Terrible Mortality. MONTREAL, Oct. 2. -Official returns at the health office shows 44 deaths from small-pox in this city yesterday. The editor of the Daily Times died suddenly of small-pox at 3 a. m., and was buried at once. The sanitary police have replaced the placards torn down by the rioters. No further serious trouble is anticipated. Public feeling is completely aroused by the conduct of the rioters and the po-lice are denounced on all sides for their seening want of courage. The au-thorities are resolved to carry out the health laws vigorously and take what-ever steps are necessary for that pur-pose.
