Johnson Place Raided, Samples of Stuff Taken

Old Surnich and John Sedick, American, woodmen, were arrested and several bottles believed to contain moonshine liquor were seized in a raid on their place of Mrs. Jennie Johnson, in the 1600 block, Ludington street, Wednesday night. The raid was successfully conducted by the Escanaba police officers.

A tip was received by the police late in the afternoon and plans laid for the raid which was expected to bring information concerning a source of a moonshine supply in this city.

Two officers went to the home and gained entrance under the provisions of the state laws. On entering they found the two woodmen in an intoxicated condition and placed them under arrest, giving notice to the owner that she would have to stand the consequences of an investigation which will be made.

Among the bottles taken by the officers was one containing a mixture of what is thought to be lemon, orange and other substances having a close resemblance and odor to an intoxicant. Other bottles with colorless substances and some with beverages believed to be liquor were taken by the officers.

They were all sealed and are being kept at the police station for evidence. Samples will be analyzed after the course of the state will be laid out.

When questioned, both men denied they had taken anything to drink there with the exception of a glass of "near beer" which they claim was given to them.

"We pay nothing for it at all," one man said in a broken English tone of voice.

This is one of the raids which the police are anticipating in the campaign against the sale of intoxicating liquor of the city.
