Since the advent of the latest wheat can exports to Europe has been the shortage of shipping. Between July 1 and October 10 we shipped 65,980,305 bushels. It this rate should continue until the end of the fiscal year we will have furnished the Allies with more than 237,500,000 bushels of wheat and flour in terms of wheat.

The result of increased production and conservation efforts in the United States has been that with the cessation of hostilities we are able to return to a normal wheat diet. Supplies that have accumulated in Australia. Argentine and, other hitherto inaccessible markets may be tapped by ships released from transport service, and European demand for American wheat probably will not exceed our normal surplus. We found our selves at the beginning of the harvest year with an unusually short crop. Even the most optivistic statisticians figured that we had a bare surplus of 20,000,000 bushels. And yer Europe was facing the probability of a bread famine—and in Europe bread is by far the most important article in the diet.

All of this surplus had left the country early in the fail. By the first of the year we had managed to ship a little more than 50,000,000 bushels by practicing the utmost economy at home—by wheatless days, wheatless meals, heavy substitution of other ecreals and—by sacrifice at almost every meal throughout the country.

In January the late Lord Rhondda, thea British Food Controller, cabled that only if we sent an additional 75,000,000 bushels before July 1 could he take the response of the American people was \$5,000,000 bushels safely delivered overseas between January 1 and July 1. Out of a harvest which gave us only 20,000,000 bushels surplus we actually shapped 441,000,000 bushels.
