach the sermon, "God's Incarnate Son."

Arab Christians living in Israel and for followers of the Protestant, Roman Catholic, Orthodox and Armenian faiths.

Most of the sites associated with Christ stand in the present-day Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan, the National Geographic Society says. These weathered the Arab-Jewish war with little or no damage, and the Jordanian government has proved to be a careful, diplomatic custodian of places held holy by peoples of various religions. In times of tension, every effort is made to keep the pilgrim routes open.

The way to Bethlehem winds through the bleak Judean hills. It is crowded before Christmas with visitors hurrying on foot, in cars, in taxis and buses. As the road nears town, cultivation increases. Terraces rib the hillsides. Bedouin girls follow wheat harvesters to glean grain. The music from shepherds' reed flutes echoes thinly in the crisp air.

Looking eastward over stark wilderness, a traveler can see the deep cleft of the Jordan River and the Dead Sea. Beyond, blue haze hovers over the mountains of Moab.

Time seems to have stopped in this part of the Holy Land, which probably looked much

the same when Joseph and Mary came down from Nazareth. The route they took is not known, but it would have been logical for them to go from their village to the Sea of Galilee and follow the Jordan some 60 miles south, nearly to the Dead Sea, before turning toward Bethlehem.

The valley route would have been warm in winter and easier on Mary than a more direct trail over mountains of the interior.

The carpenter and his young wife found Bethlehem stirring dustily with crowds of people and animals. The census decreed by Caesar Augustus was under way, and Judeans like Joseph had to appear in the city of David, whose house and lineage they claimed, to register

their households. Bethlehem was then an insignificant little town, though it had been a caravansary since about 900 B.C. But it did not have long to wait for fame. Jesus' birth there in a manger put Bethlehem promptly on the map.

**Report By Origen**

Pilgrims soon started seeking out the stable-grotto linked to the Nativity. One of the first carefully documented pilgrimages was made about A.D. 238 by Origen, the Greek writer-teacher-church father.

Origen reported: "Everyone in the country knows it, and the pagans will tell again and again to him who cares to hear it, that in the said cavern was born a certain Jesus whom the

Christians admire and adore."

In A.D. 330 Emperor Constantine built a basilica over the grotto. The church was restored and enlarged in the 6th century, the National Geographic says. Beneath it are many passages and grottos, including the cell where St. Jerome wrote the Vulgate version of the Scriptures. The basilica's towers rise in majesty over present-day Bethlehem whose weathered stone buildings huddle shoulder to shoulder on the crest of a prowlike hill.

Living in Bethlehem are some 19,000 people, mostly Christian Arabs and Semites of Canaanite or Jewish stock. Their dress evokes Bible times, but everything's fairly well up to date in Bethlehem city.



**For Kissing**
