SLIGHT REDUCTION IN 1928 BUDGET

CITY ENDS FISCAL YEAR WITH \$2,817 CASH SURPLUS. BES RECORD. That the city of Gladstone finished the fiscal year ending March 31 with a cash surplus of \$2,817 was brought to light in the budget estimates submitted by City Manager F. R. Buckner at the annual meeting of the City Commission held Monday night. This sum is \$995 higher than last year's surplus, and will be used again this year in effecting a reduced budget, tentatively fixed at \$31,124 as compared with \$31,760 for last year.

Full details of the budget estimates are contained in the official summary published elsewhere in this issue. The budget requirements are set over these figures to take notice that a public hearing has been set for Friday, May 4, at which time citizens may submit suggestions or grievances for the attention of the City Commission.

Despite the fact that the sinking fund requirements have been set at \$9,000 for this year, the greatest program of improvements is provided for. Chats with The Editor

THE WEATHER continuing unpleasant, one is forced to look elsewhere for encouragement. We find it in a study of the proposed budget for next Gladstone for the next year. This presents some bright spots for every citizen honestly concerned with the future of this city. The amount of the budget itself and the rate of taxation is little changed. Perhaps it will fall slightly below the \$1430 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation of the past few years.
But the good feature of the budget information printed officially elsewhere in this issue, is that it discloses an appropriation of \$9,000 for the sinking fund amount which when added to that already on hand and with anticipation of a like amount appropriated in 1929, will make possible the retirement of an additional \$20,500 of the city's bonded indebtedness. This means that by the end of 1929, Gladstone's bonded debt will have been reduced to \$54,000, less than the total voted by the people in March, 1923, to "keep the city from going bankrupt."

MEMBERS of the Michigan Press Assn. have been observing "exchange month" during April each of the approximately 250 members exchanging copies with the others, at the rate of 50 each week. Previous to coming to Gladstone, this writer was in touch with practically all Michigan newspapers, so that their coming at this time is not entirely a novel experience but we want to go on record, nevertheless, as stating that it has been an enjoyable and profitable experience, and we are glad that Chas. Teseyman, of the Norway Current, mentioned at the last annual meeting for this exchange.

WE KNEW the ladies could do it, but it remained for the arrival of the April 12 issue of the Maritime Pioneer-Tribune and the April 13 issue of the Norway Current to impress upon our mind the wonderful result of the experiment of having the ladies of those cities edit their home-town papers for one week. Dear Sir:
Replying to your request for an expression of what is in my heart regarding the future of our city.
I have been a resident of Gladstone for thirty years and for twenty-six years have owned a home. When I first came to build a home here, it was a town on the town, the bay, the glorious view of land and water from the bluff, the surrounding country with its rivers its clear spring brooks and wild life, and had decided it was right here I wanted to live my allotted span.
As a town we have progressed slowly, and still, we have made many worth while improvements, but I believe only a fraction of what might have been accomplished had we all worked together more whole heartedly for the good of our City as a whole.
I have believed in Gladstone for thirty years and believe the outlook is brighter now than at any time in its history.
I have personal knowledge of many small towns in Lower Michigan that in the early days were wholly dependent on the adjoining timber lands for their prosperity, that are far more prosperous today than they were in the days of the lumbering industry, with much larger, more widespread distribution of material wealth. These are towns too that do not possess the natural advantages that we have here.
I believe we have large sums in potential wealth around us going to waste every year in undeveloped agricultural possibilities, in undeveloped shoreline, in the timber and in industries that could be developed to the right kind of civic co-operation.

Whereas, it was determined at a regular meeting of the City Commission, that the following resolution was passed...

WHEREAS, City Manager F. R. Buchner has prepared and submitted the annual budget for the current fiscal year...

NEW THEREFORE, he is notified that the same be placed on file and printed and published in the Delta Reporter on April 27, 1928...

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a public hearing be held thereon at the City Hall on the 5th day of May 1928 at 7:30 P. M.

In compliance with section Seven (7), Chapter Eight (8) of the City Charter, I herewith submit the annual tax budget for the City of Gladstone, for the fiscal year beginning on April 1st, 1928 and ending March 31st, 1929.

The budget reflects the City's contemplated work program, the amount to be spent for all purposes, the revenue from miscellaneous sources other than taxation, and the net amount to be raised by taxation.

The proposed budget also includes a comparative statement of last year's budget, together with a comparative statement of tax budgets of previous years, tabulations of the City's bonded debt and summarized inventory of public property.

I recommend that the budget be kept within the limits set forth herein, thereby keeping the tax rate the same as heretofore, in spite of an estimated decrease in the assessed valuation amounting to \$30,000.
