



Dairying and Stock Raising Where Good Crop Rotation is Practiced Are Recommended.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

General farming and live stock raising, with a limited amount of dairying and a good crop rotation is, on the ayerage, the type most ensily made profitable on most farms in the northern edge of the corn belt. This is brought out in a study made by a farm management specialist of the United States department of agriculture, of 300 owner farms and 153 tenant farms in Lenawec county, Michigan, which is typical of southern Michigan, northwestern Ohio and northeastern Indiana.




INTERIOR OF CHICKEN HOUSE

Kind of Floor Most Suitable Depends Greatly on Soil on Which Struc-ture Is Located.

From the United States Department of Agriculture.)

The kind of floor which is best suited for a particular poultry house depends upon the soil on which it is located, and the use of the house. On light, sandy, well-drained soils a dirt floor is satisfactory, especially for small or colony hen houses. Such floors should be from two to six inches higher than the outside ground surface, and it is advisable to renew them each year by removing the contaminated surface down to clean soil, and to refill with fresh sand or fine gravel and earth. A board floor is generally used where the level of the floor in the house is from one to three feet above the ground surface and in portable houses on land which is not well drained. Board floors harbor rats and rot quickly and should be raised some distance off the ground so that cats or dogs can get under them, which also allows a free circulation of air to preveat the wood from rotting. Cement floors are adapted to long permanent buildings, brooder


